

VENERABLE LANE COUNTY PIONEER

James Parker, a respected Lane county pioneer, died at his home in Cloverdale, Lane county, Oregon, on April 22, 1908, after a week's illness.

He was born in Cochocton county, Ohio, March 19, 1833. While yet a child his parents moved to Indiana, and from there to Illinois. His parents died when he was fourteen years old, and in 1853 he and his younger brother, Joseph M. Parker, and two sisters, Mrs. James Parvin and Mrs. John Stoop, crossed the plains to Oregon, settling in Rattlesnake valley, this county, and from there he moved to Pleasant Hill and in 1868 he bought and moved to the farm on which he lived until his death.

October 1, 1857, he was married to Phoebe E. Rigdon, who died July 14, 1904, and to them were born eleven children, eight sons and three daughters, nine of whom survive him, Luella M. (deceased), Hortensia L., Clarence A., Edith B., John C., James C., Leroy C., Guy W. and Augustus. One sister, Mrs. James Parvin, and three brothers, J. M. and W. R. Parker, of Dexter, this county, and Martin Parker, of Springfield, Missouri, survive him.

He served during the Rogue River Indian war and as commissioner for four years as a Democrat, and was elected without making a canvass of the county, and against a very large Republican majority.

Uncle Jim and Aunt Phoebe, as they were known by their many friends, were noted for their hospitality, and will be greatly missed by the community in which they lived so many years.
