SMITH SUES FULTON FOR ALLEGED SLANDER

Hon. T. S. Smith, through his attorney, L. H. McMahon, has brought suit against Senator Fulton for slander. His complaint charges "that on April 4 in a discourse which he had in the presence and hearing of sundry persons, spoke and published of and concerning said plaintiff and said affidavit the false and scandalous words following: 'The statements are deliberately and wilfully false and there is no word of truth in it.'"

"Meaning that said plaintiff in making such affidavit, had sworn falsely and committed willful and corrupt perjury. "That in consequence the plaintiff is greatly injured in his good name and reputation, and has been rendered liable to prosecution for perjury, to his damage in the sum of \$5000."
