COLLEGE PRESIDENTS MEET.

Denominational School's Will Work Together to Secure Best Possible Results.

Dr. C. A. Mock of Dallas college returned Saturday evening from Forest Grove, where he had been attending the convention of the presidents of Oregon's denominational colleges, which was called by President W. N. Ferrin, of Pacific university.

All of the denominational colleges of the Willamette Valley, with the exception of Philomath college, were represented, and a permanent organization was effected, President W. N. Ferrin, of Pacific university, being elected president, President L. W. Riley, of McMinnville college, vice-president, and President H. M. Crooks, of Albany college, secretary.

The purposes of the organization are to secure a closer cooperation between the educational institutions represented, and insure meetings of their presidents and of representative members of their faculties for the exchange of beneficial ideas, and discussion of methods for the betterment of educational systems. An effort will be made to secure uniform entrance requirements, equivalent requirements for graduation from any of the given college courses, and cooperation in the athletic work of the different institutions.

The representatives who were present at the important convention in Forest Grove last week were: President W. N. Ferrin, of Pacific University; President L. W. Riley, of McMinnville college; President H. M. Crooks, of Albany college; President Kelsey, of Newberg college; President C. A. Mock, of Dallas college and Professors Matthews and Sherwood, of Willamette university.

RATTLESNAKE DEN IN LORANE COUNTRY

J. W. and T. M. Doak, who were in Eugene from the Lorane country Monday, tell a pretty large rattlesnake story, but its truth is vouched for by well-known residents of the vicinity. They say that 47 rattlers, mostly good sized ones, have been killed in a den discovered on the Jerry Pipes place recently. The killing occurred on several different days when the weather was warm and bright and the snakes came out of their den to take a sun bath. On Sunday last, fourteen were killed.

Up to the time this den was located and watched no one in the vicinity had any idea that there were any rattlesnakes to speak of in the neighborhood and the large number killed to date has occasioned much surprise. The skins, rattles and oil of the snakes are taken care of and preserved for various uses.

prisoners, and the other report was sent in by a reporter who knew the prisoners and had heard of the arrest. The report are exhibits A and B.

Exhibit A.
Mike Wisdom is the name of a man who was arrested this afternoon for acting unwisely in posting horse show bills on telephone poles and other places, contrary to the city ordinance. With Wisdom a companion named Westgate was also arrested. The men said in pleading that they followed directions that had been given them by a bill posting concern and Judge Cameron released them after enjoining them to read up on the city ordinance and abide by it in advertising the coming event.

Exhibit B.
The memorable whiskers of "Mike" Wisdom fairly scintillated with wrath while Surveyor General G. W. Westgate was badly ruffed when these dignitaries were ruthlessly arrested by the police this afternoon for nailing horse show placards on telephone poles and other places, contrary to the peace and dignity of the city ordinances.

"Mike" and "George" are the big moguls of the Country Club and Livestock Association and they were extremely anxious to let the public know the big "joins" they intend to pull off at their \$3,000,000 amphitheater out near Sunnyside. Judge Cameron first thought that he ought to send the distinguished law breakers to the rock pile, but after giving the boys a lecture, he told them to go and sin no more.

LEFT WAR VETERAN FOR YOUNGER MAN Mrs. Lucy Jory Accused by Warrior Husband of Bigamy.

Portland special: Married when 16 years old to a veteran of the Civil war, Mrs. Lucy Jory, a one-armed woman, is accused by her warrior husband of choosing a younger mate without the formality of divorcing the first. Jory signed a complaint this morning charging his wife with polygamy, and within half an hour she was behind prison bars under the care of Matron Simmons. Her second husband, T. E. Edmondson, was also arrested and is retained at the city jail hooked on a lesser charge. Both cases will be heard by Judge Cameron tomorrow morning.

Mrs. Jory or Mrs. Edmondson is the

woman for whom a week ago the police were asked by her aged stepfather to institute search. She was located on a scow at the foot of Seventeenth street where she lived with Edmondson, whose wife she became last March in Hillsboro, after assuring him, says No. 2, she had been freed legally from her first husband. No. 1 is about 65 years old and No. 2 admits 49 years of life. The woman is 25 years old.

The history of Mrs. Jory's plight begins at Toledo, Or., about two months ago, when she disappeared suddenly from home after a long period of correspondence with nearly a dozen men she has never seen, under the auspices of a matrimonial bureau with which she advertised. She was traced to Portland by a postal card bearing her photograph, which she had sent to O. M. Rose, of Portland, one of her long-distance admirers. Her photograph was posted at police headquarters as being that of a missing woman and led to her discovery by Patrolman Ben Peterson. That she was found was reported to her husband and stepfather in Toledo, and the arrival of No. 1 and Mrs. Norton, the woman's mother, in Portland this morning is responsible for her plight here.

No. 2 is employed by the Pacific Hardware & Steel company, at Twenty-second and Nicolai streets, where he was arrested this morning. He says he married Mrs. Jory in good faith. At the time of their marriage in Hillsboro divorce proceedings were pending in Toledo county, says No. 1, but this information, avers No. 2, was withheld from him by Mrs. Jory.

INSANE PATIENT COMMITS SUICIDE

His suicidal mania getting the better of him while convalescing, J. P. Whittington, a patient at the state insane asylum, killed himself late yesterday afternoon by plunging over the balcony surrounding the porch on which he was sitting while recovering his shattered health, and crushing his skull on the cement pavement a dozen feet below. He lived but until 7 o'clock, in spite of all surgical science could do for him. The unfortunate man was committed to the asylum some months ago, being known to have a desire to end his existence, but recently he has shown such rationalness that the hospital staff believed him cured and he was placed on the porch to enjoy the fresh air and sunshine. The remains will be sent to Baker City, where relatives of the deceased reside.
