The first sign of possible defeat for the Hughes plan was seen in the announcement that at a caucus of delegates held last night it was decided to vote unanimously against any resolution endorsing the governor or for the nomination. William Ward, national committeeman, declared however, that the objection of the delegates to such resolutions was merely formal, adding that no fight beyond a mere protest will be made in the convention.

O'HARA BROTHERS TAKE OUT OVER TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS IN THREE DAYS.

Sonora, Cal., April 11.—Great excitement has been occasioned in this vicinity by the discovery of tons of gold in the pocket mine located a mile north of Sonora. In the space of three days O'Hara brothers, who are operating the property, have taken out gold valued at \$200,000. The report is that the metal was cut out with a cold chisel and that there is more gold in the pocket than rock.

LOTTERY SWINDLERS ARE PROSECUTED

Chicago, April 11.—United States District Judge Bethen today fined 29 lottery agents amounts varying from \$50 to \$5000 each on pleas of guilty and promises to quit business forever. Among those fined were David H. Jones, Chicago, \$6000, and John Minor, \$1000. The fines were promptly paid. It was charged by the prosecution that the defendants used the Old Reliable Gunrany Loan & Trust company as a lottery. Detectives who have been gathering evidence against the men say that Jones who is 79 years old, made a fortune of \$2,000,000 out of the scheme. The books and other property of the concern were confiscated by the police.

MURDERERS OF MARSHAL

Seattle, Wash., April 11.—Three men, suspected of being members of the gang of five which on Thursday night fatally wounded Marshal Harry Miller of Kent, passed through Renton at an early hour today evidently headed for Seattle. The night marshal at Renton accosted the strangers in the railroad yards at that town, and becoming suspicious at their appearance, he asked them who they were and what they were doing.

FREEK PROFESSOR WEDS.

Canton, O., April 11.—Professor Oscar Lovell Triggs, he of free love fame, who was expelled from the University of Chicago because of the notoriety that was his after his declaration that John D. Rockefeller is as great a man as Shakespeare, has taken until himself a bride. Miss Ada Beall Cox, 26 years old, whose mother lives in Canton.

Although the couple married in Turlock, Cal., where Triggs is writing and farming, on Tuesday, no announcement was made of it until today, when the mother of the bride broke the news. Mrs. Cox is a former student of the University of Chicago, where she was one of Professor Triggs' pupils. She has been interested in settlement work in Philadelphia and New York, and is a graduate of the Canton high school. She went to Turlock only a week ago.

Triggs, was divorced from his first wife on August 24, 1907, after a trial that was replete with sensational features, owing to the free love ideas that the professor upheld. He gained his first notoriety by decrying the famous men in literature and comparing them unfavorably with such men as Rockefeller. Because of these utterances he was dismissed from the oil king's university in Chicago. Triggs and his bride will live on the ranch at Turlock.

To Punish Floretta.

New York, April 11.—Mrs. Jero Cooke, wife of the Hemstead pastor who eloped a year ago with Floretta Whaley and who is now living in California, announces through her attorney that she will plan as long as she lives to keep her husband in disgrace refusing to give him a divorce.
