LET THE LAWS BE STRICTLY OBEYED.

The Capital Journal has never been known to be cranky about the saloon business.

It is rated by the fanatical prohibitionist as always ON THE SIDE OF WHAT HE CALLS "WHISKEY."

Hence those who are in the liquor business will not take offence at what we are going to say, because it comes from anyone who has been counted their enemy.

The Capital Journal believes in regulation of the traffic and this city HAS NOW ADOPTED A MODEL LICENSE LAW.

But we are going to make the suggestion that those engaged in the liquor business are more interested in the strict enforcement of that law than anyone else.

The new license ordinance should be enforced in the spirit and letter if the liquor business is to have any legal existence in this city.

There should not be the slightest attempt to violate any of the provisions of that license ordinance and THE CITY OFFICIALS SHOULD ENFORCE THE LAW AND PROMPTLY CANCEL ANY PERMIT and prosecute any saloon, drugstore, clubhouse, hotel or restaurant, or red light house found violating any feature of the law.

Because liberal-minded people have demanded fair treatment of the saloons, and have stood out against prohibition measures is no reason WHY THEY WILL WINK AT ANY VIOLATION OF THE LAWS AS NOW MADE.

We heartily endorse the following from the Astoria Budget as pertinent to this subject, and commend its careful reading to our friends who are engaged in retailing liquor in any form:

"Law is the first thing we humans learn. From the cradle to the grave it is omnipresent, unescapable, compelling; natural law, organic law, the codes of the family, the home, society, all are directed unerringly across our paths and for our good. We discriminate among them, resent many, despise a few, and break all we may with any sort of safety. But that safety upon which we count is an intangible thing; it is but momentary; every broken law brings its measure of penalty sooner or later, whether we recognize the reprisal or not. There is but one rational course open for the normally decent citizen: Strict obedience to the law!"

Illinois has recently cast 1100 of

her citizens out of business, the saloon business, because the major number of them would not obey the law of the state in relation to the business; over 800 precincts in 102 counties "went dry," with several other hundreds on the "feather edge," because certain groups refused to live within the statutes as applied to this business; and this did not include the mighty city of Chicago; but it did include dozens of the largest cities and towns of the state outside that metropolis.

"The lesson is a sharp one, and ought to sink deep in the consciousness of saloon men all over the country, Astoria included. The people are behind law; the law is theirs; and the code is various, it has more than one set of laws; if one set is ignored and treated with contempt, then another is put to motion that obviates disrespect and disobedience of the other, and does the work of negation and ouster completely and leaves the loser absolutely without recourse. The function of enforcing the law lies with the people's agents, the shrievalties, the constabulary, the police, and if they cannot and will not do their duty, then the people must find the next best expedient, which is to put the contumacious business out of business. They did it in Illinois and there is nothing to stop them from doing it in Astoria. 'A word to the wise!'"

KEEPING UP APPEARANCES.

Make your city advertise itself. The best beginning that a municipality can make, in considering an advertising campaign, is to look well to its appearance, attractiveness, and local improvements. The following suggestions are made:

Clean streets are an exceedingly valuable advertising asset. Let the main business streets be paved, if possible, otherwise surfaced and provided with drains. 'Cross walks should be provided and kept clean. Sidewalks, preferably of cement, should be maintained in good repair, should be of uniform construction and of uniform breadth and height above street level.

Light the business streets. Well lighted streets are probably the most valuable of all city improvements from the advertising standpoint. St. Paul, Minnesota's, way of light, Denver's great white way and Los Angeles with its blaze of lights, and similar lighting improvements on the down-town business streets have advertised those cities far and wide.

Wreck dilapidated buildings on business streets, if possible. Unattractive vacant business property may be hidden from view by high board fences. Campaign for a good business "front." A neat and attractive business section is an invitation to every visitor and means much when strangers talk of the city and discuss it with their friends.

The local hotel and the city's hotel accommodations are probably the most valuable of all its advertising assets. A good hotel builds up the city's reputation as good as nothing else can. It means that every traveling man will say when such a town is mentioned, "— is a fine town. It has a splendid hotel." A good hotel will bring traveling men and business men caught on the road into the city for the week-end.

Especially with the many beauty spots up the Coos River and delightful pleasure grounds and scenic attractions, are good hotels invaluable. The one chief obstacle to the build-

ing up of an enormous summer resort where nature intended to be the natural stopping place for summer visitors.

A public library speaks louder than anything else for the intelligence and culture of the people of the city or town.

Unattractive approaches to the water front are a great weakness. First impressions count with unusual force. Broad, clean, and attractive streets leading to, impress strangers as nothing else can with the push, progressiveness and public spirit of the citizens of the town or city.

Rest rooms for women attract country trade and are a talking point for the city or town.

Drinking fountains for persons, at convenient street corners, are inexpensive and a boon in hot weather. Fountains for horses and dogs are small matters, but they talk loudly for the public spirit of the municipality.

JOHNSON WILL NOT PULL OFF

Chicago, April 15.—"I don't think that my candidacy for the Presidential nomination is 'impertinent.' It is not of my seeking, but now that I am in I am going to make a determined, but nevertheless, dignified fight."

Stirred by literature sent out by Willis Abbott, William J. Bryan's personal representative at Washington, which intimated that Governor Johnson was an interloper and his candidacy was "impertinent," Johnson today removed his candidacy from a passive stage and declared himself a real active candidate, in the above terms.

"I did not become a candidate until friends and Democrats throughout the country insisted that I should and even now I think they could have chosen more wisely, but now that I am in the matter, I am not going to run away. My presence in the field is hardly impertinent, as I see it."

Notice to Improve a Portion of Broadway Street.

Notice is hereby given that at the regular meeting of the common council held April 6, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve Broadway street with full intersections, from the north line of North Mill creek to the north line of Madison street in the following manner:

By establishing a permanent grade on said street along the proposed line of improvement where not already established.

By placing the street railway track of the Oregon Electric Railway company where it extends along the proposed line of improvement in the center thereof.

By grading the roadway of said Broadway street between said points full width from curb to curb with full intersections to the proper subgrade.

The subgrade shall be one foot below the established grade and upon said subgrade shall be placed one foot of clean creek or river gravel, provided however, the space along the center of said street to be occupied by the said Oregon Electric Railway company shall be graveled in such a manner that the top of the rails of said company will be on a level with the established grade of said Broadway street.

The cost of placing said track in the center of said street and improving between the rails and one and one-half feet outside of the rails of the Oregon Electric Railway company, to be assessed on the franchise and property of said company.

The cost of said improvement, save and except the space between the rails and one and one-half feet outside of the rails of the Oregon Electric Railway company to be assessed on the abutting and adjacent property, as provided in the charter of said city.

Remonstrance against the above improvement may be filed within 20 days after the date of the first publication of this notice.
