MEETING OF WILLAMETTE PRESBYTERY

Presbytery of Willamette met in the Presbyterian church on Tuesday afternoon, April 14, at 7:30 o'clock. The opening prayer was by Rev. M. Scott. The text, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life." Rev. M. Scott was elected Moderator and Rev. Babcock, of Salem, presided at the session of Presbytery on Wednesday forenoon, President H. Crooks, of Albany college presided for the year for a Summer Session to be held from July 17 to August 1st.

Some prominent workers already promised to be present at the session. D. Holt, Home Mission Society for the Pacific Coast district has signified his willingness to

conduct a mission study class, using Dr. Strong's popular book, "The Challenge of the City." Some good speakers on Sunday School work and methods will be secured. There will also be a good instructor in Bible and part of the forenoon sessions will be devoted to Bible study. It was suggested that two days of the conference should be devoted to discussions of S. S. and C. E. methods. There will be provisions made for athletics and recreation. The college baseball grounds and tennis court will afford places for exercise. The Presbytery received the idea enthusiastically.

Rev. C. T. Herd was examined by Presbytery and received into the membership of the church from the United Evangelical Church. The afternoon session was devoted to business. In the evening two addresses were given, one by President H. M. Crooks, of Albany college, and one by Rev. J. R. N. Bell, D. D., of Corvallis. President Crooks spoke about the layman's missionary movement in the church. He called attention to the great need and opportunities of the foreign field, and the obligation resting upon the church to meet. Dr. Bell spoke about the great superiority of Christianity over other religions, the great moral and religious movements in modern civilization and the importance of the work of men in our church. Presbytery will meet at Creswell in the Fall.

AMERICAN PLAYS GOING TO ENGLAND.

A good bit of news for theatergoers, principally for Californians, is announced here in the statement of George Edwards that he is arranging to bring David Warfield to London, where he probably will appear in the "Muscle Master" in the Adelphi theater in September.

Warfield is a native son of the Pacific coast, where, in San Francisco, he sold newspapers upon the streets, spending his spare time about the doors of the theatres. He had a longing for the stage, and in later years appeared in music halls in the East. Step by step he became proficient in his profession and the height of his success was attained after he signed a contract with David Belasco. Through the latter, under whose direction he won fame on the stage, Warfield recently turned down a \$1,000,000 contract to leave him. 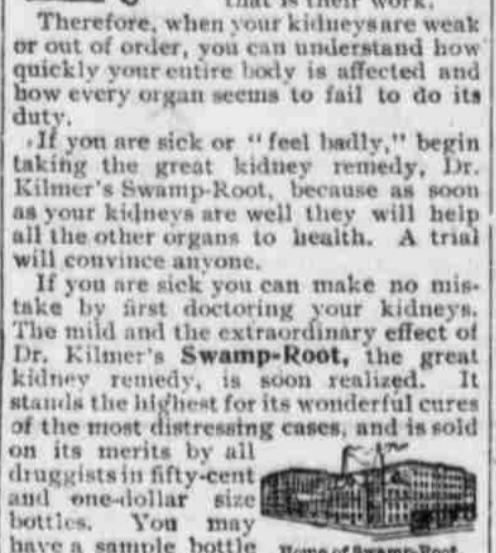

Notice is hereby given that at the regular meeting of the common council held April 6, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve Broadway street with full intersections, from the north line of North Mill creek to the north line of Madison street in the following manner:

By establishing a permanent grade on said street along the proposed line of improvement where not already established.

By placing the street railway track of the Oregon Electric Railway company where it extends along the proposed line of improvement in the center thereof.

By grading the roadway of said Broadway street between said points full width from curb to curb with full intersections to the proper subgrade.

The subgrade shall be one foot below the established grade and upon said subgrade shall be placed one foot of clean creek or river gravel, provided however, the space along the center of said street to be occupied by the said Oregon Electric Railway company shall be graveled in such a manner that the top of the rails of said company will be on a level with the established grade of said Broadway street.

The cost of placing said track in the center of said street and improving between the rails and one and one-half feet outside of the rails of the Oregon Electric Railway company, to be assessed on the franchise and property of said company.

The cost of said improvement, save and except the space between the rails and one and one-half feet outside of the rails of the Oregon Electric Railway company to be assessed on the abutting and adjacent property, as provided in the charter of said city.

Remonstrance against the above improvement may be filed within 20 days after the date of the first publication of this notice.
