ENTERPRISING TOWN WILL BORE FOR OIL

Dufur Oil Company Have Practically Let New Contract---Will Sink New Well---Stockholders Encouraged

The Dufur Dispatch is authority for the statement that the Dufur Oil company has released Mr. Enos from the contract of drilling the well for them and that another contract between this company and Mr. John Farrell of Tacoma, Washington, has been agreed upon. It is expected that Mr. Farrell's attorney will arrive here Saturday with the bonds when the contract will be signed.

The conditions of the contract are about as follows: That he, Mr. Farrell, is to furnish all tools and bear all other necessary expenses, and agrees to go down to the depth of two thousand feet or no pay, unless he strikes oil before reaching that depth, at which time the company is to pay him \$10,000. But should he not strike oil and goes the two thousand feet, then the company is to forfeit the \$10,000 anyway, and if the well is drilled beyond that the said company shall pay him for his labor, but whether he is to go beyond that point or not is at the option of the company. Mr. Farrell has put up a sufficient bond

to assure the company that he means business.

This begins to look like something was going to be done, and the report will be welcomed by everybody. It is an evident fact that the way things were going the proposition was a losing one, and that good money was being squandered in keeping Mr. Enos. However, the company is now rid of him, and a new hole will be started as soon as the necessary arrangements can be made.

That there is oil here is a settled fact, and the way the matter is now being handled it will be but a short time till some indications are brought to light.

A derrick is now under course of construction, and it is the intention of the contractor to have six men at work on this well, running a day and night shift.

At a meeting of the stockholders last Saturday evening the following were chosen as directors: J. H. Heinrich, president; Capt. E. Spencer, J. C. Johnston, H. C. Dodds, T. W. Glavey, S. I. Everett and L. M. Smith.

Notice to Improve a Portion of Win-

ter Street, in the City of Salem.

Notice is hereby given that at the meeting of the common council, held April 27, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve Winter street in the city of Salem, Oregon, including intersection, from the north side of North Mill Creek bridge to the Fair Ground road in said city, in the following manner:

First, by placing in tiling not less than 24 inches in circumference across said Winter street where said Winter street is intersected by the north line of North street; where it is intersected by both the north and south line of Market street, and where it is intersected by the south line of the Fair Ground road.

Second, by establishing the grade and by grading and filling the said Winter street between said points, to conform to said grade, except as mentioned in paragraph three hereof, with full intersections.

Third, by leaving or plowing out a strip 12 feet in width, full length of the proposed improvement along the center of said street to a depth of 10 inches below the established grade of said street and when so plowed rolled with a steam roller and then filling the same to a depth of 6 inches with creek gravel and then rolling the same and upon this spread a layer of 4 inches of crushed rock well filled with rock screening, so the surface of said improvement shall be level with the established grade of said street.

Fourth, by taking away the bridge over the ditch where said Winter street intersected the Fair Grounds road and laying tiling in said ditch, and covering said tiling with dirt in such a manner that said ditch will be filled full width of said Winter street on a level with the surface of said street, save and except a strip 12 feet in width in center of said Winter street, where said Winter street intersects said ditch at which point said ditch shall be filled with dirt to only within 10 inches of the surface of said street, upon which shall be placed six inches of creek gravel and upon said gravel shall be placed 4 inches of crushed rock to be rolled as above stated, and the north line of said ditch shall be the north line of said improvement.

Fifth, the cost of such improvement shall be assessed to the abutting and adjacent property owners as provided in the charter of said city.

RIB OF IMMENSE WHALE FOUND IN NORTH INLET

Piece Sixteen Feet Long Is Unearthed with Other Parts of Leviathan's Skeleton.

Residents of North Inlet, says the Marshfield Times, have brought the rib of what must have been an immense whale, to Secretary Walter Lyon of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce. The rib is about sixteen feet long and Mr. Lyon and the par-

tise who recently unearthed it figured the rib of the bay must have been 90 feet long and to have drawn 60 feet of water. Parts of the head were found about 90 feet from the tail bones.

The discovery, indicates that North Inlet, which is now on the interior side of the bay must have been part of the ocean and the dead whale deposited there when the sea was at least 60 feet deep.

The matter has aroused considerable discussion as it indicates that

additional land is constantly being formed on the coast by the action of the sea.
