Railroad Commission—

The railroad commission is in receipt of a letter from the Oregon Railway & Navigation company, in answer to the complaint of a shipper that stock on one occasion was kept on the road from Portland to Sheridan for 24 hours without water, stating that the extra time in transit was caused by there being no Sunday train on the west side division to Sheridan. They also claim that they are not required to furnish water for the stock, that that is the shipper's lookout. A complaint was received from Albany by the commission asking that the Southern Pacific company be compelled to install a station at that point.

License Is Law—

The liquor ordinance passed by the council last Thursday night has become a law,—all very quietly. Mayor Rodgers signed the new bill last Saturday and returned the same to Recorder Moores.

BITTER BATTLE OF SOULS

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Chicago, April 14.—"In my opinion, Christianity is in the most grievous crisis of its history. I do not refer to controversies in newspapers and on the streets, but to the quiet, bitter battle which serious men are fighting out in their own souls. It is the dying of the old faith which Christianity is experiencing."

In these words George Burman Foster, of the divinity school of the University of Chicago, strikes the key note of remarkable essay, "concerning the religious basis of ethics" in the American Journal of Theology for April. Activity of the churches and their apparent prosperity, according to the daring theologian, are only throes which precede dissolution.

PORTLAND MAN HIDING THE MONEY

San Francisco, April 14.—The police are not quite satisfied that Frank Kubick, a wealthy Portland contractor, who reported that he had been held up and robbed of \$7500 last night, is telling the truth and their suspicions are strengthened by the statement made by an attorney who figured in Kubick's divorce suit. According to this statement, Kubick is endeavoring to avoid paying his divorced wife \$6000 alimony and \$1000 counsel fees; it is intimated that Kubick instead of having been robbed, turned the money over to his brother, who also resides in Portland.

PORTLAND PROMOTER WHO COMES TO GRIEF

Portland, Or., April 14.—S. V. Davidor, a prominent promoter of real estate and mining ventures in Portland, and who was recently accused by Chief of Police Janssen, of Milwaukee, Wis., with having a prison record in the middle west, was arrested early this morning charged with embezzlement by bailie by Gregory E. Metten of Portland. He asserts that Davidor secured a number of lots from him on a promise to sell them for him and then fraudulently transferred them to other parties.
