SALEM MENTIONED IN A NEW BOOK

Salem is to have a place in the Encyclopaedia Britannica. The Board of Trade is in receipt of a request for information concerning this city. The following data, together with the picture containing the name of the city, has been sent to the London Times, publishers of the "Britannica":

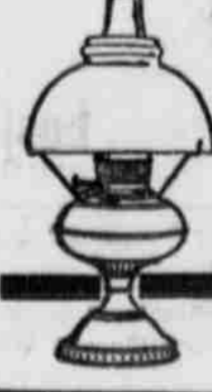
Salem, the capital of Oregon, U. S. A., and the county seat of Marion county, on the east bank of the Willamette river, about 52 miles S. W. of Portland. Pop. (1880) 2,538; (1890) 4,515; of whom 522 were foreign-born. Salem is served by the through line of the Southern Pacific railroad and by a steamship line to Portland. Also the Oregon Electric railway company, operating hourly cars between Salem and Portland. Salem is in the center of the Willamette valley, a rich farming and fruit growing country. It is a modern and well-built city with well-shaded paved streets, 100 feet wide, and two public parks. Here are the state capitol, the state library, the state penitentiary and reformatory, the state deaf mute school, and state institute for the blind, and state insane asylum, a large brick building, and the state boys' reform school, the institute for the feeble minded, also a government Indian training school. lamette university (Methodist Episcopal 1844), is an outgrowth of the mission work of the Methodist Episcopal church begun in 1824 about ten miles below the site of the present city. Other schools are the Academy of the Sacred Heart, (Roman Catholic, 1860), also the Capital Business college, the Capital Normal school, besides a superior public school system, with four large grade school buildings and a \$75,000 high school building. Salem is an energetic, typically western, business city. Water power for its mills is derived (in part by an 18-m. canal) from the Willamette river and its affluent, the Santiam. The principal manufactures are lumber, dressed timber (sash, blinds, doors, etc.), flour, packed and dried fruits, woolens, and foundry products. The settlement here, gathering about the Methodist mission and school begun to grow in the 40's; in 1853 the city was incorporated; and in 1860 it was made the capital of the state. It grew rapidly after 1900, and its territory was largely increased in 1905, which two facts account for its population in 1908 of 15,478.

SKETCH OF MRS. J. H. CHASTAIN, OF THE DALLES

Mary E. Flet was born March 1, 1837, in Selkirk, Canada, and died April 15, 1908. Moved to Oregon in 1841 and settled at Glenco. She was left an orphan at the age of 7 years and was adopted by Archie McKinley of Oregon City. She came to Eastern Oregon in 1858. Was married to John Nelson Wood January 29, 1859, settling on Fifteen Mile creek, being one of the first settlers. They sold their place to Perry Watkins and in the 70s settled at Boyd, being the original settlers of Boyd. Her husband followed stock raising. He packed the first grist mill into Eastern Oregon at Prairie City, Grant county.

Eleven children were born to this union, four boys and 7 girls; six survive her, Eddie, A. C., and D. A. Moad of Tygh Valley, Mrs. Frank Painter and Mrs. Nettie Easton of Dufur; J. N. Moad, died October 24, 1898. She was married to J. H. Chastain July 2, 1904, who died July 3, 1906.

She united with the Christian church in 1871 and since united with the U. B. church at Tygh Valley; she leaves besides her children, two sisters, fifteen grandchildren and four great grandchildren. She spoke the Chinook language thoroughly. Many a traveler has sought rest at her home in the early days. This woman has lived in Wasco county when it composed a part of Idaho. The funeral service was conducted by the pioneer minister, J. J. Powell. The old gentleman spoke of an acquaintance of over 30 years.
