#### GOODE SISTERS CLEARED

#### ON FIRST CHARGE

#### OF HAVING DISTURBED A RELIGIOUS MEETING—MAY HAVE TO ANSWER ANOTHER CHARGE FOR ASSAULT ON MINISTER.

Lulu Gode, her sister, Mrs. Nettie Rhodes, Jasper Goode, Roy Phillips and his wife, one of the Goode sisters, have been acquitted of the charge against them of disturbing a meeting gathered for religious worship for horsewhipping Presiding Elder Wm. N. Coffey, of the Free Methodist church in North Salem on Saturday night, April 4. The jury consumed

about 20 minutes in arriving at this decision. The defendants, with the exception of Mrs. Phillips, will be re-arrested this afternoon on another charge—probably assault.

**The Goode Trial.**  
Fireworks were more than plentiful in the trial yesterday, and at times it looked as if there would be a free for all fracas. Ministers, at the insistence of prosecuting attorney McMahon, repeated oaths said to have been uttered by others at the time of the trouble on the porch and which expressions would not look well in print. At one instance during the session, when Rev. H. A. Walter of Newberg, the prosecuting witness, testified that Lulu Goode had struck the pastor's wife full in the face, it was too much for Jack Goode, who became so incensed that he forgot himself for a minute and with a resounding thump on his knee exclaimed so as to be heard distinctly in all parts of the courtroom. "The liar." At the same time he jumped from his seat as if to administer corporeal

mass to the door, those remaining, among whom were the Reverends Coffey, Cook, Roper and Walters, and several others, preceded by Murphy went to the door. He, Murphy, went out, down the stairs and out on to the sidewalk. He there turned around and saw the two Goode girls standing on the steps with something in their hands. Then Jasper Goode and Roy Phillips, with their coats off, the former striking at Coffey over the heads of some man who intervened while Phillips struck at another man. Before the mix-up got worse, Coffey was jerked back into the church. He claimed to have heard Jack Goode shout, "Get around to the windows and don't let Roper out."

Murphy was again cross-examined by Kaiser and stated the services began at 7:30 o'clock and were through at 9:30 just before the fight began. Rev. Cook was next called and testified that as he came out of the doors with the others, Rev. Coffey threw up his hands to protect himself

#### MISS ORA ROBEY KILLED

#### YOUNG WOMAN WELL KNOWN IN SALEM WHO REMOVED TO MARSHFIELD LAST FALL VICTIM OF SHOOTING AFFAIR.

Marshfield, Or., April 16.—John Grill, aged 23, late last night shot and killed Ora Robey, a young woman with whom he had been going, and then turning the gun on himself, ended his own life. Nothing was known of the murder and suicide until the bodies were found about 1:30 o'clock this morning.

The tragedy occurred on a bridge near the home of the young woman. Jealousy is supposed to have been the cause of the tragedy.

Miss Robey was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Roby and very well known in this city. She was employed for several seasons in the Gile & Co. fruit packing house. The family removed to Marshfield last fall.

punishment on the pastor, but several of his relatives and friends held him in his seat.

The first witness to be called was J. E. Murphy, proprietor of the tile works in N. Salem. In reply to questions from the Prosecuting Attorney McMahon, he stated that he had been a witness to the whole affray; that he had seen Jasper Goode rush forward up the steps to attack Coffey; that Coffey had not struck a single blow and that Jasper Goode and his sisters and brother-in-law, Roy Phillips, had been the aggressive belligerents during the entire fracas. Under the cross-examination of Attorney Kaiser, he remained firm and stated

and did not strike anyone. Cook saw Jasper Goode rushing forward to strike Coffey and he, Cook, threw himself between them when he received a stunning blow behind his right ear, and he next picked himself up from the ground three feet below the level of the porch. He stated that he saw Coffey bleeding just over the right eye from a bad cut. Cook then heard Roy Phillips sing out, "Let me have another chance at him."

Rev. Coffey was then called to the stand and, after some preliminary questions was required to produce his coat, vest and glasses worn on the occasion. The first two were still

that he saw everything and nothing could have escaped him. He was probably mistaken, as Coffey, himself, afterwards testified that he had pushed Lulu Goode from the porch. Murphy testified in regard to the condition of the meeting, as to its being a religious one at the time, which is the point on which the non-suit was argued, in substance about as follows, and this testimony was practically the same as given by the rest of the prosecution's witnesses. He stated that church had let out, but that there were some remaining for the purpose of conducting a business meeting and were about to start, when Stella Roper, daughter of Rev. Roper, came hurriedly in from the front of the church and said, "there's a mob at the door." Thinking there would be safely in going in a solid
