A 1000-Mile Motorcycle Run. A motorcycle stunt, which for size and importance has never been equalled in this country, has been planned by the newly organized Western District of the Federation American Motorcyclists. At the end of the National Federation annual meet, which will be held in New York early in July, the Western District members will start for Chicago on a wheel, and will follow a devious course, taking in all the large cities in the East and Middle West. The present plans are carried out, the trip will eat up some 1600 miles and will account for not less than ten days. The finish will be enlivened by a western district championship meet at a track in or near Chicago. Probably the Harlem or Libertyville track will be chosen. The tour is proposed in order to arouse interest in the two-wheel vehicle, and to demonstrate its efficiency and reliability under hard highway conditions demanding considerable sustained speed. The idea is said to be favored by the manufacturers generally, and virtually all of the important makes of motorcycles will be represented.

The touring committee of the Western District, F. A. M., under whose management the run will be undertaken, consists of I. F. Alofsin, of Chicago, chairman; Irving R. Hall, John F. Ball, of Milwaukee; W. E. Rheutan, of Aurora; John T. Fisher, Edward A. Thiem, of Minneapolis and John S. Woodworth. Rules similar to those used on Glidden automobile tours will be drafted for this occasion.

Motorcycles for Fire Use. A fire-fighting motorcycle is the latest novelty among the two-wheelers. It carries a reel with one hundred feet of hose, and is so designed that it can make speedy runs to the scene of the flames. The hose carried is of a standard size and can be fitted to the nearest hydrant. Such a machine is now in use in several cities throughout Italy, and fire chiefs in this country are seriously considering their use over here. Some experimental work is already under way by American designers, to this end.

Cyclists Scooting in Wheeling. "The bicycle craze has struck this burg again," says the Wheeling, W. Va., News, "and the merchants say

that more wheels are now being sold than for several years past. Every night there is a small army of cyclists scooting around town."

Bike Men Gather at Toronto. Toronto, Ontario, has just played host to the Canadian retail bicycle dealers, whose convention this year was marked by larger numbers and more enthusiasm than has been witnessed in similar gatherings for a long time. The Toronto World, in commenting on the convention said: "Increased sales put the bike man in a happy frame of mind, and make his conversation gain the air of the silver-tongued orator. Canadian sales so far this year are away ahead of the same period last year, and the season promises to be a banner one."

Lawson to Ride at Vailsburg. Iver Lawson, the famous Salt Lake City crack, has signed a new contract with the Vailsburg (N. J.) board track management, and he will ride at the meets to be held on the six-lap oval this season. The new contract supersedes a former one that was not entirely satisfactory to the rider. Frank Kramer has already signed, and the two noted rivals will appear at the opening meet. An elaborate program is being prepared for this occasion, at which, besides the usual number of professional and amateur sprint races, a motorcycle race for amateurs has been scheduled. This last event will prove much more interesting and exciting than was the rule on the old four-lap track. It is also expected that Major Taylor will be secured for the midweek events.

A Gas Company Motor Corps. An extremely interesting use for motorcycles has been figured out by the Milwaukee Gas Light company, which adds greatly to the service it renders. With the monthly bills the company sends out a post card showing the free service the company undertakes for its patrons. This service has to do with adjustments of range burners, gas light mantles, and the many other gas problems which the woman of the house is often called upon to solve. When the help of the company's experts is needed, the patron drops the card into the nearest letter box. From ten to thirty cards are in the company's mail every morning, and a force of six motorcycle-mounted burner men starts out to visit the trouble centers. In addition to this sort of service, the machines are utilized in many other ways that save time and money for the company.

Kansas City Likes the Motorcycle. Kansas City is rather hilly for bicycle riders, though the present year has shown a notable increase in the number of wheels used there. But hills do not bother the motorcycle to any great extent, and that type of machine has leaped into great popularity in the city of bluffs.

A motorcycle pleasure club of one hundred members has already been formed, and it is claimed that there are not less than one hundred and twenty-five other motor cycles in daily use.

Chief Ahern, of Kansas City has been advocating the formation of a police motorcycle squad for a long time, but he was thwarted last season by opposition in the ranks of the councilmen. This year the chief will probably win out.

Qualifications for the Motorcycle Squad. Last season's use of the motorcycle in police work, was studied with interest by the chiefs all over the city.
