COPPER STRIKE IN NEW MEXICO

(United Press Leased Wire.) Santa Fe, N. M., May 4.—Eastern New Mexico in general and Roosevelt county in particular is excited over the discovery of a deposit of copper which may rival that of Michigan or Montana.

A few days ago while drilling a well for water on a homestead claim 16 miles south of the town of La Lando, the drill penetrated a vein of native copper of peculiar richness. The news spread rapidly and within 24 hours after the discovery had become known, 400 claims were staked out in the immediate vicinity. The rush is still on. Livery men have had their horses driven to death and their rigs broken up; men and women have traveled until foot-sore and hungry, but in spite of all the ill incident to sand and sun, "locators" continue to pour into the district to locate and stake out mining claims.

A government mining expert has arrived on the scene to ascertain the extent and quality of the deposit. A test of ore made by a local chemist shows that it bears an excellent quality of copper of unusual richness. There is also a high percentage of silver.

BAILEY PROBABLE A WINNER

(United Press Leased Wire.) Austin, Tex., May 4.—Whether or not Senator Bailey has suffered defeat at the primaries held to elect a delegate-at-large to the Democratic national convention is still in doubt today, although there are indications that he has won by a slight majority that is a great disappointment to himself and friends.

The senator's opponents are claiming, however, that he has been defeated. They say his late roots in the 25,000 votes that are still lacking. These will be counted today. Judging from the best information obtainable, Senator Bailey's friends say his majority will be 10,000. It is said that not more than 225,000 votes were cast in the state. The great interest taken in the contest is evidenced by the many bets made. In one instance a pool of \$50,000 was wagered by five bankers that the senator would have a majority of not less than 25,000.

Thousands in Frisco

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, May 4.—Today the influx of fleet visitors began in earnest, every train bringing scores of people, not only from all parts of California, but from Oregon, Washington, Nevada, Arizona and Utah as well. The hotels are beginning to fill up and by Tuesday night it is expected that they will be crowded to the limit.

The work of decorating the city continues and by Wednesday morning there will not be a business house in the downtown section that is not covered from roof to pavement with flags and bunting.

Tons of lithographs, picturing the fleet and portraits of Rear Admiral Evans have been employed in the general decorations and never in the history of the city have so many flags been displayed.

The cities on the other side of the bay are as well dressed as San Francisco and are making every preparation to aid in giving the officers and men of the fleet the time of their lives.

Arrangements for the great parade on Thursday are as yet incomplete, but the plans thus far made promise a magnificent pageant.

TWO DROWNED IN TERRIBLE STORM

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, Cal., May 4.—While a score of persons on the shores watched the tragedy, powerless to give assistance two young men whose identity has not been established, and who had braved the dangers of deep sea fishing in a light skiff in yesterday's fierce storm off San Pedro, fought desperately for a few minutes as their light craft was wrested from their control and then sank to a watery grave.

Caught in the rough water beyond the protection of the breakwater one was swept overboard and carried out to sea, while the other boat and its remaining occupant were driven before the fierce southwest wind into the breakers off Alamitos ferry, where the shell was overturned and the second victim drowned.

Neither of the bodies was recovered.

FISH HAS RESIGNED

New York, May 4.—Stanislaus Fish, former president of the Illinois Central railroad, today resigned as a member of the executive commission and as a director of the Missouri Pacific railroad. He explained that his other interests kept him so busy that he had no time to devote to the affairs of the railroad.

THIRTY BURNED

(Continued from page one.)

Remains of victims had been found in various hospitals throughout the city several guests of the hotel suffering with broken limbs, internal injuries and bruises and cuts sustained in leaping from windows in being trampled upon in the mad rush for safety.

Pathetic scenes are being enacted about the heaps of ruins by men and women whose missing hands and relatives are thought to be buried in the debris. There is no hope of getting an accurate list of missing and dead today, for the register was burned up and there are no other means of getting information at once.

Chief of Police Ankenbruck said that as far as he can learn the list may reach 40, although there is no way of confirming this. The rescuers are working under great difficulty. Before they can expect to reach any more bodies they must remove, piece by piece, great quantities of brick and charred timbers. The fire started at 3:30 o'clock Sunday morning in an elevator shaft and few minutes later the old frame building, which was erected 15 years ago, was a mass of flames. It burned so rapidly that those who were hemmed in by the flames were burned alive.

