## NOTHER RINGING MESSAGE FROM PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT

Memorial from the Sacramento (Rep.) President Roosevelt has sent to Congress a message which will be read almost in full on another page today's Bee. It reads clear, strong, manly and unequivocal, with the true Rooseveltian ring. It is a campaign document, as embodied his enemies will deprecate. It strikes a new note in campaign documents, for it is plain, straightforward, direct, to the point, unequivocal on the vital issues before the American people. There is no "if" or "but" about it. There is no equivocation, or semidoubt, or attempt at explanation, endeavor to cajole or appease. It goes directly and straight from the shoulder. There is no proposition of great importance at present before Congress that it does not touch, and with no tender hand. It goes each proposition with the grip of the man of mettle. It has no apologies to make to the respectable citizens of either the aristocratic lower class or the anti-aristocratic millionaire class. It again places them both in the same category and holds up to the scorn and contempt of all decent American citizens. The American people will not forget these ringing words in a message.

The man who preaches hatred of an honestly acquired, who inates envy and jealousy and malicious ill-will toward those who follows who, by thrift, energy and industry, have become men of means is a menace to the community. But his counterpart is to be found in that particular kind of millionaire who is almost the most enviable and is certainly one of the most desirable of all our citizens; the man of whom it has been said that while his face has grown old and cruel while his body has grown soft; whose son is a fool and whose daughter a foreign princess; whose nominal pleasures are at best those of a tasteless and extravagant luxury, and whose real delight, whose real life work, is the accumulation and use of power in its most subtle and least elevating form. In the chaos of an absolutely unre-

stricted commercial individualism under modern conditions this is a type that becomes prominent as inevitably as the marauding barons became prominent in the physical chaos of the dark ages.

Such language will undoubtedly be reprehended and seriously criticized by the millionaire malefactors of the land and by their boughten or bootblack parasites in the press—by the Harper's Weeklies of the East and toady Argonauts of the West.

But those manly words—in fact, all the manly words of this manly message—will find a responsive chord in the heart of every true American citizen who loves his country, who despises theft, and who demands the punishment not alone of the poor malefactor, but as well of the millionaire baron who lives by public plunder and by private scoundrelism, unfortunately winked at if not approved under the bastard guise of "necessary business measures."

## CANDIDATE KNOX IN WAITING MOOD

Washington, May 1.—(Special.)—Senator P. C. Knox of Pennsylvania was a highly complimented man by being invited to repeat at Carnegie hall, New York, on April 22, the speech that he delivered at Kalamazoo, Mich., on February 11. The title of this speech was "The People, the Railroads and the National Authority," and was a comprehensive and able resume of the assumption of control over the railroads by the federal government.

At the time this speech was first delivered it attracted wide attention and the Civic Forum of New York was so impressed with it that its members requested Senator Knox to come to New York and repeat the address, which he did. It is seldom that an address by a public man is thus honored. Usually a speech, even though it be an able discussion of a living topic, soon passes into history. In this case Mr. Knox embodied in an hour's talk so much valuable material of such an enlightening character, that the prominent and intellectual men who compose the Civic Forum considered it worthy of repetition.

Senator Knox has been besieged with invitations to make addresses in all parts of the country but with a few exceptions he has been obliged to decline them. Mr. Knox has an old-fashioned notion to the effect that a senator is under obligations to stay in Washington during the sessions of congress and attend to the duties of his office and he does not consider himself free to absent himself frequently. The days that he has missed at the capital when the senate was in session have been very few and his absence then was only due to important business that required his attention.

On Decoration Day Senator Knox has promised to make the oration at the Gettysburg battlefield and arrangements are now in progress for this event. Two years ago the orator for Memorial Day on that historic ground was President Roosevelt and some of the greatest men of the nation have been honored with invitations to speak there. The subject of Senator Knox's speech has not been announced but it will be of a historical and patriotic character rather than an economic discussion.

Upon the adjournment of congress, probably about the middle of May, Senator Knox will go to his farm at Valley Forge for the summer. He will preserve the same attitude towards the presidential nomination that he has from the start, and will make no canvass in an attempt to get delegates. He will not attend the Chicago convention but will remain at his country home all summer.

