GOODE TRIAL IS NOW ON

BEFORE A JURY

NORTH SALEM FREE METHODIST

The trial of Miss Lulu Goode, her
sisters, Mrs. Nettie Rhodes and Mrs.
Roy Phillips, Jasper Goode and Roy
Phillips on the charge of horsewhip-
ping Presiding Elder Wm. N. Coffey

HUNTING A JOB FOR TEDDY

AND HIS BIG STICK

TO BECOME CHANCELLOR OF AN
UNIVERSITY TO BE FOUNDED
BY IRON KING CARNEGIE AND
HIS STEEL TRUST MILLIONS.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Portland, Or., April 15.—That
President Roosevelt is to be given
the position of chancellor of a great
"national university" which is to be
endowed by Andrew Carnegie for
\$25,000,000 and upon which the
plans are now being perfected and
will be formally announced im-
mediately following the Chicago Repub-
lican national convention, is the sub-
stance of a dispatch received by the
Evening Journal of this city from its
special correspondent in Washing-
ton.

The information, it is asserted,
comes from one whose station is such
that the statement is invested with
authority.
Carnegie, declares this gentleman,
has been prevailed upon to make the
gigantic endowment by Secretary of
State Root. The plans as far as they
have gone plan to establish a general
university in Washington upon the
co-educational basis with the Ameri-
can college system carefully blended
with the German ideal of specializa-
tion in order that a wide general cul-
ture can be obtained upon which to
base the students specialized knowl-
edge. Many prominent educators in
America are now being consulted in
regard to the plan.

It is declared that the plan of the
President at the present time is to
go abroad and spend a year in travel.
By the time he returns the university
will be sufficiently advanced to allow
him to proceed with the details of
the organization.

BATTLE WITH THE MORO OUTLAWS

Manila, April 15.—Two members
of the constabulary were killed and
three soldiers wounded at the out-
come of a recent fight with Moro out-
laws on the island of Mindanao, ac-
cording to private dispatches received
here.
