GOVERNOR FIGHTING GAMBLING

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Albany, N. Y., April 9.—Governor Hughes today stirred up a hornet's nest in the senate by sending to that body a special message urging again the necessity of the passage of the anti-race horse gambling bill, upon which a tie vote was taken yesterday.
The message had no sooner been announced than Senator McCarron leaped to his feet with the suggestion that the senate should send a message back to the governor inviting him to mind his own business. "This message of the governor's is a positive insult to the senate," shouted McCarron.
After he had concluded his startling remark, Senator Grandy took the floor and bitterly attacked the governor, saying that he was turning into a common "scold."
Governor Hughes said in his message that gambling at the race tracks is not carried on through an evasion of the law, but because of the law as it now exists. Senator Rainey made a motion, which was not acted upon, that that part of the message relating to race tracks be tabled with the Agnew and Hart facing bills.

Hughes Has Message.
It is possible that Governor Hughes will call a special session of the legislature for May 11. Concerning the Agnew-Hart bill the governor said in his message:
"I again urge you to enact appropriate legislation to abolish the existing discriminations in favor of race track gambling. The failure of the upper branch of your body to pass the measures designed to effect this purpose after their passage in the lower branch cannot be regarded as disposing of the matter."
"The evil of race track gambling flourishes not in spite of the law, but because of the law. Legislation pretending to carry out the constitutional provision in effect nullifies it. You are asked to rid our law of a vicious discrimination whereby offenses equally condemned by the constitution are punished as crimes if committed in one place and are encouraged by the absence of suitable penalty if committed in another."

CRUSHED FUNERAL CARRIAGE

Chicago, April 9.—Four women and one man are dead today as a result of an electric car running down a carriage returning from a funeral in Maywood, a western suburb of Chicago.
The vehicle was cut in two and parts of it were carried several feet before the car could be stopped. Mrs. F. Rohloff, 65 years old, her daughter-in-law, and two other mourners who occupied it, were almost instantly killed, while Frank Newman, the driver, was so terribly mangled that he died at a hospital a few minutes later. When undertakers arrived the occupants of other carriages were trying to extricate the torn bodies of the five victims from the wreckage. The crew of the train proceeded to Wheaton without waiting to learn how badly the four women and man had been injured.

STUDIES TURNED HIM MAD

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, April 9.—What promised to be a brilliant army career has been suddenly ended by the suicide of First Lieutenant David A. Lindsay, of Company E, of the signal corps, stationed at the Presidio in San Francisco.

Friends of the dead soldier are today seeking information that will throw some light on the cause leading to the tragedy. So far as his comrades know, he was not in financial trouble and had no love affair. He was in his quarters in Tennessee hollow when he fired the shot early yesterday, but his body was not discovered until late in the afternoon.

Lieutenant Lindsay enjoyed the reputation of being extremely ambitious. He preferred studies to the social life, and late at night he was often found over his books. From these simple facts his comrades can imagine no valid reason for his act, other than a suddenly acute fit of melancholia. Some of the lieutenant's friends say that a strange fatalism has relentlessly followed him for 10 years, from the time he was a soldier in the Samar campaign in the Philippines up to the time of his death. Of seven comrades who were particularly friendly with Lindsay, four preceded him to a suicide's grave. Lindsay was born in 1875. In 1898 he enlisted as a private soldier in the artillery. He was quickly promoted, and in 1907 he was advanced to first lieutenant. His birth place was in Pennsylvania.

JURY UPHOLDS SENSIBLE ACTRESS

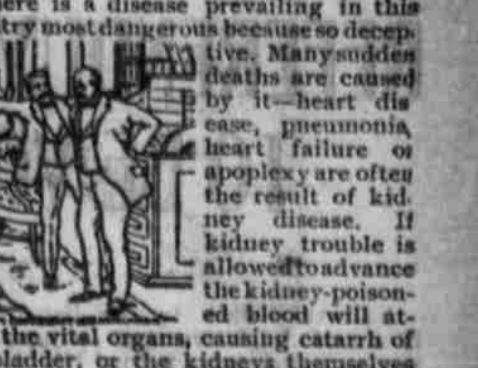

New York, April 9.—Henrietta Lee, the actress, has been upheld by a jury in her refusal to appear on the stage in tights, and she was awarded \$4700 of the \$8950 she sued for. Hurtig & Semon, theatrical managers, were defendants in the suit.

When Miss Lee refused some time ago to appear before the footlights in a musical comedy, after she had been engaged, she was discharged. Her husband, who also had a role in the same play, left at the same time. The actress immediately started suit for \$8950, which amount she claimed as salary during the term of her contract. The jury deducted the amount she had earned after she left the show, and gave her the balance.

HERMAN BILLEK MAY ESCAPE GALLOWS

Springfield, Ill., April 9.—Herman Billek, sentenced to hang for murdering five members of Vrzal family a few months ago, was today denied a rehearing by the state supreme court and unless the governor or board of pardons intercedes in his behalf he will die on the gallows, April 24. Billek made the appeal to the supreme court on the ground that Jerry Vrzal, whose testimony more than that of any other witness convicted the big Bohemian, confessed that he committed perjury on the stand. Several days ago Jerry, who testified that he heard his mother and Billek conspiring to kill one of the members of the Vrzal family, made a written confession in which he declared he had not told the truth; that the police compelled him, under threats, to give the testimony. Attorneys representing Billek will at once appeal to the governor.

AMERICA UPHOLDS CHINA

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Berlin, April 9.—It looks to Berlin diplomats as if the United States will be alone in its attempt to uphold Chinese sovereignty in Manchuria, as indicated by American Consul Fisher's policy at Harbin.

England being allied with Japan, is understood to be wholly friendly to the Russo-Japanese attitude in the disputed territory; France, being Russia's ally, will certainly cause no trouble, and Germany announced, when questions of Chinese integrity arose before the Russo-Japanese war, that she did not consider Manchuria a part of the empire.

Officialdom is wondering, accordingly, whether America took all these facts into consideration in upholding the Chinese Manchurian claim and whether she cares to grapple with the mikado and czar, diplomatically or otherwise, unaided.

VENEZUELA

The two governments are to be considered.
President Castro's attitude of resistance to the proposal of Secretary Root to the submission of pending cases to arbitration have aroused a small complacent secretary state as no other incident has done. It was owing to his strong opinion in the matter that the President agreed to request of congress authority to act in the matter as he deemed best.

As soon as the senate committee foreign relations has disposed of various treaties negotiated at Havana, it is understood, the Venezuelan question will be taken up.

FOUR NEW BATTLESHIPS.

Special message to congress provision for the construction of four new battleships in the plan of President Roosevelt. Information was developed in the report of the naval appropriation bill authorizing the construction of two new battleships only, not making appropriations until the next session of congress.
New provisions are far from satisfactory to the President and the department. It is regarded as authorized this year be put away at once. It is not believed to be good policy merely to let the President to have the bill constructed by contract or in yards and have to depend on legislation to secure the means for performing the work. It is thought that the President intended that there be four instead of battleships, and to that end he recommended, according to press reports, an amendment to the bill passed yesterday.
