

FULTON TO BE GIVEN SENATORSHIP IN 1912

Senator's Adherents Concede Chamberlain's Election Next June--Bourne to Be Knifed and Passed Into Oblivion--Fulton Machine Leaders in Marion Will Knife Cake

A Portland special of Thursday says: Charles W. Fulton to the United States senate in 1912; Jonathan Bourne, Jr., back to a niche of fame in Oregon's hall of political history. This is the dream of Senator Fulton's friends, which vision is to be made to come to pass through the earnest four-year-long efforts of the Fulton wing of the party laboring throughout the state to put Fulton once more in the place he is now soon to leave.

Yesterday afternoon at the meeting of the state central committee the intention of Senator Fulton's friends first became plainly apparent, though ever since the primaries it has been working like yeast in a baker's trough until now all of the Fulton forces of the state are leavened.

The breach between Fulton and Bourne is to be widened until it yawns far apart, and from this time on the battle for the mastery will be carried forward. Bourne and Bourne's efforts will be shown no quarter by the friends of Senator Fulton until the former is beaten back, if possible, out of all semblance of control of the state and forced to back out of the contest for reelection gracefully or be beaten at the polls in the campaign of 1912.

Bourne Cut Out. Senator Bourne is not to be allowed to head the delegation to the national convention in May, if the friends of Senator Fulton can prevent it. It is due to Senator Fulton that he have that place and be shown that honor. His friends contend. He is outspoken in his ad-

vocacy of W. H. Taft and in that is in line with the administration at Washington. He is Taft's friend and Taft is his. He should lead the delegation and not Bourne, this is the argument and it is winning favor throughout the ranks of the party. Yesterday Senator Fulton's friends dominated the state central committee and forced upon the Bourne-Cake faction the resolution of Taft's indorsement under the threat of forfeiture of the Cake senatorial campaign. Last night, it is now claimed, a Taft delegation to the state convention from Multnomah county was selected by the county central committee.

No instruction was given the 47 delegates, but it is being argued that they are bound by the recommendation of the state central committee. Whether that may be or not it is whispered that when the votes are cast in the state convention the Multnomah delegates will show a majority of Taft supporters, and Taft spells Fulton just at this time in Oregon politics.

Out over the state, in every county, the word has been passed along and the Fulton forces are lined up for the distant battle of 1912. At every point Senator Bourne will be shoved into the background if the Fulton forces can do the trick, and until the state convention meets the friends of Fulton will be in control. From this time on Senator Bourne is to be ousted from every vantage point of political power he may possess until in 1912 he will be an easy victim to the Fulton forces. Bourne, it is argued, has done nothing for the state while in Washing-

ton, has accomplished nothing and will not to the end of his term.

Governor Chamberlain, in the private opinion of the Fulton leaders, will be the next senator at Washington, winning his pending battle with H. M. Cake, Fulton and Chamberlain in the United States senate will make a team hard to beat, it is being argued as a further contention, while Bourne and Chamberlain would make a combination not so strong.

It is recalled to mind that during the time W. H. Taft was in Oregon recently he spoke in the highest terms of Senator Fulton, holding him up as the best lawyer in the United States senate. It is pointed out that Taft and Fulton are very friendly and from statements made by the presidential candidate it is now whispered that should Taft be placed in the presidential chair and Fulton aid in putting him there by leading the Oregon delegation to Chicago solid for the administration candidate the reward would be a cabinet position, thus bringing an honor to Oregon which has not been given the state since George H. Williams held the office of attorney-general under the administration of President Grant.

But be this as it may, the fight is on between the friends of Fulton and those of Bourne for the senatorship of 1912, and it is a fight that will not be allowed to lapse until the votes are counted in June of that year.

LADD & TILTON TO INCORPORATE

Such is Current Rumor, Though Interested Parties Refuse to Discuss It.

Portland Special: Current rumor in financial circles has it that Ladd & Tilton, bankers, are about to be incorporated, although their attorneys, Williams, Wood & Linthicum, refuse to discuss the matter, on the ground that it would be unprofessional to say anything about affairs between lawyer and client until they are a matter of public record. That this institution, the oldest private bank west of the Missouri river, is being incorporated was not specifically denied.

Should the report prove well founded, it will be one of the most important developments in local financial circles that has taken place in some years and will be the first change in the policy and method of management of the bank since the day it was founded, way back in 1859.

Ladd & Tilton, Bankers, was organized as a private bank by William S. Ladd and Charles E. Tilton and Stephen A. Mead. The three had been friends in school days, Ladd & Tilton from New England and Mead from Louisiana. Mead died in the '60s and his interest in the institution was absorbed by the other two partners. In 1878 Tilton disposed of his holdings to Mr. Ladd and returned to the Atlantic coast. W. S. Ladd remained the sole owner of the bank until his death in 1893. The bank has remained in the same location where it was first founded 50 years ago, at First and Stark. The bank has grown from the first, and now it ranks among the two or three strongest private banking institutions of the entire country outside of New York city. It is owned by the Ladd estate, whose wealth can only be conjectured. The surplus of the bank runs over \$1,500,000, while the deposits are about \$14,000,000.

It is managed and controlled by William M. Ladd, Charles E. Ladd and J. Wealey Ladd.
