#### CATHOLIC CHURCH REJECTS

#### TAINTED MARRIAGES

ARCH-BISHOP RYAN SAYS HER MILLIONS CANNOT ACCOMPLISH WHAT WAS DENIED TO HENRY THE EIGHTH OF ENGLAND.

 Philadelphia, April 18.—Pretty Helea Maloney, principal in two elopements and two marriages and a daughter of Martin Maloney, oil magnate and millionaire, has lost in her efforts to have the Catholic church sanction her re-marriage to Samuel Clarkson, a young Englishman.  
 Archbishop Ryan, in announcing today the attitude the church has taken in the matter, declared that what the millions of Henry VIII had failed to accomplish the millions of Martin Maloney could not do. Concerning Miss Maloney's first elopement and marriage to Herbert Osborne, a New York stock broker, the archbishop declared that if the wedding ceremony was performed in that case no power, not even that of the pope could bring about a further marriage ceremony which would be sanctioned by the church.

#### GOLDEN STATE IS HAPPY

#### TO WELCOME FLEET

LOS ANGELES DECORATED AS NEVER BEFORE—SOUTHERN PACIFIC RAILROAD MAKING FORTUNES CARRYING PEOPLE TO SEE THE NAVAL PARADE.

Los Angeles, Cal., April 18.—Los Angeles, decorated more gorgeously than for any other event in its history, awaits expectantly today the coming of Admiral Thomas' great globe girding armada of fighting ships, which are scheduled to sail into San Pedro harbor at 3 o'clock this afternoon. Before the sun had arisen this morning hundreds of eager persons thronged the downtown streets, many of them armed with lunch baskets and cameras and all intent upon getting to the sea at the earliest possible moment in order that they might secure vantage points from which to catch a glimpse of the greatest American naval squadron as it steamed up the coast.  
 By 8 o'clock every ocean-bound trolley car and steam railroad train was jammed to the guards. In and around the several stations from which cars are dispatched to San Pedro and Long Beach were tremendous crowds that taxed the ability

#### GREAT PEOPLE'S VICTORY

#### ALL OVER OREGON

TWO STATEMENT NO 1 MEN WIN OUT IN THIS COUNTY—BUSHLEY FOR COUNTY JUDGE—CARTER FOR RAILROAD COMMISSIONER.

 Portland, Or., April 18.—With but a third of the total vote counted Judge H. M. Cake, apparently leads in the Republican fight for senatorial nomination over Senator C. W. Fulton by about 4000 votes. His majority in Multnomah county is 3000 and the remainder of the state has given him 1000 more. Fulton had a heavy lead in Lane county, in which is situated Eugene, an old Fulton stronghold, and carried Clatsop county, Fulton's home county, by a strong majority. This will tend to reduce the size of the Cake majority. Statement No. 1 men apparently control the next state legislature. Multnomah county has given the entire Statement No. 1 delegation a heavy majority. W. R. Ellis, incumbent, has evidently defeated ex-Governor T. T. Geer for Republican congressional nomination in the second district. About 75 per cent of the registered vote was cast.  
**Fulton Concedes Defeat.**  
 Senator Fulton practically concedes the nomination of Cake as a result of yesterday's primaries in the senatorial election contest. As yet he has not issued his formal statement but in an authorized interview to the United Press at Astoria this morning, he said:  
 "What the final figures will show I cannot state but from present returns it looks as if I had lost out. If such proves to be the case I will cheerfully accept the verdict of the people. I will submit a formal statement later."  
**In Marion County.**  
 Thirty precincts out of 41 in Marion county give following totals on United States senator: Cake, 1456; Fulton, 1043.  
 Twenty-nine precincts give the following totals, unofficial, on representatives:  
 Adkins 1236, Crittenden 1127, Hattberg 1265, Hughes 1270, Libby 1236, Miller 1119, Patton 1435, Reynolds 1283, Turner 1255, Winslow 1147.  
 For railroad commissioner give Robertson 260, Campbell 724, Carter 1386.  
 The result in Marion county is the nomination of a first class county ticket, and with most of the candidates for the legislature standing by ticket. The rain kept down the country vote and reduced the vote for Statement No. 1 candidates.

#### FOR LEGISLATURE

THREE ANTI-STATEMENT NO. 1 MEN HAVE PROBABLY WON OUT IN MARION COUNTY—OFFICIAL COUNT MAY CHANGE RESULT.

Portland, Or., April 18.—With about three-fourths of yesterday's primary vote accounted for the nomination of Judge H. M. Cake over United States Senator Fulton in the senatorial contest appears to be practically certain. The vote up to 2 o'clock, including 54 precincts in Portland but excluding the vote in Willowa and Curry counties not reported, is: Cake, 15,848; Fulton, 15,260. Senator Fulton does not now concede his opponent's election but declares that the reports are still too meager upon which to base any conclusion. Statement No. 1 men will apparently control the next state legislation although the division will be closer than first believed. Twelve counties, including Multnomah, have returned 28 Statement No. 1 representatives.

