MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION FOR CLEANUP DAY ON FRIDAY MAY 8

Then What is Left Can Be Got Away With Saturday and There is Plenty To Do

Mayor Rodgers' proclamation setting the day for the grand clean-up and stating the best way in which to aid the work is, as follows:

TO THE PEOPLE OF SALEM:
With admirable foresight, the builders of our city platted it on broad lines, with wide streets, convenient alleys, and deep blocks affording unusual opportunity for adornment. As a natural sequence, Salem justly prides itself on its spacious lawns, stately trees, splendid parks, and beautiful homes. It has come to realize in some measure, the "Salem Beautiful" of our dreams.

But the time for spring house cleaning is here and the city should not lay claim to exemption from this domestic routine any more than any other well ordered house; in fact, our very pretense to attractiveness is the best reason we can assign for a general clean-up of our city. Therefore, with the purpose in view of arousing greatest civic pride in the minds of our people, I call upon the residents of Salem to set aside one day in a united effort to clean house, and in order that this may be brought about, I hereby designate Friday, May 8th, 1908, as "Clean-Up Day."

Let all who can set aside their customary occupations for the afternoon of that day and aid in the general movement.

I request that all schools, public and private, declare a half holiday for the afternoon of "Clean-Up Day" in order that the children may participate in the work and receive an object lesson in civic cleanliness. Enlist the children everywhere.

Will merchants and employers permit as many of their employees as possible to take the afternoon.

A very important request I have to make is for volunteer teams—we want one hundred teams and wagons to haul refuse. Those having a single horse or team or wagon are requested to send in their names and addresses to my office as soon as possible.

Let everybody help. Let us make a clean sweep that day. Let the broom be the emblem of our endeavors.

I am going to give a few hints. Don't think me impertinent or personal. We are all sinners.

If you have a vacant lot with old boards, boxes and cast off implements on it, heap the stuff up and burn it. We are going to permit bonfires anywhere on that day, providing they are not placed near buildings and are watched. Put cans, metal and what can't be burned, into boxes and barrels on the curb or alley and notify my office. It will be hauled away free.

If you have a barn on the alley, remember you have no right to throw the litter or store your vehicles in the alley driveway. Clean it up. It belongs to the public.

Fix the old barn up. Why not paint it? It needs it. If your sidewalk is bad, don't wait to be forced to fix it. Prop up that decrepit fence.

Brush and weeds are beautiful on the wild hills of the Cascades, but scarcely so along your sidewalk and fences. Make war on the weeds.

If your backyard is strewn with old barrels, discarded furniture and other relics, assemble them and pronounce the benediction with a match.

If your children scatter papers and litter on the sidewalks or adjoining premises, have them clean it up. Teach them that it is a public offense.

Have the children sow vines or flowers to cover up the old back fence and woods.

Level up the lawn along the curb.

If you are a corporation and have poles that lean like those of a neglected hopyard, straighten them, repainted, in up. Unpainted poles must be

THE MERRY CIRCUS COMES ON MONDAY

With the Greater Norris & Rowe circus, museum, menagerie, hippodrome and congress of nations which will exhibit in this city Monday, May 4th, afternoon and night, is a family of acrobats that go under the name of the Astral St. Leons. This family was engaged, and came direct from Melbourne, Australia to the Norris and Rowe circus. There are seven members to the troupe, and among them are performers that turn double full twisters, and double somersaults from the bare ground a feat that has been accomplished but by three

performers in the world, and then on rare occasions only. In their contract with Norris and Rowe they agree to perform this almost incredible act at every representation of the show. During the run of the circus in San Francisco this spring of sixty performances, 279,873 persons paid admissions to the big show and the St. Leons made one of the big distinct hits of the program, which includes performers from every country in the world. Their act cannot be described—"it beggars description." The new big street parade will take place at 10 o'clock. By arrangement, the Norris and Rowe circus will be the only big show to visit this section of the country this year.

STEAMER RATES FROM ASTORIA

Mr. Del Dinsmore has the following letter relating to an all-ocean trip to Seattle, accompanying the fleet up to Puget Sound and spending a day there among the warships: "Replying to yours of April 28th, will say that I can reserve fifty tickets for you until the 10th day of May. We shall expect you to be responsible for the collection of the money for these and while we do not know what the tickets will cost, will say that they will cost no more than the exact charter price of the ship. We shall probably have the largest ship on the Pacific Coast, which will carry a thousand people. We know positively that it will not cost more than \$5 a ticket with 500 people aboard and with a thousand people aboard, which is entirely likely, we do not think it will cost more than \$3 a ticket and may be not that much. We will be able to fix the exact amount of the purchase price of the ticket by the 15th of May. In order to obviate any difficulties along this line, we are telling each passenger that he must be prepared, if necessary, to pay \$5 for his ticket but that we will get it as much cheaper for him as possible."

BIDS FOR ELKS BUILDING AT ALBANY.

The bids for the new Elks' building at Albany were opened by the committee, proving somewhat larger than was anticipated, and were as follows: W. M. Welch, Salem, \$30,086; G. C. Maurer, Salem, \$29,095; H. J. Clark, Grants Pass, \$27,728, without the wiring which amounts to \$400; I. F. Conn, Albany, \$31,000; J. A. McChesney, Albany, \$31,100.

The committee, consisting of Gale S. Hill, chairman, E. D. Cusick, C. H. Burzgraff, H. K. Luger, J. J. Collins, Wm. Eagles, H. A. Hecker, F. W. Schultz, J. R. Wyatt and E. J. Seelye, will consider the bids.

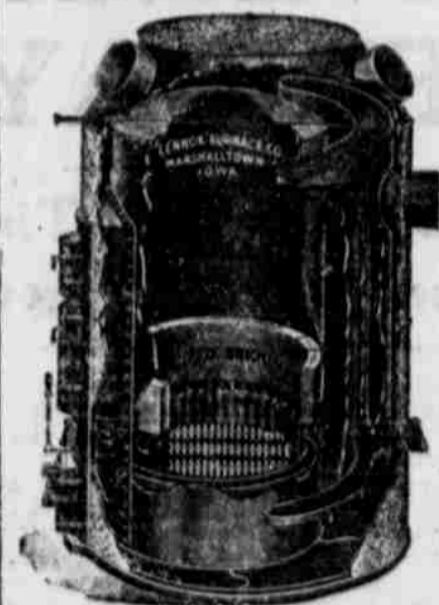

Notice.

To improve a portion of N. Cottage street, D street and Seventh street in the city of Salem, Notice is hereby given that at the regular meeting of the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, held April 20, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve North Cottage street in the city of Salem, Oregon, between the north line of North Mill Creek and the south line of D street; D street in the city of Salem, Oregon, between the west line of North Cottage street and the east line of Seventh street; Seventh street in the city of Salem, between the north line of D street and the south line of the Fair Ground Road, in the following manner:

By establishing a permanent grade on said streets between said points.
Said improvement shall include intersections and be continuous, extending from the north line of North Mill creek to the south line of Fair Grounds Road, and said streets along the center thereof for a width of 16 feet shall be excavated to a depth of 10 inches below the grade of said streets, and when so excavated, shall be filled with clean creek or river gravel, so the surface of said improvement shall be level with the grade of said street. Said dirt so excavated shall be used in making a uniform grade so said street for full width will have proper drainage.

The cost of said improvement shall be assessed on abutting and adjacent property, as provided in the charter of said city.
Remonstrances against the above improvement may be filed within 20 days from the date of the first publication of this notice.
