KLAMATH COUNTY COMMITTEE ORGANIZED
Republican committeemen from the various precincts throughout the county met at the court house for the purpose of perfecting the county organization. It was found that four precincts had failed to select committeemen, and they were filled by appointment as follows: Sprague River, S. C. Hamaker; Plevna, R. W. Tower; Klamath Lake, O. C. Brown; Poe Valley, Vivian Evans.

C. T. Oliver was chosen temporary chairman and J. G. Wright, secretary. The organization was made permanent with the exception that Frank E. Ahkeny was elected secretary.

H. L. Holgate, of Bonanza, was elected state committeeman and Frank Ira White, congressional committeeman. The delegates appointed to the state and congressional conventions are as follows: L. F. Wilkins, Klamath Falls; Geo. Noble, Sr., Lang-Il Valley; E. E. Fitch, Merrill; E. E. Hoyt, Fort Klamath.

Resolutions were introduced and adopted pledging the committee to the support of the entire Republican ticket. No plan of campaign has yet been formulated, but the committee is going to make a determined fight to elect the entire county ticket and to place a handsome majority figure in the Republican column.

Cowley; Sprague River, S. C. Hamaker; Tule Lake, R. C. Anderson; Wood River, E. M. Leever; Klamath Lake, O. C. Brown; Snow, E. L. Colburn; Odell, Jesse Stropps.

Building Roads Down in Cuba.
(United Press Leased Wire.)
Havana, April 29.—The government awarded the \$700,000 contract for highway building in Pinar del Rio province to W. J. Oliver of Knoxville, Tenn., today. Oliver was the lowest bidder but his offer was stacked by Cuban contractors. It was reported that Oliver intended bringing laborers from the United

States, despite the fact that large numbers of idle Cubans needed the work. The sufficiency of his bond was also questioned. Both claims were evidently considered groundless by the government. Oliver was one of the bidders on the Panama canal.

IRISH COUNTESS
KILLS FRENCHMAN
Paris, April 29.—A mysterious tragedy has occurred in the residence of the Count and Countess Sylvain de Lanet in the Rue Theres. The count was found shot through the heart in his bedroom, while the countess was dangerously wounded in the chest and leg. Two revolvers, which had evidently just been used, were lying on the floor and there were several bullet holes in the wall. The countess states that the count had shown signs of madness and recently purchased two revolvers with which to protect himself against imaginary enemies. She was awakened in the dead of night by a loud report and saw her husband pointing both revolvers at her. He shot, whereupon she snatched up another revolver and fired in self-defense, killing her husband.
The count was about 50 years old and his wife is ten years younger. Before her marriage she was Helen Arvan of Dublin.

Victims of Stage Overturn.
