### GUARDING CABINET MEMBERS

### AGAINST ANARCHY

PRESIDENT IS CLOSELY GUARDED—HE IS ADVISED TO BE CAREFUL AS TO ALL HIS MOVEMENTS.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, April 10.—Fearing that anarchistic outrages will follow as the result of President Roosevelt's short message to congress yesterday asking for the adoption of strict measures against the spread of anarchy, secret service men are today closely guarding members of the cabinet and particularly Postmaster General Meyer.

The order directing that the secret service bureau keep a close watch on those who would be in immediate danger of attack should the anarchists decide to take action was issued last night after threats had been made against the lives of Postmaster General Meyer and other members of the cabinet. The news of these threats reached the White House in an indirect way, and so far it is not known where they originated.

Whether or not it is believed that President Roosevelt's life is considered in danger, or whether he thinks so, is not disclosed, but it is taken for granted, that is the cabinet members are guarded the same measure of protection would naturally be taken in his case.

Inasmuch as the President wrote the message that has aroused the ire of the anarchists it is said that his advisers are today urging him to be careful concerning his movements in and out of the White House and to be ever watchful.

The greatest fear is entertained in the case of Postmaster General Meyer, whose duty it will be to "prohibit the use of the mail for the advocacy of murder, arson and treason," as the President expressed himself in his message. At watch has been placed on the Meyer residence and other secret service men are constantly keeping him within sight. It has not been observed that the homes of other cabinet members are being guarded. The postmaster general today declined to discuss the matter in any way. Neither would any of the other advisers of the President express themselves.

### SAILS FOR SAN DIEGO SATURDAY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Magdalena Bay. (By Wireless.) APRIL 10.—The men of the Atlantic fleet are the busiest set of sailors in the world today. Although they have worked like trojans during the 30 days that they have been here, they are throwing renewed energy into their work for tomorrow they sail for "God's country." The men are determined that every ship in the fleet will be at its best when the dress parade up the coast begins and the work of fighting ship and "priming up" is being pushed with wonderful enthusiasm.

All the ships will have been coaled by this evening and tomorrow morning will find the fleet fully prepared for the start for San Diego. The time of departure has not been fixed, but it is believed the word will be given by Admiral Thomas between 10 a. m. and noon.

### JOHNSON LAYS A PLATFORM

### FOR PRESIDENCY

TAKES ISSUES AGAINST PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT ON QUESTION OF A STRONG CENTRAL GOVERNMENT.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Shiloh, Tenn., April 10.—Governor Johnson, of Minnesota, at the dedication today of the Shiloh monument erected by Minnesota in memory of the soldiers from that state who fell in the battle of Shiloh, protested against President Roosevelt's idea of centralization of power. His utterances were accepted by many as part of the platform he would stand on should he receive the Democratic presidential nomination. He said in part:

"There seems to be a disposition to depart from the established forms; a desire on the part of those in authority to able in a central bureaucracy rather than reach democracy. It becomes you and me to protest against and departure whatsoever from the government that came to us from the constitutional convention of 1787 and these amendments which have been made to it by the specific will of the people. With the great material development of the country and a change in economic conditions, particularly with the growth of great private corporations, which are performing some of the functions of government, has come the necessity of exercising strict governmental control and the rigid enforcement of all laws enacted to retain the legal rights of the poor and weak."

Relative to the centralization of power, the speaker said: "The very theory of our government is based upon the rights of the state to control absolutely their own affairs."

### DEMOCRATS FIGHT FOR DELAY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, April 10.—Representative Mann of Illinois, who more than any one, is the confidence of the speaker, stated today that he expects to see congress adjourn about May 29, providing a rule is brought in to expediate the dispositions of bills which have been to conference. He pointed to the fact that a motion to suspend the rules and place the Indian appropriation bill on its immediate passage, made yesterday by Representative Sherman, had failed and that, if the minority took advantage of their full rights, they could easily force the house to spend two months in consideration of the senate amendments to this bill alone.

All the Republicans realize that their political fences need attending to and are eager to get away, and for that reason more emergency rules are expected.

