The campaign for the money has been undertaken by the Whitman College Development league. New buildings have been projected that will cost \$1,000,000.

## TOBACCO TRUST MANAGER TALKS

San Francisco, April 3.—"A man cannot earn a fortune on a salary, nor by the sweat of his brow."

"If you want to reach the nerve center of a competitor strike his pocketbook."

These two gems of thought from James Buchanan Duke, head and front of the \$400,000,000 American tobacco trust and self-made man, who has arrived here on a pleasure trip. He is accompanied by his bride and mother-in-law.

Mr. Duke has some forceful ideas on how money can be made, and he expressed them.

"Don't waste any time on experiments and theories," he suggested, "but hit straight at the pocketbook when you are after a competitor."

He puts this system into operation when he corners the tobacco business in England.

"Can a man earn a fortune on a salary? No, sir, he can't," he continued. "Nor can he earn one by the sweat of his brow. He must first save enough money to engage in business. He must see some need of the public and then pitch in and supply it. That's the only way."

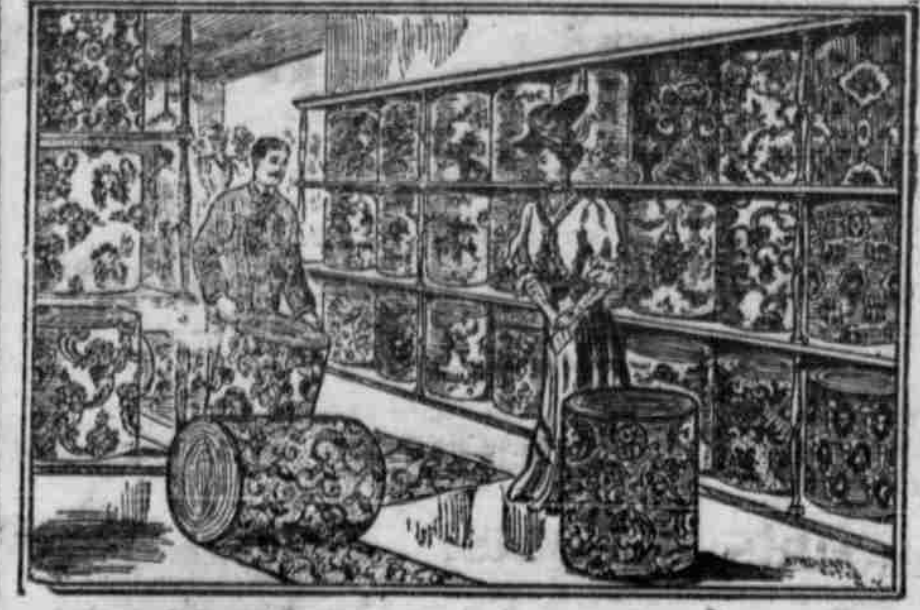
