### ANARCHIST REFUSES TO MAKE CONFESSION

 Madrid, April 20.—Juan Rulo, the anarchist convicted and sentenced to death at Barcelona for the January bomb outrage in which a policeman was killed and several persons were wounded, scornfully refused an offer today to have his life by a full confession concerning the "reds" organization throughout Spain. The police are so fearful of a continuation of the campaign of anarchy and another leader that they would be willing to spare Rulo if assured by so doing they could root out anarchy completely.

He is said to have offered to make some minor revelations in return for immunity for his mother and his brother, who were convicted with him and sentenced to penal servitude. The police do not think this proposition worthy of consideration, and it is believed they rejected it.

Dr. B. R. Job has been re-elected mayor of Cottage Grove. He has made a record as one of the best burgomasters in the smaller cities of Oregon.

The Philippine division of the United States Pacific fleet has arrived at Hong Kong.

Henry Chadwick, the father of American baseball, died today at New York.

The President declines to allow the fleet to visit any European ports except for coaling.

At Port Townsend, Wash., Dr. Simon B. Conover, aged 69 years, died today, after a lingering illness. Dr. Conover was elected United States senator from this state in 1872 and served until March 3, 1879.

### GIFT MAKING HINTS.

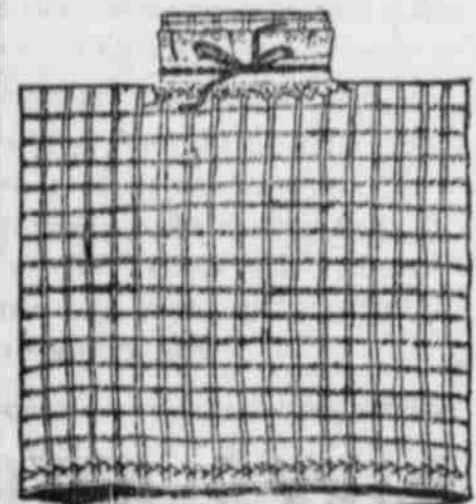
**Design For a Lingerie Bag—Useful Shirt Waist Cover.**  
 The lingerie bag illustrated requires for its fashioning a prettily embroidered linen or lawn handkerchief. Fold it once and join the sides with inch wide lace insertion. This forms the bag. Trim the top with insertion to match the sides, then a wide beading for the

ribbon to pass through and an inch wide lace frill. Run the ribbon through the beading, making a pretty bow at each end. Little work is required, and a dainty bag suitable for carrying with a lingerie gown is evolved. In addition to the handkerchief the materials required are one and one-quarter yards of lace insertion, three-quarters of a yard of beading, one yard of lace edging and three yards of half inch ribbon.

A shirt waist cover designed to slip over the regulation hanger is here pictured. To make it take a piece of silk or cotton material forty-four inches long and twenty-two inches wide, fold in the middle and stitch up the sides, forming a bag. Turn and fold the

top in three parts and slit the middle section, leaving one-third on each side. This slit is for the collar, which is made by cutting a band five inches deep and sixteen inches wide. Attach with a wide beading and trim top and bottom with lace. Run in nice ribbon and make a generous bow in front. This slit is just wide enough to allow the hanger to slip through, and the waist or coat is protected from the dust and light. The cover illustrated was made from ordinary barred muslin, with better stitching around the bottom in blue wash silk and with ribbon to match.

### Dainty Presents.

For the woman who can draw or paint, a telephone pad is simple to make. A piece of strong cardboard, about 4 by 9 inches, in delicate gray or pastel green, is especially attractive as a background. This may be decorated in stencil designs or painted with tiny heads of pretty girls or anything one fancies, the tints being al-

ways kept low and refined in tone. Or if one is without knack with the pencil and paint brush, a piece of wall paper with a small floral design may be procured, and the flowers carefully cut out and pasted on the cardboard foundation. A small pad of white paper is then neatly pasted on, a ribbon hanger attached to the top, a pencil at the end of a short ribbon fastened on where the fastening will not be visible, and the telephone pad is finished.

### ENGAGEMENT RACK.

**How This Useful and Popular Present May Be Made.**

An engagement rack has seven white rather heavy cards, on each of which is printed the name of one of the days of the week. On the ends of these cards a narrow white ribbon is pasted; then the ribbon is pasted to a long strip of white cardboard, to make little pockets into which to drop notes, memoranda, etc. These cards are two inches apart.

A sofa pillow in the shape of a great red tomato is the newest thing. It is about nine inches high finished and about a yard around. Three-quarters of a yard of red velvet—a good bright red—will be enough, as the shaped pieces cut to fairly good advantage.

Cut six or it pieces twelve inches high in wide oval shapes, pointed at both ends—exactly the way you would cut sections to cover a child's ball. By cutting one section close to the selvage at one edge of the velvet and the other at the other selvage you can get six out nearly six inches across in their broadest parts—right in the center. If you use eight, of course make them narrower.

Sew them up on the wrong side, leaving one seam partly open to insert the pillow. Force in as large a pillow as you can—an eighteen inch pillow is large enough—sew it up, and you have a round red velvet ball.

Now take the red twine that matches the velvet and knot it at one end. Then, with an upholsterer's needle, draw it clear through the center, bringing the thread around directly over one of the seams, and pull the twine through the center again, drawing it taut, so that it presses the velvet in at the seam. Do this at every seam and then knot the cord, finishing it off as neatly as possible, and you've a great, fat, red tomato, which will be most effective flung in among a pile of pillows, and it has the advantage of being a fit present for either a man or a girl. One clever girl named it the Ponderosa pillow in honor of a real tomato of huge size.

### A Knitting Needle Case.

A most suitable present for a lover of knitting is a case in which the different sizes of needles may be kept and preserved from rust when not in use. The outer cover, composed of any pretty material, may be as elaborately worked as you like. It must be cut a little longer than the length of the longest needle it is to hold, and about three times as wide as it is long. In making the case you will be guided by your own or the recipient's usual requirements in the way of knitting needles, as one or two sizes may be preferred to the entire "set."

The lining should be of wash leather. Choose a piece with a not too aggressive yellow tint and not "thin" in places. Cut it to the size of the case and allow half an inch over to be pinked out and show over the edges. Before fixing in, place a moderately wide piece of leather down the center piece and make as many runnings across it as will correspond with the number of knitting needles the case is destined to hold. If desired, the leather lining need only meet the edges of the case, which may be bound with ribbon. The case can be rolled up when not in use and tied with a ribbon from the outside. These cases can be adapted for various uses by regulating the size of the center runnings, into which can be slipped embroidery silks as well as knitting needles, and such a case lined with oil silk would make an admirable brush holder for a student in water color painting.
