ANTI-TRUST LAW APPLIES TO FARMERS

AS WELL AS TRUSTS

EX-MAYOR LOW SAYS PRODUCERS ARE EQUALLY GUILTY WITH TRUSTS IN FORMING COMBINATIONS.

Washington, April 4.—That the cotton and wheat growers and farmers of the United States violate the law when they combine to protect themselves and that in seeking this protection they are equally guilty with illegal business combinations was one of the arguments made today by Seth Low, former mayor of New York, when he appeared before the judiciary committee of the house in behalf of the Hepburn anti-trust law.

When the procession started around the west side of the post-office square at 10:30 there were 300 prancing animals of every class from the tiny Shetland to the mammoth Percheron in line and ready to step to the music.
There were brigades of Normans, Clydes, runners, roadsters, riding horses and grade animals, single and double teams from the dainty high steppers to the heaviest dray teams.

Led by Grand Marshal Yankee, followed by President Page and Vice President Stockton behind his beautiful blacks, followed by a platoon of riders on thoroughbreds, including ladies, there was little left for the spectators to do but feast their eyes on the passing throng of beautiful animals, one class after another, all entries filled with splendid animals representative of their breeding. The marshal was assisted by Ira Hamilton and E. Hofer on fine mounts, and Chief Gibson in charge of a platoon of special police. Not the slightest accident or confusion occurred. J. Pierpont Morgan, who is visiting here, has been warned by the police that they cannot guarantee him protection if he ventures into the street. The financier is staying close to his hotel and the greatest secrecy is maintained by the management as to the location of his apartments. It is feared that the anarchistic element, which is swaying the crowds, might choose to kill the multi-millionaire.
The situation is made doubly tense today by the parade of the workmen, called in honor of their fellows who were shot down in Thursday's disturbances. Three workmen are dead, four are dying and eight are seriously hurt. Thirty-one po-

lice and soldiers were seriously injured but none fatally.
Thousands of men were in line. Under pressure of popular demand, the authorities gave permission for the parade, the labor leaders pledging that there would be no disorders. When the line formed, however, the police were overwhelmed by its numbers.
It is feared that trouble cannot be avoided this evening.
The treatment given Gotch for some time prior to last night was responsible for the result of the match. He says that when Gotch became heated the massage cream issued from his pores and he became so slippery that it was impossible to hold him. The Russian says he quit because he did not have a chance to win and he did not want to keep the crowd waiting for the result.
Experts at the mat side today declare that the bout was on the level and that the Russian simply met his master.

Continuing his argument on the different features of the bill, he held that it will remedy many of the defects in the Sherman anti-trust law, and pointed out a long list of supreme court decisions which indicated, he said, that much interstate business is conducted contrary to the Sherman law.
"The common carriers should be permitted to combine to formulate traffic agreements in proper cases and under suitable supervision," he said. "Combinations and traffic agreements often mean more effective service to the public. What is wanted is an effective public supervision."
Low held that publicity is a great cure for many evils charged against combinations, and added:
"Much of the criticisms directed by the people in general in due to the fact that they do not understand the methods of corporations. The clause in the Hepburn bill relating to certain phases of trade disputes was inserted for the purpose of quieting the fears of organized labor, lest even strikes, unions and trade agreements might be declared illegal."

FULTON ACCUSES HENEY OF BACK-BITING METHODS

FORMER CATHOLIC PRIEST BECOMES A BENEDICT
Jeremiah J. Crowley Gets Married and Renounces the Priesthood.

Chicago, April 4.—Jeremiah J. Crowley, the former Roman Catholic priest, whose criticisms of church affairs and certain practices of his fellow churchmen at the Chicago diocese brought him under the ban of ecclesiastical edict, is now a married man. His action on the part of the priest destroys the last possibility of his ever re-entering the priesthood, unless an exception is made in his case, it will result in his absolute excommunication from the Catholic church.
Before the wedding, Mrs. Crowley was Miss Blanche MacLeod and she was employed as a stenographer in the office of Crowley.

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
