

A CORRECTION IN ANDRESEN vs. KURTZ

This paper in the issue of Saturday, March 28, under the head of MATTER DECIDED BY JUDGE GALLOWAY, stated in reference to the suit to dissolve the partnership of Andresen and Kurtz, that testimony was introduced showing that Andresen had no interest, other than as an employe in the business.

This is a mistake, reflecting unfairly upon Mr. Andresen, as the case has not yet been tried and no testimony has as yet been introduced by either party. What Judge Galloway did decide was a motion to appoint a receiver to take charge of the business of the partnership, supported by affidavits of Andresen and other parties and by affidavits of Mr. Kurtz supported by his and other affidavits.

Judge Galloway simply refused to appoint a receiver at the present time and Kurtz' attorney consented to allow Andresen an examination of the books of the partnership, and the case will be tried some time in the future.

This paper had no desire to misrepresent the facts of the case and gladly makes the correction.

BURNETT UPHOLDS REAL ESTATE LICENSE

Judge Burnett of department No. 1 yesterday rendered a decision, which will drive out of existence a whole swarm of curbstone real estate dealers, who have been doing business without a license.

The suit, on which the decision was based, was brought by S. Page for \$306.25 commission for selling some property of C. W. Brashler in the Englewood addition of this city for \$8000. Judge Burnett in his decision states that no person, not holding a real estate license from the city, can compel the payment of a commission.

Attorney M. E. Pogue, representing Page, contended the city charter was not broad enough to compel persons to take out license. McNary & McNary represented the defense and secured a dismissal of the case with costs.

Notice to Improve a Portion of High Street.

Notice is hereby given that at the meeting of the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, held March 16, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve High street between the north line of State street and the south line of Court street, in the following manner:

First: By grading the roadway of said street between said points full width from curb to curb to the proper subgrade.

Second: By paving the space between the rails and one and one-half feet outside of the rails of the Oregon Electric Railway Company with vitrified brick, in accordance with the plans and specifications for the proposed improvement of the street railway track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company on State street, the cost of said improvement to be assessed against the right of way of the said Oregon Electric Railway Company.

Third: By paving said roadway, save and except the space between the rails and one and one-half feet outside of the rails of said railway track of the Oregon Electric Railway Company, with Warren's Bitumastic water-proof pavement. The cost of said improvement to be assessed on the owners of adjacent property, as provided in the charter of said city.

Remonstrances against the above improvement may be filed within 20 days from the first publication of this notice.
