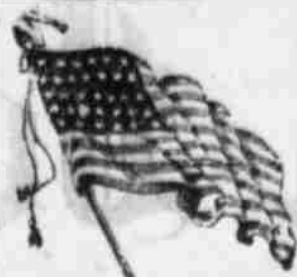

A FEW WORDS FOR THE RIGHTS OF THE INDIVIDUAL.

The Capital Journal has printed the replies of Tom Bennett of Marshfield, and of James Mott of Salem, in reply to Oregonian attacks on them.

It is proper to call them attacks, when a great newspaper picks out two more college boys FOR ITS UN-FRIENDLY ANIMADVERSIONS.

The two Oregon boys were standing up for their rights against the unfair rulings of a California student affairs committee.

In defending their good name and the good name of their fellow students they HAD A RIGHT TO EXPECT THE FRIENDLY INTEREST OF THE PRESS.

There are two sides to every controversy, and even if there was some right on the side of the college authorities, the boys had a right as manly young fellows to put their side of the case vigorously.

For this they are condemned. For having the red blood of their sires in their veins THEY ARE ROASTED BY AN ALLEGED GREAT NEWSPAPER.

If the boys had not stood up for their rights in a vigorous fashion they would have been justly considered unworthy by any newspaper.

The individual has a right to protection, to fair play, to a good hearing his behalf AS AGAINST ANY CORPORATION OR NEWSPAPER.

The ownership of a press or the accident of being a highly salaried official of a trusteeship like Stanford does not give anyone rights over the individual.

But a great newspaper imagines it can call a man crazy, can cast an aspersion on his sobriety, can imply that he is an anarchist, AND NEVER RETRACT OR UNDO THE INJUSTICE DONE.

Against such assumptions of tyrannical power The Capital Journal has ever stood.

We would defend and give a hearing even to Harvey W. Scott himself, IF HE WERE FALSELY ACCUSED AND WANTED A HEARING.

Dr. Jordan and Dr. Chapman are clearly POSSESSED OF AN ANAEMIC SPECIOUS MORALITY, that poses before the public and cannot meet men as men in the arena of everyday affairs.

Chapman, the editor of the Oregonian, and Jordan of the university, would not last ten days with a crowd of men in the equality of the class room or the lumber camp, WITHOUT THE PRIVILEGE OF PROTECTION.

They can browbeat and bully college students when they cannot argue the question with them, and divested of the advantages with which their position would surround them, could not hold their own with these two college boys whom they berate and decry.

James Mott and Tom Bennett should not mourn because they have been held up IN AN UNFAVORABLE LIGHT IN THE OREGONIAN.

They have thousands of fellow citizens who have been treated with injustice for no reason than the splenetic and dyspeptic disposition of sour-balled genius installed IN THE HIGH TOWER OF THE OREGON METROPOLIS.

AN ISSUE THAT MUST BE SETTLED.

The right of the people to elect United States senators is on trial in Oregon.

Reforms of a political character always come from the states.

So it is up to the people of Oregon at the June election to carry this principle into effect.

The people must vote and must elect Mr. Calkins or Governor Chamberlain to the United States senate. THEY CANNOT AVOID THIS DUTY.

In the June election it is more than likely that more Statement No. 1 men will be chosen than those opposed to the Statement.

In fact if none are chosen but Statement No. 1 men and party choice men and Calkins is the choice of the people, he will be THE UNANIMOUS CHOICE OF THE LEGISLATURE FOR SENATOR.

If Chamberlain is the choice of the people in June and there is a majority in the general assembly Statement No. 1 men he will be elected.

The fact is it is up to the people to elect one or the other of those gentlemen United States senator and THEY SHOULD SETTLE THE MATTER.

And we believe it will settle the matter, and for the following reasons:

In the first place IT IS ACCORDING TO THE ELECTION LAWS OF OREGON.

It is according to the ballot laws and the direct primary law.

In the second place, a law is going to be enacted by the people at the June election DIRECTING THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO ELECT THE CHOICE OF THE PEOPLE, no matter what their private views may be.

So under all the circumstances it may be set down that whether Calkins or Chamberlain is the choice of the people he will be the unanimous choice of the legislature.

PUBLIC SENTIMENT IS GOING IN THAT DIRECTION.

There will be a continuous effort on the part of the politically belated element to defeat Statement No. 1 men, and to throw the election into the hands of the legislature, and to disregard the expressed will of the people.

That there will be a dark horse candidate with a hoghead of coin back of him FEW CLOSE OBSERVERS CAN DOUBT.

The people have got that fight to make once more, but winning out this time the barrel candidate is gone forever from the halls of Oregon legislature.

MILL TO START.

Renewal of Operation at Corvallis Sawmill.

The Corvallis sawmill, which has been idle for the past six months, is to resume operations Thursday. Three million feet of fine logs from the McKenzie has been purchased, and a million feet is in the boom at the mouth of Marys River, ready for the cut. Heavy building operations in Corvallis have made a big demand for lumber that taxes the capacity of the mills to supply.

The mill has passed into new hands since its shut down last November. Mr. Akers, who was formerly in control, has sold his interest to Percy Allen, and gone to Portland to reside. Mr. Allen is one of the largest lumber and timber operators in the state, having large interests in various parts of Oregon. He was in Corvallis yesterday, completing arrangements to begin operations. Neil Newhouse, one of the best known sawmill men in the county is to have charge of the sawing activities. The announcement of the resumption is of material interest, by reason of the fact that the mill is the largest single labor-employer in the town, carrying a force of 25 to 50 men regularly on the payroll, and disbursing a large sum of money weekly.

Notice is hereby given that at regular meeting of the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, held April 20, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve S. E. Sage street in the city of Salem, Oregon, between the north line of North Mill Creek and the south line of D street in the city of Salem, Oregon, between the north line of North Cottage street and the east line of Seventh street in the city of Salem, Oregon, between the north line of D street and the south line of the Fair Grounds in the following manner:

By establishing a permanent grade on said streets between points. Said improvement shall be intersections and be continuous extending from the north line of Mill creek to the south line of Fair Grounds Road, and said grade along the center thereof for a width of 16 feet shall be excavated to a depth of 10 inches below the level of said streets, and when excavated, shall be filled with creek or river gravel, so that the face of said improvement shall level with the grade of said streets.