### BIG PONY SHOW COMING TO SALEM.

When the Greater Norris & Rowe circus, museum, menagerie, hippodrome and congress of nations exhibits in this city Monday, May 4th, a clown will be noticed with a bizarre adornment that rivals the acrobatic piano virtuoso, Paderewski. This clown's name is down on the program as Mickey Feeley—a rather Celtic sounding cognomen. His name in reality is Prince Romanoff (pseudonym) Pertowski—a genuine Russian nobleman, who was accused while attending the University of St. Petersburg, of conspiring against the interests of the "Little Father of all the Russians," Nicholas, the Czar, and in order to escape with his neck he emigrated to the "land of the free and the home of the brave," and is taking chances twice a day on the neck that he fled from Russia to protect. Mickey, as he is affectionately called by his fellow performers has a peppery disposition, but is a good fellow and is well liked. His royal blood sometimes gets to boiling in his blue veins at some imaginary wrongs and straight away he sends in his resignation, that he might return home and revolutionize the state of affairs in his fatherland. Mr. Rowe takes him in hand on such occasions and persuades him that it is infinitely better to turn double somersaults over a herd of elephants, and other hazardous feats in the circus than return to Russia and work in the salt mines the rest of his life and the argument generally wins out. The Prince, or Mickey, is unquestionably the greatest acrobat in the world. This fellow does the almost incredible feat of turning a double somersault from the bare ground, and his full double twist and round off doubles are feats that will thrill the most blasé. Norris and Rowe have over forty acrobats, and clowns

with their new big circus, but the prince is the best by long odds. During the engagement of the big circus in San Francisco, the Russian Consul and some of the most influential Russians in the city were at the circus daily. No doubt they did not like the idea of one of the royal blood of Russia turning somersaults and making funny faces for a living, but they had to acknowledge the prince a success. Norris and Rowe guard Mickey from prospective heiresses, but the Prince is a revolutionist, not a man to be purchased for a few dollars and to sit in a hot house, like a toy for some rich woman.

### CHILD IS FATALLY BURNED AT COBURG

The Little Girl of Jack Bucknaa the Victim.

Dr. W. Kuykendall was called to Coburg in consultation with Dr. Jaraagin over the case of the little three-year-old daughter of Jack Bucknaa of Coburg, who had been very seriously if not fatally burned. The little tot has been playing outside with some playmates around an open fire and got too near the flames. Her clothing took fire and before help came she was so badly burned about the body, head and face that it is thought her injuries will cost the little one her life. All that can be done is being done for her, but the body is terribly burned.

### ter Street, in the City of Salem.

Notice is hereby given that at the meeting of the common council, held April 27, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve Winter street in the city of Salem, Oregon, including intersection, from the north side of North Mill Creek bridge to the Fair Ground road in said city, in the following manner: First, by placing in filling not less than 24 inches in circumference across said Winter street where said Winter street is intersected by the north line of North street; where it is intersected by both the north and south line of Market street, and where it is intersected by the south line of the Fair Ground road.

Second, by establishing the grade and by grading and filling the said Winter street between said points, to conform to said grade, except as mentioned in paragraph three hereof, with full intersections.

Third, by leaving or plowing out a strip 12 feet in width, full length of the proposed improvement along the center of said street to a depth of 10 inches below the established grade of said street and when so plowed, rolled with a steam roller and then filled the same to a depth of 6 inches with creek gravel and then rolling the same and upon this spread a layer of 4 inches of crushed rock well filled with rock screening, so the surface of said improvement shall be level with the established grade of said street.

Fourth, by taking away the bridge over the ditch where said Winter street intersected the Fair Grounds road and laying tiling in said ditch, and covering said tiling with dirt in such a manner that said ditch will be filled full width of said Winter street on a level with the surface of said street, save and except a strip 12 feet in width in center of said Winter street, where said Winter street intersects said ditch at which point said ditch shall be filled with dirt to only within 10 inches of the surface of said street, upon which shall be placed six inches of creek gravel and upon said gravel shall be placed 4 inches of crushed rock to be rolled as above stated, and the north line of said ditch shall be the north line of said improvement.

Fifth, the cost of such improvement shall be assessed to the abutting and adjacent property owners as provided in the charter of said city.
