tion on the ticket and allow Roosevelt to take the second place. This, it is said, in Bourne's mind, completely removes the president's objections to revoking his famous pledge, written on the night of his election in 1904, when he stated that he would never run for president again.

This latest twist in Bourne's endeavor to get the name of Roosevelt on the next Republican national ticket has been revealed through two letters to Mayor L. N. Blowers, of Hood River, from Mr. John Hannan, La Follette's private secretary, introducing John C. Young, Bourne's private secretary, who recently visited the state in his employer's interest. The letter reads:

"I am inclosing a letter of introduction from Senator La Follette's private secretary, Mr. Hannan, which is self-explanatory. I trust if you are doing anything in the senator's behalf you will make an effort to come to the state convention from Wasco county backed by as many Roosevelt-La Follette or La Follette Roosevelt people as possible."

The other letter advises Blowers to work against any instructions to the Republican delegates to the national convention unless instructed for Roosevelt and La Follette or La Follette and Roosevelt.

was not disturbed. All who were here, however, on the fateful day, took time to recall the experiences of two years ago.

The work that has been accomplished since the fire is admittedly most remarkable. Where two years ago were nothing but great heaps of debris, now stand massive business blocks. Market street, which was swept almost clean by the flames, is rapidly becoming like the Market street of old, except that instead of the flimsy frame buildings that once answered the purpose, stone, concrete and brick structures are housing the merchants and others whose business calls them to the city's main artery.

What has been accomplished since the disaster is best told by the following figures:

- Total loss, \$500,000.
- Loss by fire, \$350,000.
- Insurance paid, \$198,000,000.
- Buildings burned, 28,128.
- New buildings erected, 9,798.
- Old buildings remodeled, 4,078.
- Buildings destroyed, \$105,000,000.
- New buildings, \$112,000,000.
- Stock and furnishings, \$160,000,000.
- Local capital used, \$105,000,000.
- Outside loans, \$3,665,000.
- Cost of streets paved, 13 miles, \$950,000.
- Cost of sewers by city, 16 1/2 miles \$450,000.
- Spent by public service corporations, \$20,000,000.

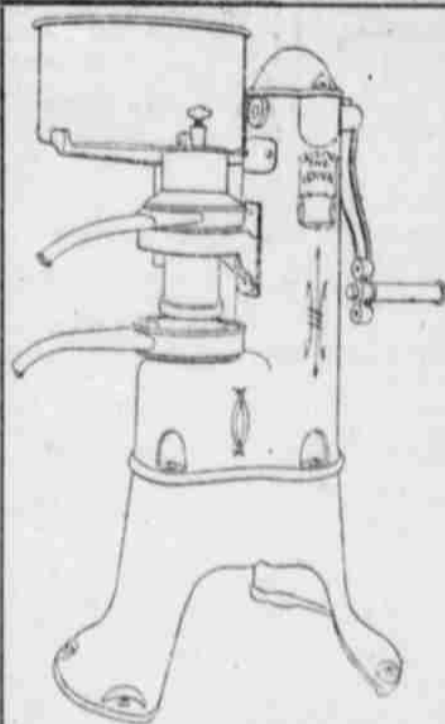
BISHOP COLEMAN?

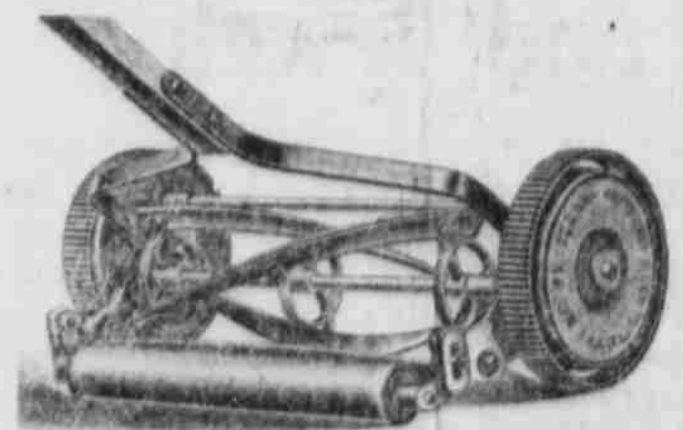
