Road in Order—

CHANGE OF A LIFETIME TO VISIT SEATTLE

The battleship fleet of the United States which has just completed its memorable cruise around the Horn will be on Puget sound about May 21st to May 30th. In order to give the people of Oregon an opportunity to witness the maneuvers and inspect the fleet, the Southern Pacific will sell round trip tickets from Salem to Seattle for \$9.70; from Salem to Tacoma for \$8, under the following conditions:

Sale Dates—May 21st and 22nd to Seattle, and May 25th and 26th, 1908, to Tacoma.

Limits—Continuous passage in both directions with a final return limit of 14 days from date of sale.

This is an opportunity time for the Cherry City to run an excursion to Seattle.

NELLIE, THE QUEEN OF THE COWBOYS

Klamath Falls, Or., May 1.—Bert A. Ragan, husband of Nellie Ragan, assistant postmistress at Royston, Or., recently arrested by federal officers charged with robbing the mails, has also been arrested, charged with the same crime.

This arrest is the climax of one of the most romantic and exciting courtships in the history of the Oregon cattle country.

Nellie Bauvier Ragan, daughter of one of the big cattle kings of the southwestern part of Oregon, was noted for her ability as a horse-woman and as was known as "Nellie, the queen of the cowboys," in southern Oregon.

Many special news stories were written about her exploits. She cared for large herds herself and rode in the round-up with the men, doing a man's work on the range. Five years ago, she fell in love with Ragan and eloped with him. After a wild chase, they eluded their pursuers and were married. Last winter she was hired to take care of the Royston postoffice while the regular postmistress was away. Soon complaints came to the federal headquarters over non-delivery of valuable mail. As a result of investigation the double arrest was made. Royston is a small village stage point, about 60 miles from the railroad.