Incomplete returns on the congressional struggle give the plum to Congressman Ellis. The returns up to two o'clock are Ellis 5896, Geer 4374, Shensard 4375.  
 C. B. Atchison and W. H. Hurlburt are running a neck and neck race for the railroad commissioner'ship in the second district and the nomination is claimed at the headquarters of both candidates. Campbell is accredited with the nomination in the first district. In Multnomah county district attorneyship fight George J. Cameron is nominated by a majority of about 2000 over James Cole. Gus Moser running five votes behind Cole.

#### BABY JOHN'S MOTHER FREE

 Oakland, Cal., April 18.—The indictment against Mrs. Isabella Martin charging her with inducing "Baby" John Martin, her putative son, to dynamite the home of Judge Ogden was quashed in the superior court this morning.  
 Mrs. Martin's liberty and victory, however, were merely technical, for she was immediately taken in charge. She will be arraigned today on the same charge before Police Judge Samuels.  
 The ground for quashing the indictment was bias on the part of one juror. The prosecution contended that bias on the part of one juror would not invalidate the proceedings, if twelve of the number required to return an indictment, were unbiased. This stand, it was decided after investigation of authorities, was untenable, and, as nothing is really gained by the defense so far as the prosecution of Mrs. Martin is concerned, the quashing of the indictment was not strongly opposed in court today.  
 Mrs. Martin, of the asylum force, went to Portland today.

strikingly beautiful. With her vivaciousness and sunny temperament, she was a favorite with the younger society set. It was on December 28, 1905, that she eloped with and was married to Herbert Osborne, then a student at Princeton. Being out of blanks, a justice scribbled something on a piece of paper and pronounced them man and wife. Immediately afterwards they both declared that the marriage was a joke.  
 They say that marriage was never consummated, and a hearing is on now to have it annulled. Last October Miss Maloney eloped to Canada with Samuel Clarkson, who asked for the young woman's hand before she ran away with Osborne. They were wed in Montreal and left for London. Then followed an exciting chase on the part of Martin Maloney, father of the bride, to locate her. Finally he found his daughter and Clarkson on the continent. Clarkson returned to his haunts in London, and the girl came back to America. At first Osborne refused to consent to an annulment, but at length announced that he would not stand in the young woman's path to happiness.  
 But the greatest blow to the Maloney family is the determination of the Catholic church not to sanction a re-marriage of Clarkson and Miss Maloney in the church.  
 However, Miss Maloney's attorneys said today that whether or not her marriage to Osborne was a joke, the Maloney family consider her the wife of Clarkson.

#### Marriage Cannot Be Broken.

Paris, April 18.—The Cri de Paris agit nihilists in its issue today that Mme. Goud and Prince Helle de Sagan were married in a small town on the Eastern frontier of France before they sailed for America a few weeks ago.  
 After declaring that the marriage was celebrated secretly, the paper says: "We would add that for certain legal reasons, which delicacy prevents us from divulging, this marriage cannot be broken. This possibility greatly consoles the families, which have been so crushed by the crisis."  
 The Cri de Paris, when it first announced the supposed secret marriage, said it could name the persons who witnessed the ceremony.

 Streets and drive-ways leading to the ocean were choked with scores of vehicles of every description, from dilapidated vegetable wagons to huge automobiles, all filled to overflowing with excited humanity.  
 The exodus of people from the city is unprecedented, and it is conservatively estimated that by the time the fleet is sighted this afternoon fully 200,000 persons will have journeyed out to the sea.  
 Long before noon the high bluffs overlooking the harbor of San Pedro, all the way around the crescent shaped bay from Point Firmin to Long Beach were black with countless thousands of men, women and children. A most a frenzy of anticipation permeated the vast multitude of American citizens come to see the fleet—their fleet.  
 Along the water front was banked a solid mass of humanity while the bay was dotted with a myriad of water craft, public launches, private yachts, row boats, anything that promised transportation to places of vantage, either on land or outside the harbor.  
 Further out and down the coast, were other and larger craft. Scores of excursion boats, black with people from water line to cabin roof, hurried southward to meet and escort the big warships to their anchorage.  
 Half an hour after the battleships have cast anchor, Mayor Harper, of Los Angeles, will make his official call on Admiral Thomas, commanding the fleet, leaving the wharf at San Pedro in a launch courteously tendered by the admiral for the purpose.  
 At 8 o'clock tonight the entire fleet of battleships will be illuminated by a single torchlight burning the first division, consisting of the flag-ship Connecticut, together with the Kansas, Vermont and Louisiana remaining at San Pedro, while the second division, under Rear-Admiral Emory, which comprises the Georgia, New Jersey, Rhode Island and Virginia, will take station at Long Beach.  
 Captain Harbor, in charge of the third division, will proceed to Santa Monica bay with the Minnesota, Ohio, Missouri and Maine.
