IT IS THE PEOPLE AGAINST THE BARREL

The campaign for Statement No. 1 goes on with increasing intensity in Marion county. All efforts to drive people into line for the old barrel plan of electing United States senators is proving unavailing.

The better class of Republicans are going to vote for their choice among Republicans at the primary election April 17, and vote for STATEMENT NO. 1 CANDIDATES FOR THE LEGISLATURE TO CARRY THAT CHOICE INTO EFFECT.

Walter C. Winslow, who is managing the campaign for the Statement No. 1 candidates, is a bright young lawyer who was about to take a position in McNary Bros. law office.

At the request of the Salem Carpenters' union he became a candidate on Statement No. 1 and if elected will make a fight in the legislature AGAINST CONVICTS BEING EMPLOYED ON ANY PUBLIC BUILDINGS OR WORK THAT IS LET TO CONTRACT BY FREE LABOR.

Walter Winslow has pitted against him the keenest political machine workers in the state, who are fighting to overthrow Statement No. 1, and direct election of United States senators.

The machine have put up a ticket for the legislature on what is called the "party choice for United States senator," a pledge which is not contained in the primary law, and which is open to several interpretations.

Of course, its final interpretation will be whatever the machine says it shall be. IT MEANS THE RESORTATION OF THE OLD METHODS FROM WHICH THE PRIMARY LAW INTENDS TO DIVORCE THE ELECTION OF SENATORS.

The machine refuse to discuss the principle involved and refuse to meet Winslow and the Statement No. 1 men in the open.

If the people want to uphold the primary law they will vote for Statement No. 1 candidates.

The laboring men of this city are wanted by the Salem machine politicians to carry out their machine program, and send five men to the legislature TO SELECT A SENATOR WITH THE BARREL.

Laboring men who heard Senator Fulton's speech at the opera house heard a recital of the degradation and corruption that has prevailed in Oregon legislatures in the past under the barrel machine methods.

DO THEY WANT ANY MORE OF THAT SORT OF THING?

The laboring man is expected to go to the primary election and mark on the ballot his choice for United States senator. He is asked by the machine to nominate five representatives backed by the machine to overthrow his own choice for United States senator.

MODEL LICENSE ORDINANCE FRAMED

Mayor and City Council Reach a Business Agreement That is Satisfactory to All Interests in the City—Other Important Matters—Paving State Street Starts Next Week

PRINCIPAL POINTS IN SALEM'S NEW LIQUOR BILL

Table listing license fees: Saloon License \$600, Beer Hall License 400, Club License 300, Restaurant License 300, Wholesale Liquor Dealers License 100, Drugstores 200.

No saloon to be allowed within 400 feet of school. One saloon only to every 1000 persons. Bond to obey laws, \$500. No liquor to be sold in any bawdy house or dive; no back rooms. Clear, unobstructed glass front to saloons, 10 feet by 3 feet, five feet above sidewalk.

Salem now has the most modern liquor license ordinance of any city of the Pacific Coast as the result of the action of the council last night. It is only necessary to read this ordinance which is printed in full herewith: Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person within the corporate limits of the city of Salem, directly or indirectly, in person or by another, to open, keep or maintain any saloon, bar-room, tippling house or place where spirituous, vinous or malt liquors are kept for sale or barter or in any manner disposed of, any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors without having first obtained a license therefor; provided, however, wholesale liquor dealers shall be exempt from the payment of any such license.

Section 2. Any person desiring a license or licenses under the provisions of this ordinance shall present his or their application in writing to the common council not less than 12 days before the issuance of any such license, and 20 days before the time of expiration of the license sought to be continued, which application shall be duly sworn to as the truth of the statements therein made by the person making such application. Such application shall state the street and number or streets and numbers where the proposed place or places of business are to be conducted, the nature of such business or businesses; the number of such places and licenses desired, and whether the selling of such liquor or liquors is proposed to be carried on in connection with any hotel, restaurant or other business, and shall be accompanied by a bond for each such place proposed to be conducted, executed by the applicant, with two or more sufficient sureties, or a surety or guaranty company, of the city of Salem, in the sum of \$500.00 good and lawful money of the United States, conditioned that he or they will keep an orderly house, and that he will not permit any unlawful gaming, or riotous or disorderly conduct in or about his house, and that he will not open or permit to be opened his place of business for the purpose of traffic in liquors on the first day of the week commonly called Sunday, and will not in any way dispose of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors on said day; that he will not give, sell or supply spirituous, malt or vinous liquors to a minor, or habitual drunkard, nor to any person at the time in a drunken or intoxicated condition, or to a person declared by ordinance to be a common drunkard, and that he will not permit a minor to frequent his place of business during the continuance of his license; said bond to be approved by the mayor; and in case of a violation of any of the foregoing conditions by any person giving such bond, it shall be the duty of the common council in the name and for the benefit of said city of Salem, to prosecute such person or persons and the sureties thereon for the breach of any such conditions of said bond.

Section 3. The following persons shall not be entitled to take out a license provided for in this ordinance: the keeper or proprietor of any bawdy house, gaming or gambling house or disorderly house or houses or place resorted to for the purpose of smoking opium, or the keeper or proprietor of any house or place or bar-room or tippling house or saloon resorted to for gambling, or for the purpose of prostitution or frequented by lewd or dissolute women; or the keeper or proprietor of any bar-room or tippling house or saloon conducted directly or indirectly in connection with any bawdy house or contrary to the laws of the state of Oregon, or gambling house or place resorted to for the purpose of smoking opium or persons who have been within one year convicted of a violation of this ordinance, or who have ever been convicted of a felony under the federal laws, or the laws of any state, or who are not well disposed toward the good order and peace of society and who are not of good moral character.

Section 4. Every person applying for a license, and whose application therefor has been approved by said common council and his or their said bond approved as hereinbefore provided, before the issuance of any such license shall pay to the city recorder a fee for each license as follows: If for the sale, barter or delivery of any spirituous, vinous and malt liquors in a saloon or bar-room or the barter or sale of the liquor in any other place not hereinbefore provided for, the applicants shall pay the sum of \$600 per annum, in semi-annual payments in advance. If for the sale, barter or delivery of malt liquors only, in a saloon or bar-room or the barter or sale of

LIVED IN UMATILLA 40 YEARS

Mrs. Terry Succumbs to an Attack of Paralysis—Mother of Mrs. T. B. Swearingen.

Mrs. M. A. Terry, who has been a resident of Umatilla county for nearly half a century, died April 7 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. T. B. Swearingen in Pendleton. Mrs. Terry was 57 years of age and death resulted from a stroke of paralysis which she suffered last Saturday while washing the dinner dishes, though she had been a semi-invalid for a number of years.

Mrs. Terry was born in Illinois in 1851 and came to Umatilla county in 1865, where she has since resided. She was the mother of six children, only two of whom are now alive. Mrs. T. B. Swearingen is the one residing in this county, while another daughter lives in Seattle.
