GOMPERS' WARNING.

Samuel Gompers' president of the American Federation of Labor, and one of the strong figures in American industrial economy of the day, has given the country, through one of its greatest organic committees in congress, fair warning that the labor element of the nation is becoming reactive under LONG DENIED AND ESSENTIAL LEGISLATION in the matter of its rights to in derogation and defeat of certain trade movements against organized labor.

He claims, for his constituency, the right to combine for the lessening of the hours of labor, for the increasing of wage scale, etc., etc., and declares that it was agreed, during the days in which the Sherman anti-trust law was being framed, that these exemptions WERE TO BE MADE IN BEHALF OF THE WORKING PEOPLE OF THE COUNTRY.

And his claim is practically admitted by the judiciary committee of the house now in charge of the amendments to that famous law.

This being the case, there is justice in his claim and perhaps IT WERE WELL TO HEED NOW WHAT WAS THEN IGNORED.

The principle involved is indisputably the laborer's right, quite as much as it is the financier's, and it is one of those wise issues that make good fighting material.

The laborer as a unit, with such a plea, may present a front in politics and at the polls, one of these days, that will open the eyes of the country to THE REAL POWER LYING LATENT IN THEIR HANDS; a power but once demonstrated, will become a leverage undreamed of in its subsequent demands and achievements.

A CHEAP PARCELS POST ON RURAL DELIVERY ROUTES.

The principal objection that has been made to a cheap parcels post in this country that it would favor the department stores in large cities at the expense of the country merchants—DOES NOT APPLY TO THE RURAL DELIVERY PARCELS POST BILL NOW BEFORE CONGRESS.

That objection may not be sound, but it need not be discussed in connection with the present measure, known as the Burnham bill (S. B. 5122).

The pending bill provides for the establishment of a special parcels post system on rural delivery routes but only for packages originating on the route wherein the delivery is made or in the postoffice FROM WHICH THE CARRIER SETS OUT.

The charges provided are 5 cents for the first pound, and 2 cents for each additional pound or fraction thereof, up to eleven pounds; for two ounces or less, 1 cent; over two ounces and up to four ounces, 2 cents; over four ounces and up to eight ounces, 3 cents; over eight ounces and up to twelve ounces, 4 cents; over twelve ounces and up to one pound, 5 cents.

AS THIS WOULD BE STRICTLY A LOCAL SERVICE, a package originating at any other postoffice than the distributing point for the rural route on which the person addressed resides must pay the regular rate of parcel postage, which is one cent per ounce.

And at the regular rate the limit of weight is four pounds, on which the cost of carriage would be 64 cents, while under the terms of the Burnham bill a parcel weighing eleven pounds WOULD BE CARRIED OVER A RURAL DELIVERY FOR 25 CENTS.

Under the existing law carriers are not allowed to transport or deliver anything but mail matter, although the law is said to be frequently violated in this particular. And the high merchandise rate of a cent an ounce, with the limit of weight four pounds, makes the rural delivery little used by merchants or their customers in local trade.

Undoubtedly the excessively high postal rates on merchandise were imposed and have been maintained chiefly THROUGH THE POWERFUL INFLUENCE OF THE EXPRESS COMPANIES at Washington, as such rates enable them successfully to compete with the postal service. But as the express companies are not much interested in rural delivery they may not bring their power to bear against the Burnham measure.

The Merchants' Association of New York, which formerly opposed the Burnham bill, is now advocating its passage, on the ground that it will benefit the country merchants and prove a great convenience to farmers.

THIS BILL IS A STEP IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION, and, if passed, should pave the way to more fair and liberal rates of postage on parcels sent between any two postoffices in the United States.

MARSHAL McMILLAN

FINED FIFTY DOLLARS

A. G. McMillan, city marshal and chief of police of Silverton, was today found guilty by a jury and sentenced by Judge Burnett in the circuit court to pay a fine of \$50, or spend 25 days in the county jail, for failing to serve a warrant issued by the police judge for the arrest of C. N. Matlock for opening his saloon in violation of the law. McMillan chose to pay the fine and escape staying in jail.

Matlock was found guilty on the first ballot by the same jury that tried McMillan during an interim in the latter's trial and was also fined \$50.

McMillan set up as his defense that he did not arrest the saloon keeper on instructions from the city council not to do so. He also stated that he was about to serve the warrant when told not to by Mayor Julius Wolfe.

The attention of the jury, however was directed to the fact that McMillan was elected and not appointed by the council, and, therefore, did not have to obey their orders. Assistant District Attorney C. L. McNary prosecuted the case for the state and attorney George G. Bingham appeared for the defendant.
