 and Attorney L. H. McMahon, appearing as special prosecutor, re-called Henry Bell, John Knight and A. Liaton. This left the jury as follows: Otto Wilson, J. N. Skalf, W. Roland, A. W. Drager, Hal Patton and A. L. Frazure. The court then ordered a recess until 3 o'clock to enable Constable Johnson to summon the jury.

The entire Goode family appeared in court, the young ladies smiling and the young men looking on. Constable Johnson left to summon the jury. Presiding Elder Coffey had not yet appeared up to the time the jury was summoned. Rev. Roper, who escaped the whipping intended for him by jumping through a rear window at the time, was also conspicuous by his absence.

It is possible that the entire row will break up in a love feast, as both sides appear to think they have had quite too much notoriety. In the meanwhile Chief of Police Gibson

goes about town with a warrant tucked away in his inside pocket for the arrest of Coffey on a charge of assault preferred by Jack Goode, who has not yet recovered from the dangerous injury resulting from a kick by the belligerent, Rev. Coffey.

to exert every possible influence for peace.

For one thing, Downing street can't see how Britain stands to profit by a division of China between Japan and Russia. For there is increasing uneasiness at the threat of Japanese expansion.

Englishmen are becoming convinced that the Mikado is casting longing eyes toward India. Australia is undiguisedly in a state of panic.

"You cannot keep a colony by flying a flag over it," declared Premier Price of Australia, at a meeting only yesterday of the Austral-Asia chamber of commerce in London. "If you are going to keep Australia, someone has got to stand up and fight for it."

Extensive acquisitions by Japan in China would naturally bridge Nippon a step nearer to both India and Australia.

England is getting more and more nervous, too, lest the Anglo-Japanese alliance drag the occidental half of the partnership into some international complication in which Britain will have everything to lose and nothing whatever to gain.

The people, if not the government, are plainly beginning to think Japanese diplomacy has become altogether too aggressive and to wish heartily that the alliance had never been thought of.

Of, course, China's anti-Japanese boycott is the latest subject of worry. It looks as if the Chinese were going to make good their threat of damaging Japanese commerce \$300,000,000 worth in retaliation for the humiliation of the Tatsu Maru incident.

The boycott extends from bankers and noblemen to coolies. Women and children are enlisted in it. It promises soon to become of national scope.

Captain Woo King Ying, the Chinese officer who seized the Tatsu and was degraded by his government for doing it, is the most popular man in China. Japan is ready insisting that the movement be suppressed. The Chinese government cannot suppress, England sympathizes with it. Britons think the Japanese were all wrong in the Tatsu matter and that China is justified in getting even.

Another threat of trouble is seen in the recent Japanese attack on the United States consulate at Mukden. Investigation proves that a Japanese postman with a letter for Consul General Straight tried to enter by a private door, was repulsed by the consulate servants, but several countrymen to help him, broke in, beat a number of the servants and finally forced the consulate to call on the Chinese police for help.

The matter might have been easily settled but for Japanese Consul General Kato's intimation that the dispute was trivial and his delay in investigating. Though he has now ordered a court of inquiry, it is believed its work will amount to little more than a "whitewash."

Mitchell in 1897 and had offered "financial inducements" to ex-Representative H. A. Webster to secure his vote for himself in the senatorial campaign of 1902.

He declared that Heney used his "persuasive powers" on Webster to obtain the affidavit alleging the last charge and that Webster was angry at him because he had not been able to have Webster appointed master fish warden.

Fulton dwelt upon the fact that Heney had received \$54,000 for his Oregon prosecutions from the government and he declared he was merely the mouthpiece for a political cabal who were attempting to hurt his reputation in Oregon.

Following Fulton, who spoke for about an hour and a half, ex-Attorney General of the United States George H. Williams, made a short address in which he supported Fulton's candidacy for re-nomination to the senate.

### How Fulton Killed His Man.

Francis J. Heney may have killed his man in Arizona but in that he has none the better of United States Senator Charles W. Fulton, whose political scalp Heney has been seeking in this state during the last few days. When Heney came to Portland Fulton left for eastern Oregon. This caused some to say that the Oregon senator lacked the courage to meet Heney. But in November, 1898, Fulton shot and fatally wounded Charles Wilbur at Seaside, Oregon, after Wilbur had shot and killed Sheriff Jack Williams, fatally wounded Deputy Sheriff Jake Lammers and made a desperate attempt on Fulton's life. The end came after a grim and desperate a struggle as is

recorded in the lurid annals of outlawry in the west.

In matters of courage Fulton is the prosecutor's equal, his friends declare.

Fulton had gone with the sheriff, his deputy and a constable to arrest Wilbur, who was charged with burning Fulton's summer home at Seaside. Articles belonging to Fulton were found in Wilbur's solitary home. Wilbur had a local reputation for being a bad man and always carried two revolvers and a rifle. He would never allow the rifle to be out of his reach. After a parley he met the Fulton party on the beach. Fulton, with the constable, went inside the house to secure the articles which he claimed as his. While on this errand he heard three shots. He rushed to the door and saw Williams laying upon the sand dead and Lammers struggling with Wilbur. As Fulton dashed up to the struggling pair, Lammers cried out, "He has killed me Fulton, get him."

Fulton clinched with Wilbur and they both went down. In the fight that followed he managed to jerk a revolver from Wilbur and using the butt end, he struck Wilbur over the head. Believing him unconscious, he crawled off the prostrate form and reached out for Wilbur's rifle which was laying close by. As he secured it he heard Wilbur spring to his feet. When he turned the desperado was reaching for his revolver which he pulled from his coat pocket. Not having time to take shoulder aim Fulton shot from the hip and the bullet struck Wilbur in the breast. Wilbur turned to run and Fulton shot again striking him in the face. With this the wounded man fell in a heap and Fulton left him there in charge of the constable, while he went into town for medical assistance. When he returned with physicians Wilbur was dead and the constable who was guarding him was laying near him badly wounded in the groin. In his death agony Wilbur had raised

his revolver and taken a final shot at the constable.
