The following from a Dalles paper shows how a unique and original idea was carried out in the holding a grand market day:
The first market day in The Dalles was just what was advertised it would be—a gala day, a good time for everybody, bringing buyers and sellers closer together. The merchants were pleased, so were the farmers. All came to The Dalles for miles around and contributed to the success of the undertaking. Everyone is delighted with the outcome of the venture, and it is now more than ever the determination of the business men and others who are interested to make this a regular monthly occurrence. It is the intention now to make the first Saturday in every month market day, when farmers, merchants, commission men and any one who has an article to sell can come and offer it for sale at auction.
It is estimated that there were at least one thousand people from outlying towns and the country surrounding who came to the county seat on this special sales day. The Great Southern railroad brought in about 150 from Dufur and way points in the morning. Even yesterday the hotels were beginning to receive guests, and by noon today all were doing a heavy business in feeding the hungry market day sightseers.

Notice is hereby given that at the regular meeting of the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, held April 27, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve Winter street in the city of Salem, Oregon, including intersection, from the north side of North Mill Creek bridge to the Fair Ground road in said city, in the following manner:
First, by placing in tiling not less than 24 inches in circumference across said Winter street where said Winter street is intersected by the north line of North street; where it is intersected by both the north and south line of Market street, and where it is intersected by the south line of the Fair Ground road.
Second, by establishing the grade and by grading and filling the said Winter street between said points, to conform to said grade, except as mentioned in paragraph three hereof, with full intersections.
Third, by leaving or plowing out a strip 12 feet in width full length of the proposed improvement along the center of said street to a depth of 19 inches below the established grade of said street and when so plowed rolled with a steam roller and then filling the same to a depth of 6 inches with creek gravel and then rolling the same and upon this spread a layer of 4 inches of crushed rock well filled with rock screening, so the surface of said improvement shall be level with the established grade of said street.
Fourth, by taking away the bridge over the ditch where said Winter street intersected the Fair Grounds road and laying tiling in said ditch, and covering said tiling with dirt in such a manner that said ditch will be filled full width of said Winter street on a level with the surface of said street, save and except a strip 12 feet in width in center of said Winter street, where said Winter street intersects said ditch at which point said ditch shall be filled with dirt to only within 10 inches of the surface of said street, upon which shall be placed six inches of creek gravel and upon said gravel shall be placed 4 inches of crushed rock to be rolled as above stated, and the north line of said ditch shall be the north line of said improvement.
Fifth, the cost of such improvement shall be assessed to the abutting and adjacent property owners as provided in the charter of said city.

HARRIMAN PLANS BIG BOND ISSUE

New York, May 5.—E. H. Harriman announced today that a special meeting of the stockholders of the Union Pacific railroad would be held in Sale Lake City.

The railroad magnate also declared that reports about the financial requirements of the road have been greatly exaggerated, stating that the amount of money necessary by the road will not exceed \$25,000,000.

"We want to resume the work of developing the property so that we can put our people back to work," he said.

The stockholders probably will vote on a big bond issue.

Alfalfa Helps the Soil.
At the Kansas station alfalfa roots have been traced to a depth of over nine feet, and at a Colorado experiment station Dr. W. P. Headen has washed out the roots of an old alfalfa plant to the depth of nearly 12 feet, says an alfalfa leaflet. Various reports have been made, without good authority of finding alfalfa roots at even greater depths. It is without doubt one of the deepest rooting plants grown on the farm.

Alfalfa will do more for western agriculture in the next 50 years than all the other crops which farmers may be able to grow in this region. The soil of western Kansas and of much of the western plains is usually rich in the mineral elements of plant food, but, as stated before, it is often lacking in humus, which becomes especially noticeable if the land has been farmed continuously to wheat for a few years.

By growing alfalfa it is possible to increase the supply of humus in the soil, and the roots of the plants penetrating deep into the subsoil, disintegrate and deepen the soil, and altogether greatly improve its texture, giving it greater capacity to absorb and hold water. The beneficial effect on the soil of growing alfalfa is only incidental to the rapid introduction of the crop throughout the west.

The great value of the crop as a money maker is the main factor which is introducing it into the agriculture of the central west. Where alfalfa can be successfully marketed or fed, no other crop grown in the west will yield so great a net profit per acre in a series of years.

Notice is hereby given that at the regular meeting of the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, held April 20, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve North Cottage street in the city of Salem, Oregon, between the north line of North Mill Creek and the south line of D street; D street in the city of Salem, Oregon, between the west line of North Cottage street and the east line of Seventh street; seventh street in the city of Salem, between the north line of D street and the south line of the Fair Ground road, in the following manner:
By establishing a permanent grade on said streets between said points.
