## SAYS CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CURED HIM OF LEPROSY

(Boston Journal.)

After characterizing Mrs. Mary Eddy as a woman who spread fabulous stories of cures by Christian Science healing which has never been accomplished, at the state session before the public health committee yesterday morning, and challenged Alfred Farlow, the church's publicity agent, to produce the name of a leper he had claimed had been cured by Christian treatment, Attorney F. W. Peabody of the opposition was non-plussed at the afternoon session, when following a second day, much to his discomfort, Farlow arose and named the leper as Dr. G. W. Barrett, a physician of St. Louis, Mo.

Closely following the producing of the name, W. A. Morse, representing Christian Scientists, rose to his feet, addressing Mr. Peabody, and asking him if he would now withdraw his bills as he had agreed to if the name was produced.

"Good God, man!" was all Peabody could say.

Following the hearing Mr. Farlow telegraphed to St. Louis and returned a prompt response. Both telegrams followed:

Barrett, G. W.,  
2219 A South Grand avenue, St. Louis, Mo.

Do you still claim that you have healed of leprosy by Christian Science? Give dates of healing. Wire immediately. ALFRED FARLOW."  
St. Louis, Mo., March 31, 1908.

Barrett's Building, Boston:

Healing took place 25th day of January, 1891. You are correct your inquiry. Will find full account in Sentinel, January 11, 1900. G. W. BARRETT."

**Many Sensations.**

Sensation followed sensation all through the day and hundreds of the Christian Science followers packed room 240 and applauded the defenders of the science healing.

The whole affair centered on three bills dealing with Christian Science, namely, house bill 910, which provides that Christian Scientists need not be registered or examined, provided they receive no pay for their services as healers; house bill 1065 requiring parents and guardians to furnish medical attendance to sick children in their care, and house bill 1066, on certifying causes of death by physicians not regular attendants previously.
