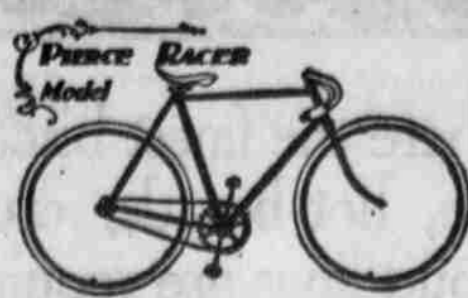

TRUSTY CONVICTS ESCAPE

SECOND SUCCESSFUL ATTEMPT OF OUTDOOR MEN COMPELS AUTHORITIES TO PUT ON A NIGHT GUARD.

Superintendent C. W. James of the state penitentiary has ordered a night guard placed over the "trusty" convicts at work clearing the land and laying the drains and water pipes on the site of the home for the feeble minded being constructed on the old Coleman ranch, in order to prevent a recurrence of Sunday's incident, when Bozo Dopovich, Phillip Lamont, Ed. Boyd and Casper Clinton escaped at 8:30 o'clock just six days after convict George A. Gardiner escaped from the same place in a similar manner.

The four men, who escaped Sunday night, were sleeping in the same room on the second floor of a farm house in which the convicts are sheltered and they all got up together at 8:30, slipped noiselessly down the stairs and had made their way over three-quarters of a mile of fields to the railroad track, jumped a passing freight train and escaped before Guard Charles Tarpley, who was not on duty learned of the escape. He immediately telephoned the penitentiary and guards were sent scurrying through the open land and shrubbery to the Coleman farm with two bloodhounds. The animals quickly took the escaping men's scent and went direct to the railroad track, but a tele-

phone communication with the depot revealed that both a north and south bound freight train had passed about the time the convicts made their escape.

The four men attempted to persuade convict Frank Smith, who was the only other occupant of the room they occupied, to join them, but he refused to do so.

This is the second successful escape from the site since the work was begun there about a month ago. George Gardiner making his escape in the same way as the men did Sunday night on the Monday previous. All five men who escaped last week were serving a one year term for larceny. There is a state law compelling the penitentiary to furnish the labor for the draining, ditching and clearing of land for all state buildings, and escapes are nearly always made when the men are put to work near brush, or in fact any place in the open. There have been in the neighborhood of 23 men employed on the feeble minded home site and the state's appropriation to the penitentiary permits of very little expense in the maintaining of guards. The men working on the outside as those working on this site were, are given all the privileges of free men. They sleep as they please in the house on the farm without guards. Hereafter, however, Superintendent James has decided to cut his force down at the penitentiary in order to furnish another man at the feeble minded home site.

Directly after the escape telephone messages were sent to all police officers in cities along the line of railroad, notifying them of the escape, and descriptive circulars were also hurried out.
