The grievance committee of the Oregon Bar Association, through special prosecutor, Ralph R. Fischer, this morning filed a complaint in the supreme court asking for the disbarment of attorney John H. ## FLORENCE BOSBY MYSTERY

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Portland, Or., April 21.—If 18-year-old Mrs. Florence Bosby, who is claimed by J. G. Covel of the Nortonia hotel as his wife of three months, really committed suicide last Sunday as she threatened to do in a letter to her mother, the best efforts of Detectives Inskip and Hawley of the local police force have not availed to locate her body or any clue to her whereabouts. Today, the mystery of her disappearance is as impenetrable as ever. The police are baffled. The missing girl's mother is in hysterics. Covel still continues his attitude in unbelief in the suicide theory. He exhibits a marriage license dated Seattle and issued in January which records his marriage to Mrs. Bosby. Mrs. E. H. Bennett, the girl's mother, declares the certificate forged and states that Covel was to have been married to her daughter Saturday night. It is hinted that the girl died rather than to marry Covel, but that the latter scouted this theory. Today, he put his case in the hands of a local detective agency. He wants to locate the woman he claims as his wife as he states he just paid her \$175 to buy Easter finery with. When she was 15 years of age the missing woman was married to Bosby with whom she lived a year.

## WOMAN BECOMES ANGRY

Bellingham, Wash., April 21.—Basing her action on the "bestial, loathsome physical condition" of her husband, 72 years of age, according to the wording of the complaint, Mrs. Phylomella Burton, aged 71 years, yesterday took the witness stand in Mount Vernon to tell the story of their matrimonial career of one week in her suit for divorce. Mrs. Burton, better known as Grandma Duffy, became angered at the question of the attorney for the defense while she was on the stand and left her seat with the avowed intention of trouncing the counsel. Considering that the plaintiff is eleven years past the three score mark her anger created a sensation in the court room. Expert medical witnesses were brought from Seattle for the purpose of examining the defendant in the divorce proceedings. The plaintiff is asking that the cost of the suit be paid by the defendant and also wants an equal division of the property.
