PHILANDER KNOX IS CHOSEN

SELECT CANDIDATE FOR PRESIDENT AND ADOPT TARIFF AND CURRENCY PLATFORMS.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Harrisburg, Pa., April 29.—Philander Chas Knox is the choice of the Pennsylvania Republican for the presidential nomination of that party. At today's Republican state convention the delegates were not only instructed to vote for him but they adopted a platform... his work as attorney general and United States senator, and putting the stamp of approval on the national administration and the entire congressional delegation from Pennsylvania.

"While not abating one jot from adherence to the distinctive merits of the policy of protection," says the platform, "the Republican party of Pennsylvania recognizes the general demand for a review by the incoming congress of tariff legislation to the end that such modifications may be therein will adapt it to the necessities and demands of the present time and in such a manner as will best subserve the real welfare of the American people."

Sleepless Sleeping Woman.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, Cal., April 29.—Mrs. Beulah Hawkins, the psychological marvel who has been in a cataleptic state for 84 days, wept today. Tears were forced through her closed eyelids down her cheeks, but aside from this first expression of her feelings since she entered into the cataleptic state which has chained her since February 6 last, no intelligence of the agony which must possess her was given.

Physicians say the tears have no significance. They were merely a melancholy message from the heart of this aged woman, who is of this world and yet removed from it in a most pathetic fashion.

Doctors call her case one of cataleptic insanity, and yet they agree that symptoms are present which would not be found in a typical case. The catalepsy is due entirely to a nervous affection which has not shattered her mental faculties.

All experiments and attempts to arouse the woman have failed. Strangely enough, however, her health is excellent and all functions except those governed by consciousness, are perfectly normal.

Prince is Planning Marriage.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Naples, April 29.—Prince Heide de Sagan has addressed a communication to Cardinal Merry de Val, furnishing the grounds upon which he seeks to procure a dispensation from the church permitting his marriage with Anna Gould.

As the marriage to a divorced person is only permitted under certain canonical conditions, of which none are apparent in this case, the petition is stated to be foredoomed to failure. The plan of the couple is to marry in France, but to remain for some time in Florence. Preparations are being made for civil ceremony immediately upon the return of the couple to France.

SALEM BOY LOST IN WOODS

WENT THERE SUNDAY

STEPSON OF ABRAHAM WALTY, WHO RESIDES IN SOUTH SALEM—SEARCHING PARTY OUT AFTER HIM.

Searchers are scouring the woods miles south of this city for William Krebs, the 19-year-old stepson of Abraham Walty, from whose home the young man started on a hunting trip early Sunday morning, since which time he has not been heard from.

It is feared by the relatives of the lad that he has met with some mishap, as he has never staid away from home for a night before, and this time he has been missing four days and three nights. Just which direction young Krebs took, nor what he would be hunting at this time of the year is not known, so that the searchers have an almost limitless area to cover in their task. Though the search has been kept up for more than 24 hours already by the lad's step-father and his four brothers, no clue nor trace of him has been found.

Krebs always seemed to be happy and contented at home so that but little credence is given to a rumor which has started from among the young man's friends to the effect that he has run away. At different times, he has expressed a desire to see a little more of the world, but this mention was made so softly that it was practically forgotten until his disappearance Sunday.

The search will be kept up for at least another 24 hours. Walty lives on the hill going down into the canyon on the other side of Jackson hill.

A NEW AUTOMOBILE RECORD ESTABLISHED

Los Angeles, Cal., April 29.—Having established a new record in an automobile run from San Francisco to Los Angeles in 17 hours and 17 minutes, a White Steamer, owned by Fernando Nelson, is now dashing back to the former city in an attempt to make a new mark for a round trip.

Nelson left Twentieth and Guerrero streets in San Francisco at 3:02 yesterday morning and reached the Times building in Los Angeles at 8:15 o'clock last night. At 10:06, nearly two hours later, the car was started back with Frank Nelson, son of Fernando, in charge. In the thrilling dash to Los Angeles the senior Nelson made an average of 28 1/2 miles per hour and slipped 56 minutes off his previous time established two years ago.

HORSES WERE LOST BUT WOMEN SAVED

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, April 29.—Heroic rescues of two old women, who were snatched from death at a moment when it seemed certain that they would perish, and the loss of 49 fine horses were the result of a fire originating at midnight.

Mrs. Grace Taylor and Mrs. Mary Oxlare were sleeping in the home in Juniper street when the building was attacked by fire. After the house had almost been enveloped in flames, B. Taggart, a neighbor, rushed in and carried out one of the two women. He returned for the other and with the help of friends saved the other.

CONNECTICUT DEMOCRATS SLUG WESTERN LEADER

The resolutions committee declined to adopt a platform placing the convention on record for Bryan. Resolutions instructing the delegation to the Democratic national convention to vote for the Nebraskan was then tabled.

