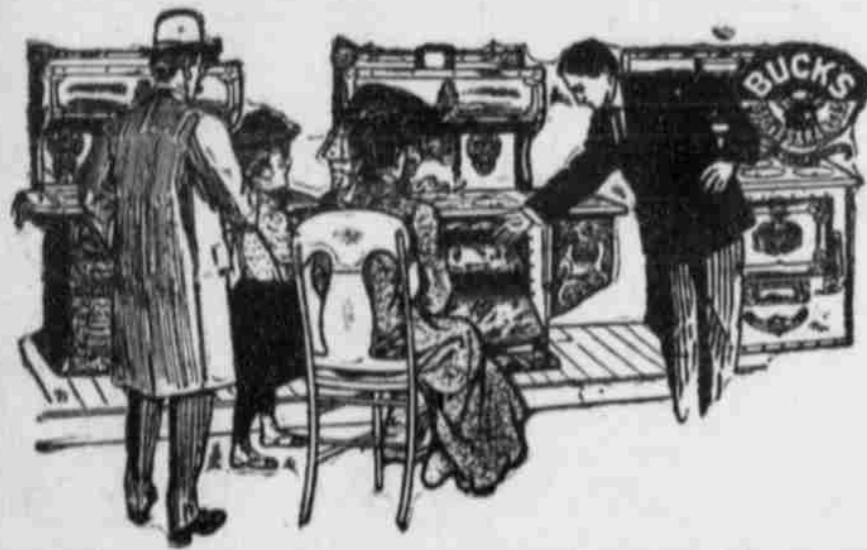

Imaginary line that divides the Mexican from "home" waters. From Point Loma the 16 battleships, steaming in perfect formation, could easily be picked out. They were making good time, the 16 lines of black smoke stretching far behind them. As they approached the entrance to the bay the signal was flashed from the Connecticut to steam on a slow bell. With the precision of a well aimed bullet the flagship, the blue flag of Rear Admiral Thomas, acting commander in chief, flying from the peak, turned into the channel.

The ships hardly had come to anchor when a committee, headed by Director General Clayton, Mayor Forward and other prominent citizens of San Diego on board a launch, steamed swiftly out to the flagship to pay their respects to Rear Admiral Thomas. Meanwhile, scores of other craft, loaded to the guards with sight-seers and relatives and friends of the men on board the battleships, hovered around the big fighters.

HEIRS TO ESTATE

WORTH \$200,000,000

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Vancouver, B. C., April 14.—Part heir to an estate valued at \$200,000,000. This is the news received by three brothers, one of whom resides in Vancouver. These men are S. Becker, David Becker and Isaac Becker, the latter working in a logging camp up north.

Previous to the revolutionary war two brothers named Becker drifted to America and settled in Maryland. They received from the British government large tracts of land in Maryland and New York and by various real estate dealings accumulated vast wealth, most of which they converted into valuable property. One of the brothers died leaving no heirs. The surviving brother continued negotiating big deals and in the course of his business leased a number of his large tracts of land for a long term of years.

During the war the property of Becker was confiscated by the rebels and before George Washington crossed the Delaware the penniless man followed his brother to the grave, while members of his family, suddenly reduced to poverty, were left to shift for themselves. As they grew older they gradually drifted apart and some came to seek fortunes in Canada. The property, it is said, has reached a value of \$200,000,000.

William Wilson, a lawyer who has an office in Woodstock, is acting for several of the heirs who live at Walsingham Center while other Ontario lawyers are working along similar lines for heirs of the property who live in Toronto and Longport.

Witnesses in Ross Trial.

Circuit Judge Burnett this morning on the petition of Assistant District Attorney Haney of Portland, issued an order requiring 21 witnesses to be present at the beginning of the trial of J. Torburn Ross, George H. Hill, John E. Althison and T. T. Burkhardt, indicted officials of the Title Guarantee & Trust company of Portland. They will first be ordered to appear at the beginning of the Ross case proper next Tuesday. The following is a list of witnesses so summoned: R. S. Howard, Jr., receiver of the defunct bank; State Treasurer Steele, Attorney General Crawford, M. B. Rankin and F. B. Holbrook of Portland, who borrowed money from the bank; Senator Smith, a sitant to Attorney General Crawford; George Black and J. W. Ferguson, expert accountants; E. H. Colts and Ben. W. Alcott, expert bookkeepers; Charles H. Kopf, acting assistant treasurer of the bank; Douglas Lawson, head bookkeeper; J. F. Shields, assistant trust officer; S. P. Linscomb, bonding department; Willis P. McGuire, clerk banking department, and Clyde C. Beyers, E. L. Dekater, Ira P. E. Reynolds, C. E. Fuller, Ray Wennerberg, C. Herbert Willison, George H. Hannon and D. D. Conlon, bookkeepers.
