MORE FINE BRICKS ARE TO BE BUILT
 Cherry Brothers and J. M. Sanford Will Build at Eugene.

A full half block of fine brick buildings is in prospect, in fact an assured fact. The Register mentioned about a month ago that Cherry Brothers would probably begin to build a fine brick building to cover the entire front of their lots at the corner of Sixth and Willamette about the first of May. The plans are now being drawn for it by W. T. Campbell and it is practically certain that they will commence their building on the date above mentioned.

J. M. Sanford was seen yesterday and said he intended to build on his lots in the same half block, so that his building could be constructed at the same time and both use the same inside wall. He stated that he might not put up the hotel building first figured on, but would most likely put a two-story block with rooms for stores on the first floor. This will make a frontage of 160 feet on Willamette street, which will fill the burnt space, which has not been a great attraction to the street since the fire last August.

With the building of the post office and these just spoken of, it will make a lively place in this part of town, just as well as on Ninth street.

BEAN, CALKINS AND EATON FOR REPRESENTATIVES

Eugene Guard special.—According to the returns received at the Guard office up to this afternoon, Louis E. Bean, Winsor W. Calkins and Allen H. Eaton are the nominees for representative on the Republican ticket. Drew Griffin is the nominee for sheriff, E. U. Lee for clerk, B. F. Keeney for assessor, Walter B. Dillard for school superintendent, Robert E. Eastland for county treasurer, G. R. Chrisman for county judge, C. M. Collier for surveyor, Hugh M. Price for commissioner and W. T. Gordon for coroner. The last four candidates were without opposition and received the entire vote of the party.

Probably the closest fight was between Allen H. Eaton and I. N. Edwards for representative. Last night when the returns began to come in they were about even for a long time, but finally Eaton began to forge ahead, and this afternoon he leads Edwards by a good majority, with 12 or 13 small precincts to hear from yet.

After Edwards comes A. C. Jennings, and C. J. Dodd received the smallest vote.
