STANFORD CHANGES SYSTEM

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Portland, Or., April 6.—If changes now contemplated are approved by the board of trustees of Stanford university the next five years will witness the introduction of the German university system at Stanford. This will mean the complete separation between the college and the university proper and the necessary elimination of what are now known as the freshmen and sophomore classes. As it now stands, the plan is to institute at Stanford a university of higher special training in technical, professional and research lines such as is now offered by the John Hopkins university at Baltimore. This is the gist of an announcement made by President Jordan, of Stanford university, who left Portland this morning for Stanford after a trip through the northwest.

"If this plan is carried out," said Jordan, "four years will be required for law, five in medicine and three or four in engineering. The medical department will be arranged when the plans for the assimilation of Cooper medical college, Lane hospital and the Lane medical library are completed."

GAS TANK EXPLODES AT SCHOOL

Spokane, Wash., April 6.—Richard McIntyre is terribly, if not fatally injured and Mrs. John Utt is suffering from a broken leg as the result of the explosion of an acetylene gas tank in the school house at Princeton, Wash., a village near here.

A crowd was in the building, owing to the fact that the annual election of the school board was in progress.

In some unknown manner the gas tank was overturned and it exploded. Every window in the building was blown out and in the panic the two injured persons were trampled upon.

CRUISERS GIVEN WELCOME

Port Townsend, Wash., April 6.—The cruisers Tennessee, California and Washington entered the harbor here shortly before noon today from Port Angeles, from which port they sailed early this morning. Elaborate preparations have been made for entertainments during their two-day stay here. Wednesday, the Tennessee and California will go to Bellingham, where they will remain for several days. The cruiser Washington will go to Seattle Wednesday, remaining there at least ten days before going to the dry dock.

This is the first appearance of the Washington on Puget sound, and the citizens of the state are giving her a proper reception.

AGAINST WESTERN UNION

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Chicago, April 6.—Resolutions calling for another big strike have been passed by the commercial telegraphers of Chicago.

The strike will be declared against the Western Union Telegraph company in all parts of the United States and Mexico on June 1 unless demands presented before the last strike are granted in full. The Postal Telegraph company will be given until July 1 to allow similar demands, and if they are not met by that date a strike will also be directed against that corporation. The resolutions, which were adopted at yesterday's meeting of the Chicago commercial operators, declare that the Western Union has reduced wages 10 per cent, and that conditions are such that the telegraphers have nothing to lose now through a strike.

LABOR LEADERS MEETING

Chicago, April 6.—For the purpose of extending the principles of "Industrial Unionism" along the lines of the Western Federation of Miners, members of the Industrial Workers of the World are gathering in Chicago today to attend a general convention. Every big labor organization in the United States will be represented, such as the United Mine Workers of America, the Western Federation of Miners, the National Union of Lithographers and the United Brewery Workers. Those identified with the industrial movement denounce the Civic Federation, which is alleged to be an ally of capitalists, and the labor leaders who belong to it are called "misleaders."

Marion Circuit Court.
Four indictments against saloon keepers for selling liquor without a license and other infringements of the liquor were filed in the circuit court today. Three of the offenders are in the northern part of the county while the fourth is from the southern part of the county.

District Attorney McNary found "not a true bill" against George Handy, accused of assaulting W. L. Raphael, because of the disappearance of Raphael and two witnesses, all Indians.

Frank Cain, who was arrested for stealing a valise out of the Horseshoe restaurant, was arraigned before Judge Burnett in the circuit court this morning. He first asked for a jury trial, but upon the advice of his attorney, P. D'Arcy, he expressed himself as desirous of pleading guilty, but the court put the case over until tomorrow to enable him to think over the matter as he appeared uncertain what to do.

BANK TELLER DROPS OUT OF SIGHT

Los Angeles, Cal., April 6.—Accused of robbing the Bank of Los Angeles of \$3750, possibly more, Cramer, for some time a trusted teller in the institution, has dropped from sight. A warrant for his arrest has been issued, charging him with grand larceny.

It is the belief of the police that Cramer has fled to Mexico. The crime of which Cramer is accused was committed on March 28, after banking hours. According to the officials, he returned from the bank after the work of day, opened the safe, gathered as much cash as he could conveniently carry and then decamped.

PORTLAND BANK CASES TRIED HERE

J. Thorburn Ross, T. T. Burkhart and John E. Aitchison have won their fight to get a change of venue to Marion county on the charge of misusing the funds of the Title Guarantee & Trust company.

By the decision of the judges of the circuit court Saturday afternoon, announced by Presiding Judge Cleland, the cases of the accused bank officials will be sent to Marion county for trial before Judge Burnett or Judge Galloway at Salem.

The decision was not a great surprise, following the strong showing made by the defense when the application for change of venue was made before the four judges of the local bench. It was based on the 65 affidavits made by prominent citizens that a fair trial cannot be had at Portland and the copious extracts read from the files of Portland newspapers.

Although George H. Hill is joined with Ross, Burkhart and Aitchison in the indictments, he has not fought the proceedings at any stage

and it is believed that he will receive an immunity bath, the cases against him to be dismissed when he testifies for the state. This has not been officially announced, but is amply borne out by the circumstances.

There are four cases on which the accused men must stand trial. Three of these relate to the alleged misuse of the state school funds. The other charges that the defendants received deposits after they knew the bank to be insolvent. All the preliminaries have now been disposed of, and all that remains is to have the cases set for trial by the Marion county court.

The expense of transferring the cases will not be large, as in three of the cases, at least, there will be few witnesses.