CALHOUN REFUSED TO ANSWER

ON GRAFT TRIALS

THAT HIS ANSWERS WOULD TEND TO INCRIMINATE HIM—HENEY TAKES A HAND.

San Francisco, April 29.—To save himself from the stigma of taking refuge behind the phrase, "I cannot answer on the ground that it would tend to incriminate me," Patrick Calhoun, president of the United Railroads, is battling today to prevent being placed on the stand in the trial of his subordinate, T. L. Ford, on a charge of bribery.

The prosecution sprung its sensational card, when after an ineffectual effort to find Thornwell Mullaly, Calhoun's assistant, it placed Calhoun on the witness stand. As Calhoun took his seat the defense objected to the witness being questioned. This was combatted by the state and Calhoun was compelled to remain on the stand. He refused to answer the first direct question put to him and then requested permission to make an explanation for declining to answer. The attorneys then engaged in a heated argument to decide whether Calhoun could refuse to answer under some other plea than that it might tend to degrade him.

Upon taking the stand Calhoun gave his residences as New York, San Francisco, South Carolina, Georgia and Cleveland, O. After giving his true name he was asked: "When did you come to San Francisco after April 18, 1906?"

The defense objected and Calhoun refused to answer, following his declination with a request to be permitted to explain.

Special Prosecutor Heney, who had entered the court room shortly after Calhoun took the stand, whispered to Assistant District Attorney O'Garra that there should be but one witness decline to answer and after O'Garra had objected to the request, Attorney A. A. Moore for the defense, jumped into the fray, declaring that Calhoun was called to the stand practically to be a witness against himself and that the defense had the right to argue as to whether or not he should be called as a witness.

After a long argument, Judge Lawlor decided that he would draw his own inference from the tendency questions put Calhoun and should the witness decline to answer and the court sustains his declination, the witness will not be permitted to give his own reason for his refusal to answer. This was acceded to by both sides. Calhoun then addressed the court, an unusual proceeding, although he is an attorney. He declared that he fully stood on his constitutional rights to refuse to answer if pressed by the prosecution and admitted that should he be sustained in his refusal by the court he had no right to announce his reason. He offered, however, to make a statement of his attendance as a witness, but this the court declined to hear.

Late this afternoon Calhoun will again be placed on the stand and interrogated.

Calhoun Goes on Stand.

The court then acceded to the defense's request that the matter of calling Calhoun be argued. Moore held that the calling of Calhoun was virtually calling a co-defendant to testify against himself. He declared that the real purpose of placing Ford on trial for the third time was to compel Calhoun to give evidence against himself and to give his defense in advance of the presentation of his case. He denounced the prosecution's action as the greatest outrage ever perpetrated before any court and declared that Calhoun never feared the issue any has always been anxious to go to trial.

O'Garra combatted the argument, after which the court ordered that Calhoun must take the stand. Court adjourned until 3 o'clock.

CHINA BECOMES AROUSED

JAPAN SENDS SHIPS

FLEET SUDDENLY APPEARS IN CHINESE WATERS AN ANCHORS—SQUADRON WILL VISIT CANTON.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Peking, April 29.—Claiming that its presence has no significance and that the visit is a purely friendly one, another Japanese cruiser squadron has arrived in Chinese waters. The Chinese do not accept protestations of friendship and say that the real purpose of the visit is to frighten China into abandoning the anti-Japanese boycott which continues to spread. The people are furious and are making threats of all sorts.

The squadron, consisting of four cruisers, has dropped anchor at Ching Wang Tao, near Taku.

The viceroy at Canton advised the Japanese admiral to bring his ships to Canton, fearing that their presence would cause trouble, but the squadron will visit Canton anyhow.

Admirals Ijima and Togo have arrived here with their staffs and will be received by the dowager empress on Friday.

NEVADA MINING MAN SECURES HIS RELEASE

San Francisco, April 29.—Frank Bell, the Nevada mining man, who, on January 7 shot and instantly killed Frank Cochrane in a saloon in Sansome street in this city, was today released by Police Judge Cahill.

It was shown that Cochrane came to San Francisco from Seattle to kill Bell, whom he accused of being too friendly with Mrs. Cochrane. Cochrane found Bell in the saloon and drew his revolver. Bell was quicker than the Seattle man, however, and pulled the trigger of his own revolver before Cochrane could fling his. Cochrane died a few minutes later.

Bell, who was seriously wounded in the fight, has been lying in a hospital under guard ever since.

KING OF GYPSIES IS UNDER ARREST

(United Press Leased Wire.) Geneva, April 29.—Emile Haussman, the king of the European gypsies, has been placed under arrest, charged with numerous crimes, including the murder of a number of kidnapped children.

Every gypsy band in Europe paid tribute to Haussman, who they regarded with awe and superstition.
