Claudius Pottee died April 12, 1908, at his home near Mill City, after a short illness from pneumonia. Just one month before he had returned to Salem, where he formerly lived and was well known, and attended the 40th wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. R. R. Ryan. Pottee was born September 22, 1817, near Somerford, Madison county, Ohio, and was married to Mrs. Averill, Ulysses, and Grant M., in Columbus, Ohio, and two daughters living, Newton at Central, Neb., and John M. at Somerford, and one sister, Mrs. Lizzié Ryan, of Salem. He enlisted as a private in Co. C, 154th Ohio volunteer infantry in 1861, and was discharged honorably at close of service. He removed to Nebraska in 1865, and came to Salem in 1891, where he lived until September 28, 1907, when he was united in marriage with Mrs. M. E. Mariels, where he has since made his home at Fox Hill, Linn county. His wife survives him, although very ill and unable to console him in his dying hours. He was surrounded by loving friends in his last hours of suffering and death, and his departure was mourned sincerely by all who knew him as a true man, one of the noblemen who was not surprised in this world for his goodness and kindness of heart. He was ready to serve a friend as he was ready to serve his country. He loved his labor as himself, and while he was a poor man, he was rich in the treasures that go to make good citizenship. He won the love of all his children and they cared for him with a devotion that has few examples in life.

has to be expended upon one job more money than would be raised in any district in the county. I call attention to one instance of this kind where a fill of about one thousand feet in length was made. I could cite many similar jobs in cutting down hills and putting in break-waters for road protection if I desired to do so. It is necessary that these large jobs be done; they could not all be done in one year; some can be done in one year and some in another, and eventually the entire county would be gotten over with permanent work. Mr. Jones' policy would expend the money all over the county in such dribs that no permanent work would be done, whatever. Each was the policy prior to my term in office and we have nothing to show for it.

Cut Down the Bridges.

We have shortened up more than five miles of bridges during my term of office and have made many concrete culverts that will last for all time to come. We have used many tons of powder in clearing roads of stumps and have lessened many of the grade by cutting down steep hills and have made our bridges much heavier and stronger, all of which have cost money, many of which will not have to be done again soon and some is done for all time to come.

When I went into office there were no tools or machinery to speak of to work with. We now are very well equipped with suitable road making machinery, and with the same effort put forth during the next few years that has been put forth during my term of office would make a much better showing than it has in the past. We have worn out more shovels, picks, scrapers and plows, since I have been in office than were ever used during the history of the county prior to our administration.

The county commissioners have heartily co-operated with me in all county business and are entitled to equal credit for the same.

In conclusion, I would say that EVERY CENT OF MONEY HAS BEEN HONESTLY EXPENDED and can be readily accounted for, of which there is an accurate record kept in the county clerk's and treasurer's office, notwithstanding the fact that Messrs. M. L. Jones and W. W. Hall have stated repeatedly to various people in this county that there has been a great graft by me in the expenditure of county funds.

I, therefore, now CHALLENGE each of them, or any one else, to show where there has been one cent of money misappropriated or any graft, whatever, in the transaction of business pertaining to my office during the entire time that I have occupied the same, covering a period of almost eight years.

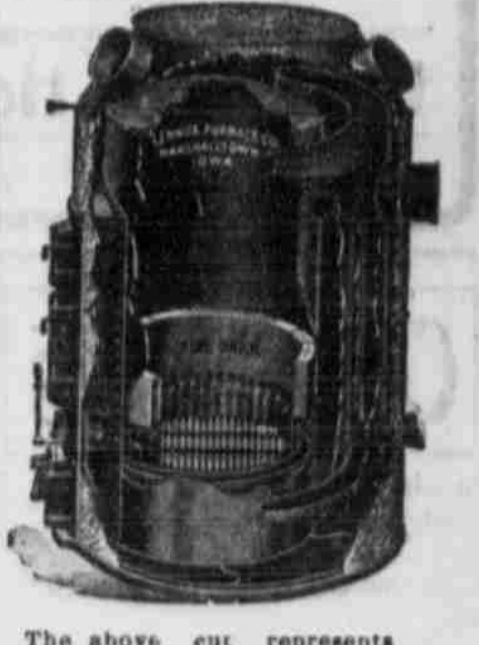
