Freak Cyclists Waking Up.
Every bicycle manufacturer who is doing any advertising—and there are many more investing in printer's ink than usual just now—is having all sorts of propositions put up to him by riders who are anxious to get into the limelight. Cycles in Kansas City.

CIVIL SERVICE FOR CLERK-CARRIER
