COUNTESS GLADYS WARMLY WELCOMED

Given the Keys of Her Estate in the Land of Her Hungarian Loved.

 Oermeeze, Hungary, April 6.—Countess Glydas Szechenyi, formerly Miss Vanderbilt of New York, slept last night for the first time in Oermeeze castle, her future home, to which she was taken in state with pomp and display.
 In honor of the countess an American flag waved over the old castle all day yesterday for the first time in its history. From Budapest to a small station, six miles from the castle, Count Szechenyi and his bride, accompanied by a cook, butler and two maids in charge of 40 trunks, rode in a private car. At every station along the route great crowds of peasants gathered to greet the party, and at each stop the countess stepped to the platform and thanked them for their ovations.
 Arriving at the little station where the party alighted, Countess Szechenyi and Count Laszlo were greeted by a tremendous crowd. The dowager countess, Irene, stepped forward and presented her new daughter-in-law with the keys of the estate. The floor and top of the carriage in which they rode to the castle, was literally covered with Hungarian flowers. A company of peasant outsiders rode in front and behind the vehicle. At the door of the castle Count Szechenyi embraced his bride and said the formal words of welcome.