STREET WORK HAS BEGUN

The work of making the first preparation to lay the pavement on State street was actually started this morning beginning at Twelfth street where a force of 12 men placed curbs and corner boxes, and the graders were put in action this afternoon cutting down the high places and filling up the low ones preparatory for the first coat of crushed rock.

The Warren Construction company's engineer established the grade and set the grade stakes yesterday so that the work of getting the street down to a uniform grade can be pushed along as fast as possible, and it is believed by him that there will be no trouble whatever in getting the street in shape for paving, although quite a little work will no doubt have to be done before a perfect drainage can be had.

The street railway company has placed their rails on the grounds to be laid as soon as possible and Manager Page states the work will be pushed as rapidly as money and men can do it.

Sealed bids will be presented to the city council at the regular meeting tonight for the paving of Commercial street, and the contract will no doubt be awarded the lowest bidder.

RUMORED \$500,000 STOLEN

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Pittsburg, Pa., May 4.—Instead of the loss occasioned by the robbing of the Adams Express company car on the Panhandle railroad last Thursday night being \$600 as has been stoutly maintained by officials of the company up to day, it is now rumored that the loss will reach close to \$500,000.

The robbery is said by members of the Pittsburg detective force to be one of the biggest ever pulled off in the United States.

Today, men and boys found more gold coin in the vicinity of the scene of the hold-up at Walker's mills. A number of \$5-gold pieces were found as well as a quantity of gold leaf. Hundreds searched the neighborhood for the stolen plunder, which many people believe has been "cached" by the robbers.

ROOSEVELT WILL TAKE NO PART

Washington, May 4.—Hands off, no interference with the campaign; no speeches; no trips into the provinces; no trips into the provinces to help the Republican candidate.

As during last summer and several summers previously, the President will not be "at home" to uninvited guests during his coming vacation.

It is believed, however, by the Taft supporters that should he suddenly find that he needs a "boost" in this or that hotly contested section, the President would stand ready to go to his rescue and make a speech in his behalf. Even the President's closest friends admit that he is quite likely to pitch into the fight if his candidate should be in peril or his policies should be seriously attacked.

CROWDS SEE THE BIG CIRCUS

The big circus and menagerie arrived in this city early and the parade left the show grounds at about 10 o'clock and was witnessed by a great throng of interested spectators. The town is filled with visitors from the surrounding country.

The doors to the menagerie and big shows were thrown open to the public at 1 o'clock and the performance in the big tent was started at 2:15 with a grand entree around the hippodrome track in which all the performers with the big show participated. The spectacle of all the ladies and gentlemen performers of the show, in their beautiful costumes made a very pleasing effect. ORCHARD WILL KNOW HIS FATE SOON

Boise, Id., May 4.—Harry Orchard's fate will be determined by the Idaho state board of pardons at their special session tomorrow. The recommendation that the sentence of death be commuted, made by Judge Wood at the time the sentence was pronounced, will be presented by Orchard's attorney, and it is believed that no one present will protest against such action. Orchard is sentenced to be hanged on May 15. It is understood that Orchard himself is opposed to the commutation of sentence.

INTERESTING DISCUSSION OF PUBLIC MEASURES

A vast amount of interest was taken in a meeting held yesterday at the G. A. R. hall, which had for its purpose the discussion of the measures which are to come before the people at the June election. The idea, which is quite an original one, is to take up a measure each Sunday and discuss it in general, not in debate, but for their own particular enlightenment.

At the meeting yesterday, the recall measure was taken up and discussed at a considerable length and many left the hall stating they were under a much better understanding of it, and were now in a position to vote on the same, whereas before they attended the meeting, it was their intention to let it go by default rather than chance voting wrong.

Next Sunday, initiative measure providing for the \$125,000 appropriation for the state university and armory bill will be discussed at length. A large crowd is expected to attend, owing to the prominence of and the interest being taken in the appropriation bill, which for some time past has been a rather large bone of contention among a number of factions.
