The position which Atlantic City has come to occupy as a pleasure and health resort is now quite supreme. There is clearly nothing at all like it upon this continent, and it is unexampled among all the spas, baths and resorts of the wide world. It is not nowadays a mere haven for a few hundreds or thousands in summer, eager to escape the heat of a near-by city. It is a national, almost an international, gathering place at all seasons of the year. No Frenchman or Italian but would own, after seeing it, that it is one of the fascinating festivals of the world.

The continued growth of this city by the sea has ceased to be a matter for anybody's concern. It proceeds naturally and constantly, for no other reason than that the people find here what solaces and pleasures them. No one can marvel at it when he understands how successfully great sums of money have been invested here for the entertainment of men and women of every kind of taste. The city may be expected in a few years to attain very much greater size, to grow, indeed, until it covers the entire eight or ten miles of coast comprehended between Absecon and Great Egg Harbor Inlets. Nor can any observant person who has known this resort through the past twenty years of its history think this development very far away.

'FRISCO'S GREETING GLORIOUS TO THE BIG FLEET

SHOWERED WITH FLOWERS THE SAILORS PARADE—VETERANS OF ALL FORMER WARS WAS THERE TO JOIN THEM.

 San Francisco, May 7.—Patriotism ran riot today in San Francisco. The reception given the fleet was great, but the reception given the men ashore was greater. Sailor and soldier were cheered, pelted with flowers, showered with adulation and admiration.

Rear Admiral Evans was cheered from the moment he fell into line until the conclusion of the parade and review when he was driven rapidly to the St. Francis hotel to join his wife and daughter.

Both sides of Market street and Van Ness avenue, over which the parade passed, were packed with hundreds of thousands of people, not one of whom did not add his mite to the ringing welcome to Evans and his men.

Arrived at the reviewing point on Van Ness avenue, the admiral's carriage as well as that containing Governor Gillette and Secretary of the Navy Metcalf, fell out of line for review. As the men passed they gave the marching salute.

The movement of the sailors from ship to shore began at daybreak. Spick and span, the blue jackets and marines went over into the waiting boats, which were hauled to the docks in strings by the battleship lanchons. Once on shore, they were assembled in the first four streets off the Ferry building leading into Market street to await the order to march.

The start was delayed, but the marchers and spectators were good natured. When the signal to start did come and the mounted police at the head of the column were seen to move off, a cheer went up, spreading like wild fire the full length of the line.

Three platoons of police, commanded by Captain of Detectives Kelley, all mounted on beautiful chargers, presented a handsome appearance, the horses seemingly dancing to the music of the band that followed them. Behind the band came the grand marshal of the parade, Brigadier General Koster, of the California national guard, followed by his gorgeous attired staff and mounted orderlies.

Headed by Brigadier General Funston, the regulars of the army swung into line. General Funston was followed by his staff of ten, with Colonel W. J. Duncan as chief. The enlisted men came next, the noise of their steady tramp, tramp rising above the hoof beats of the army horses ridden by the commander and staff and even audible above the cheers of the spectators, the peculiar and enchanting cadence of the soldiers' march reaching the ears despite other and seemingly greater noises.

The army division was made up of engineers, signal corps company, entire Twenty-second regiment Infantry, 12 companies of coast artillery, regiment of six companies of coast artillery, second battalion First United States artillery, second quadron Fourteenth United States cavalry.

In the first carriage were seated Governor Gillette and Secretary of the Navy Metcalf. The nine following contained Governor Gillette's staff and officers from the fleet. In the eleventh were Governor Sheldon of Nebraska and members of the fleet committee. Members of Governor Sheldon's staff rode in the six following.

In carriage eighteen sat Rear Admiral Evans and Mayor Taylor, surrounded by the Salt Lake cadets.

The other carriages making up this part of the parade contained the foreign consuls and commanding officers of the fleet.

Net in line and forming the second division, came the men from the fleets. Their appearance was the signal for an outburst that equalled the appearance of Rear Admiral Evans. Led by the captain of the Connecticut, 5600 marines and sailors marching to the music of their bands. The marines in the smart uniforms and visored caps, led the van, followed by the sailors from

the Atlantic and Pacific fleet. Not once through the march did the cheering for Jack cease. Women and girls that had managed to secure positions next the ropes that separated the crowds from the marchers, heaped him with flowers threw laurel wreaths over his rifle and in other ways showed him that he is appreciated and liked even if he is only an enlisted man. Many of the sailor-boys had friends among the spectators and the enthusiasm that their appearance awoke bordered on hysterics.

The third division was composed of veterans' organizations, state militias and semi-military organizations.

The head of the column started from Sansome and Market, leading the way out Market to Van Ness along the west side of Van Ness to Washington, thence countermarching on the east side of Van Ness to Market, thence down Market to Taylor, where the parade disbanded.

Food Shortage in Foreign Countries.

In a statement presented to the British Parliament it appears that in 1906 the imports of wheat and wheat flour into the United Kingdom were 78 per cent of the total supply. In Germany the imports in 1905 (the latest year for which returns were available) were 35 per cent, and in France in 1906, 3 per cent of the total supply. It was stated that in the United Kingdom in 1906 imported supplies were of meat, about 47 per cent; of butter, 57 per cent, and of cheese 61 per cent of the total consumption. For France, the latest returns relate to 1892, and in that year the imports of meat were 3 per cent and of cheese 5 per cent of the total supply.