### HARRIMAN TO GIRDLE THE EARTH

### WITH HIS SYSTEM

WALL STREET CONCEDES HE HAS CONTROL OF ERIE RAILROAD—TO UNITE STEAMER LINES WITH J. P. MORGAN.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, April 10.—Chicago railroad magnates accept E. H. Harriman's acquisition and control of the Erie railroad as evidence of the consummation of the first part of his plan to build a world-wide railway system.

The Chicago associates of the railroad king confirm the report, which has substantial verification from Wall street, to the effect that the Vanderbilt, Golet, Astor and Standard Oil interests in New York and Illinois capital represented by John J. Mitchell, president of the Illinois Trust & Savings bank, are flocking under the Harriman banner to control the American railway system. This having been accomplished, they will acquire all possible interest, it is said, in the trans-Siberian road being built by the Russian government.

The continental lines will be connected with the American-European steamship lines controlled by J. Pierpont Morgan and associates, thus establishing a belt line around the world.

### CRUELTY TO IRISH BRIDE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Dublin, April 10.—Mrs. Robert Flynn, a three-weeks bride, is being kept prisoner in her father's house at Ballinagleragh, county Leitrim, after she had been kidnapped on her wedding day by a band of Irish night riders, because Flynn refused to marry the girl the village of Ballinagleragh though he should wed. Mrs. Flynn has seen her husband only once since her wedding, and then the interview took place under surveillance. The young lady will be detained in her prison until Easter Sunday, when she will be allowed to go to her husband's home. To prevent her escape, her father's house is guarded day and night by the villagers, who add to the bride's agony blowing horns throughout the evening to prevent her from sleeping.

The ire of the village against the couple was roused because Flynn jilted another girl.

The night riders abducted Mrs. Flynn immediately after the marriage and commanded her father to take her in. The girl's father dared not refuse, fearing violence.

### STRANGE ROBBERS TAKEN

### SHOT CITY MARSHAL

FLEET ORDERED TO MAKE A LONGER VISIT AT PUGET SOUND—ORDERS ISSUED TO OTHER VESSELS TO GO NORTH

(United Press Leased Wire.) Kent, Wash., April 10.—Four strangers suspected of complicity in the robbery of a citizen at Orilla and the fatally shooting of City Marshal Harry Miller, of Kent, about 9 o'clock last night, were arrested this morning. Bloodhounds and posses of farmers, armed with rifles and pitchforks, were upon the trail all night and morning. Posses are continuing the man-hunt and avenues of escape are closely watched.

Miller still is unconscious and the surgeons have little hope of his recovery. Kent two council met this morning and posted a reward of \$300. Sheriff Smith of King county will offer \$300 additional.

Fleet to Seattle. Washington, April 10.—Secretary of the Navy Metcalf today decided to extend the visit of the Atlantic fleet at Seattle. Representatives Humphrey, Cushman and Jones, of Washington, visited the President and Secretary Metcalf today and said the people of their state were greatly disappointed because the ships would stay no longer than outlined in Secretary Metcalf's program of Wednesday. After the conference Secretary Metcalf announced that the fleet would not leave Seattle until May 27 and that the remainder of the Puget sound itinerary would therefore be set back one day.

Other Vessels North. Vallejo, Cal., April 10.—Orders have been received at Mare Island navy yard for the hospital ship Relief to sail today for southern waters to rejoin the battleship fleet. The ship sailed this morning. The order came as a surprise, as it was believed that the ship would remain here for a longer period. Work on the Maryland and West Virginia is being rushed in order that they may sail for Bremerton navy yard, where they will be docked on April 17. They will rejoin the Pacific fleet on May 1. The collier Jurin will be docked here tomorrow preparatory to returning to the fleet, where the ship's services are badly needed.

### STEAMSHIP LINE TO JAPAN

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, April 10.—Plans for a new trans-Pacific steamship line to connect Japan with the extension of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul road is building to Seattle, through Montana, Idaho and Washington, have been completed in the flowery kingdom by Vice President Hill and General Passenger Agent Miller, of that railroad. The deal was closed with the Onaka Shosen Kaisha company, and Miller and Hill are now on their way back to America from Japan. This will make the third Japanese steamship company plying between Japan and American ports. Agents of the South Manchurian railroad, it is said, are trying to induce the railroad officials to make Dulay the Oriental terminus of the line.
