PIONEER MERCHANT SUGGUMBS

W. Lincoln Wade Dies at Advanced Age of 77 Years.

William Lincoln Wade, a pioneer who settled in this city in the early '60s, died this morning at the age of 77 years. Up to within a week of his death the old man enjoyed perfect health. A week ago he had an operation in the Willamette sanatorium, which institution caught on fire and Wade was carried to his home. He never recovered from the shock. He leaves a widow and a son, Murray Wade, an artist of Portland, and a brother Murray A. Wade of Gervais.

Wade was born in Lincolnville, Maine, December 22, 1831. At the age of 11 he shipped on board a sailing vessel in the employ of an uncle, and after a trip around the world joined the gold rush to California in the early '50s. In 1858 he made his first visit to Oregon on his way to the gold mines in Idaho. He remained there but a few years, coming to Salem where he settled in 1862 and opened a store within a few doors of the present one on the land which was at that time known as "Boone's Island," because of being surrounded by the creek and river.

The funeral will be conducted from the family residence, 852 Broadway, tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

ROSS TRIAL IS SET FOR APRIL 20

The trial of J. Thoburn Ross, indicted official of the Title, Guarantee & Trust company of Portland, was set for April 20 by Circuit Judge Geo. H. Burnett at 1:45 o'clock this afternoon.

District Attorney Manning of Portland immediately upon his arrival in this city at 1:25 this afternoon went into conference with District Attorney John H. McNary of this district and Attorney Wm. M. Kaiser. A private conference was held between Manning, McNary and Judge Burnett while a jury case was being heard. It was finally decided that the charge against Ross of conversion should be heard on the 20th, but no date could be set for the trials of T. T. Burkhart and John E. Aitchison. The dates for these trials will be set later.

District Attorney Manning is planning to remain here over night looking over the ground and consulting with McNary and Kaiser.

Notice to Improve a Portion of Broadway Street.

By establishing a permanent grade on said street along the proposed line of improvement where not already established. The cost of said improvement, save and except the space between the rails and one and one-half feet outside of the rails of the Oregon Electric Railway company to be assessed on the abutting and adjacent property, as provided in the charter of said city.

SANTAFE EMPLOYEE KILLED IN A WRECK

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Antluch, Cal., April 8.—B. J. Dowert, an employe of the Santa Fe railroad is dead, and his wife and two children are painfully injured as the result of a wreck on the Santa Fe road near here.

A passenger train, leaving the main line on account of an open switch, crashed into a boxcar on a side track. Dowert was working between two cars at the time and was instantly crushed to death. Mrs. Dowert and her daughters, who were in the boxcar in which the family lived, were wedged in the smashed car and were rescued with difficulty.

GREAT REPUBLICAN AVALANCHE IN TACOMA

Tacoma, Wash., April 8.—With scratched tickets by independent voters running into the thousands, the Republican still marshalled their party adherents in solid array yesterday and won the most sweeping victory ever known in the history of the city. Not a Democrat on the ticket even came close to election.

Mayor Wright went down under an avalanche of Republican votes, the worst defeated candidate for mayor who ever ran, linking 2041 over him. Every Republican councilman was elected by pluralities ranging from 732 down to 85. The work of the independent voters seemed to figure, however to a growing extent. Mayor Wright evidently obtained about one thousand Republican votes for he is that many ahead of the candidate for treasurer on the ticket. Every ward in the city was carried by the Republicans.

CALIFORNIA IS TEEMING WITH FRAUD

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, April 8.—Fully 3,000,000 acres of mineral lands in 27 counties of California have been fraudulently manipulated, is the gist of a report that Lewis Aubury, state mineralogist, is preparing with the intention of sending copies of it to President Roosevelt and Secretary of the Interior Garfield.

It is Aubury's contention that there are more frauds of this kind committed in California than in Oregon, Montana, Utah, Idaho and Wyoming combined. He does not have repeatedly called the attention of the authorities at Washington to the fact that the frauds are the result of a scheming on the part of influential men, but no particular notice of his complaint was taken, he says. He lays the blame on the government to the fact that it does not employ investigators to be assigned to make investigations, the result being that the clever manipulators escaped detection.
