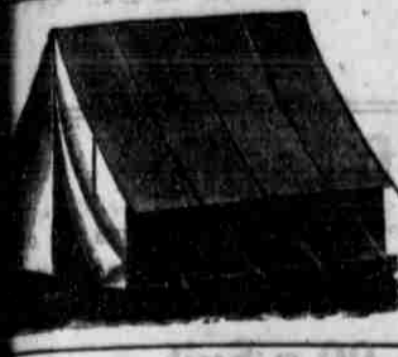

Yesterday's contest between the Salem-Oregon City Tri-City leaguers ended as disastrous, if not more so, than Saturday's game, as the locals could not scrape up a score, although they slammed Pitcher Robinson of Oregon City around the lot at a lively clip, but was unable to get a safe hit at the right moment, while the Oregon City visitors touched up Archie Jerman for six hits, which were all made while men were on bases, and along with several costly errors made by the Cherry Pickers, they had things going their way considerably. The Oregon City bunch collected the most of their scores in the third inning when Sater made a clean hit over second for one base, and was put on second by Hill, who drove a long one to Hull in right field who failed to get a good grip on it, and Chapin then done the deed by hitting out to Edwards who also could not make a successful catch, allowing Sater to score leaving Hill on second and Chapin on first, and Kelt brought them both in by getting a two-base hit making three scores due partly to errors.
The last run made by the visiting team was not earned. Hill slammed a hot one to Newell at short who handled it badly permitting him to get first, and Chapin put him home with a two-base hit.
Although yesterday was the best day of the season for a ball game in this city, it was not at all favorable for the players, owing to it being much too cool and a slight wind blowing. A good many of the Salem fans were on hand to boost for the Cherry Pickers and the grandstand was fairly well inhabited by the fair sex who braved the dubious weather.

CHEMAWA SCHOOL WINS RELAY RACE
The Y. M. C. A. Chemawa Indian school relay race from this city to Portland last Saturday was won by the latter, who made the run in 5 hours and 16 minutes, beating their opponents out by 24 minutes and 18 seconds and cutting the record they made last year over the same course down by 10 minutes.
A celebration was held at the Indian school Saturday night in honor of the victory of their runners. The following is a schedule of the race, showing the time made in each lap by runners on both sides; after Gervais was reached the Indian team 4 1/2 minutes in the lead:
Woodburn, Indian passed at 10:21; Y. M. C. A. man at 10:24.
Aurora, Indian passed at 11:31; Y. M. C. A. man at 11:40.
Barlow, Indian passed at 11:50; Y. M. C. A. man at 12 noon.
New Era, Indian passed at 12:18; Y. M. C. A. man at 12:32.
Oregon City, Indian passed 25 minutes ahead of Y. M. C. A. man.
Portland, Indian runner arrived at 2:16 p. m., and the Portland Y. M. C. A. man reached the finish at 2:40:18.

GERMAN AMERICANS ORGANIZE

At the organization of the Salem German-American Verein about 50 were present. A constitution and by-laws were adopted and many members enrolled. Active and honorary members are provided for. It was decided that the president and vice-president serve for the honor without salary, the treasurer to receive \$1 a year and the secretary's salary to be fixed quarterly. The Verein will hold meetings on the last Sunday of each month at 2:30 p. m., as the members are largely working men. The regular annual meeting is to occur on the last Sunday in November. Special meetings can be called on petition of six members to the president. Membership dues are \$1. with quarterly dues 50 cents. It is the intention to organize a German Gesang Verein in connection with the organization.

Rev. C. Christian Theo. Hoff, of the State street Lutheran church, was elected president; E. Hofer, vice-president; Wm. Humburg, secretary; Eugene Eckert, treasurer. The Portland delegation consisting of Otto Kleeman, Henry Breitbarth, Dr. F. A. Dammach, and Ernest Peculy were unanimously elected honorary members. Dr. Arthur von Jensen was appointed to organize the Gesang Verein, called for volunteers and a number enrolled.
The organization started with 66 charter members.

NOTICE

Notice to Improve a Portion of Winter Street in City of Salem.
Notice is hereby given that at the meeting of the common council, held April 27, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve Winter street in the city of Salem, Oregon, including intersection, from the north side of North Mill Creek bridge to the Fair Ground road in said city, in the following manner:
First, by placing in tiling not less than 24 inches in circumference across said Winter street where said Winter street is intersected by the north line of North street; where it is intersected by both the north and south line of Market street, and where it is intersected by the south line of the Fair Ground road.
Second, by establishing the grade and by grading and filling the said Winter street between said points, to conform to said grade, except as mentioned in paragraph three hereof, with full intersections.
Third, by leaving or plowing out a strip 12 feet in width, full length of the proposed improvement along the center of said street to a depth of 10 inches below the established grade of said street and when so plowed rolled with a steam roller and then filling the same to a depth of 6 inches with creek gravel and then rolling the same and upon this spread a layer of 4 inches of crushed rock well filled with rock screening, so the surface of said improvement shall be level with the established grade of said street.
Fourth, by taking away the bridge over the ditch where said Winter street intersected the Fair Grounds road and laying tiling in said ditch, and covering said tiling with dirt in such a manner that said ditch will be filled full width of said Winter street on a level with the surface of said street, save and except a strip 12 feet in width in center of said Winter street, where said Winter street intersects said ditch at which point said ditch shall be filled with dirt to only within 10 inches of the surface of said street, upon which shall be placed six inches of creek gravel and upon said gravel shall be placed 4 inches of crushed rock to be rolled as above stated, and the north line of said ditch shall be the north line of said improvement.
Fifth, the cost of such improvement shall be assessed to the abutting and adjacent property owners as provided in the charter of said city.
