## STANFORD STUDENT SUSPENDED

**Indefinitely for Merely Expressing His Opinion That the Student Affairs Committee Are Imbeciles.**

Palo Alto, Cal., April 22.—Another storm broke on the campus of Stanford university today when the student affairs committee posted a notice suspending one student for appearing on the campus in an intoxicated condition and withdrawing the privilege of re-registering from two others. The notice, which was posted immediately after a meeting of the student affairs committee, is as follows:

"A student was indefinitely suspended from the university for being noticeably under the influence of liquor on the campus on the evening of April 17.

"The privilege of re-registration in the university was permanently withdrawn from the editor of Sequoia for his abuse of the privileges of the college press in his editorial in the last number of that periodical.

"For violation of the regulation governing students under suspension a student will not be permitted to register in the university."

The announcement has created great excitement among the students and a repetition of last month's "rebellion" is not unlikely.
