HARRIMAN HOLDS OREGON IN HIS GRASP

Will Build No Railroads and Let No One Else Build any Railroads In Our State - Time to Fight

Following is the remarkable editorial in the Portland Journal of May 2nd: More Railroads In Sight. The expense made a few weeks ago by railroad presidents that they would borrow no money with which to build and improve, even if good roads were no longer. The Pennsylvania road recently offered \$30,000,000 of bonds, one third in New York and two thirds in London, at a moderate rate of interest, and in other cities the amounts were at once subscribed many times.

reasonable way to regulate railroads to some extent, to which perhaps Mr. Harriman objects but the people of Oregon have always been ready and willing to treat his corporation very liberally and are so now. They are willing that he should continue to make large profits out of them, but they cannot feel otherwise than indignant when, after doing so, he spends all the money elsewhere and year after year leaves great, rich regions of the state without a railroad, after repeatedly promising railroads through those regions, and making moves to prevent others from building them.

But "what are you going to do about it?" Mr. Harriman may ask. "I care nothing about you; I practically own the state, and it being mine I have a right to leave it undeveloped if I choose." This is the tone of Mr. Harriman's non-action from year to year. And he seems to be secure in his position. What indeed are we 700,000 helpless people going to do about it?

The Stimulation of Fatigue. That one may be stimulated by fatigues seems a contradiction of terms. It is now generally held, however, that fatigue is due to poisoning by waste products of muscular activity, and recent experiment goes to show that these products at first stimulate rather than retard action. This is what we call "warming up" to our work, which is partly due to improvement in the

circulation, but chiefly to a positive stimulating effect. Says the American Journal of Public Hygiene (Boston, February): "The conception that fatigue products at first favor activity and only later retard it may be of great value in clearing up various hygienic problems. Take for example the explanation of sleep. The lapse into unconsciousness after the customary hours of waking may be primarily due to cerebral anemia produced by the failure of the vasomotor center to maintain full activity, as Dr. Howell supposes. But back of this direct cause lies the general question of fatigue products and their action upon the system. Upon the old assumption that such substances must always be depressing, it was difficult to see why the efficiency of the body did not steadily decline from a maximum early in the day to evening levels little above that of sleep. That the general command of mental faculties and muscular resources is often at its best in the evening was not easily explained. The facts of the case are readily covered by Dr. Lee's observation. It is perfectly conceivable that nerve centers as well as muscle fibers may be rendered irritable by the same chemical agents which will later narcotize them."

PIONEER BANK IS NOW CORPORATION

Articles Filed by Ladd & Tilton, Portland, with a Capital Stock of \$2,000,000. Articles of incorporation were filed Saturday by the Ladd & Tilton bank. The institution commenced business as a corporation Monday after a most 50 years of existence as a private bank. The capital stock is \$2,000,000, fully paid up, and the institution shows a surplus of \$400,000 at the outset of its corporate career.

The management of the bank will be the same as heretofore; the necessity for incorporation arises from the increasing business of the institution. This can be handled better by a corporation than by a private bank and in case of the death or disability of any of those who control the bank, the business cannot be affected in any way, where as if the private bank were continued, much probate business and straightening out of the estate would necessarily follow the death of any one in control of the institution.

Moreover, other large interests will hereafter be associated with the bank, notably Frederic B. Pratt, of the firm of Pratt & Co., New York. Mr. Pratt is the brother-in-law of W. M. Ladd and represents the very large Pratt fortune founded by Charles Pratt who was a prominent citizen of Brooklyn, N. Y., where he founded the Pratt Institute, a large industrial school, and did much to relieve the condition of the poor, among other things, building model dwellings for workmen.

Elect Directors' Board. Stockholders of the bank held meetings yesterday afternoon and the following directors were elected: Edward Cookingham, Henry L. Corbett, William M. Ladd, Charles E. Ladd, J. Wesley Ladd, S. B. Linthicum and Theodore B. Wilcox, all of Portland, and Frederic B. Pratt, of New York. Directors then met and elected the following officers: President, William M. Ladd; vice-president, Edward Cookingham; cashier, W. H. Dunckley; assistant cashiers, R. S. Howard, Jr., J. W. Ladd and Walter M. Cook.

The new corporation is the only banking business in the city with a capitalization of \$2,000,000, the First National and the United States National each having a capital stock of \$500,000. The capital stock of the new bank will be divided into 16,000 shares, having a par value of \$100 each. The Ladd & Tilton Bank was founded by W. S. Ladd in 1859. Since his death in 1893 it has been carried on by his sons. A statement of the bank's condition, prepared yesterday, shows the institution to be in a highly satisfactory condition.
