The portion of the pavement undermined will be taken up as far down as the last foundation, which is about two feet and a half, and replaced with dry material. This work was started this morning. The affected part will be replaced by practically new material, although some of the first surface now torn up will be used.

## WEALTHY WIDOW MURDERED

### BODY WAS FOUND

SHE DISAPPEARED FIVE DAYS AGO UNDER MYSTERIOUS CIRCUMSTANCES — THREE BROTHERS ARE SUSPECTED.

Walla Walla, Wash., May 7.—Lying in a hole at the foot of an uprooted tree on the north fork of the Coppel, an isolated and mountainous country seven miles east of Dixie, half covered by roots and dead leaves, the body of Mrs. Anna Aldrich, a wealthy widow who disappeared from her ranch near Dixie last Friday, was found at 7 o'clock this morning by Dorsey Brunton and Fred Roff, young ranchers. Finding of body ended the search that has been unceasingly prosecuted by hundreds of farmers in the Dixie neighborhood since Saturday morning when it became known that Mrs. Aldrich had disappeared and that every indication pointed to her murder by "Bud" Barnes and two brothers who took possession of her ranch last Friday. Barnes and two brothers, John and Jack, are in jail here and have told many conflicting stories regarding the affair.

According to evidence gathered by Sheriff Haviland, Bud Barnes and Mrs. Aldrich left the ranch Friday afternoon in a livery rig, ostensibly to go to another ranch owned by Mrs. Aldrich on the north fork of the Coppel. They passed the farm of John Holmes, who was working on a fence along a side road. As the couple passed in the rig, Barnes waved his hand at Holmes and the latter returned the salute. Next morning Barnes returned by the Holmes ranch, but he was then alone. He drove to the Aldrich ranch and later returned the livery team to Waitsburg. He has told the officers that he drove Mrs. Aldrich to Witsburg, where the necessary papers to lease his ranch and property had been made out by Attorney Ormsbee. Ormsbee has denied that the couple had been in his office and this directed still stronger suspicion towards Barnes, who has been arrested. The officers visit the Aldrich home. In the barn yard they found the woman's strong box which had been broken open with an axe and valuable papers taken. The woman's spectacles and thimble badly charred, were found in the stove. Later, in searching Barnes' clothing at his ranch, a bloody handkerchief was found in his overcoat.

Convinced that the woman had been murdered, the sheriff put several possees to searching for her body. The search continued all yesterday afternoon and until last night, John Holmes, ranchman, told of seeing Barnes and Mrs. Aldrich pass his ranch Friday and it was then determined to search the country along the north fork of the Coppel.

Brunton and Roff left the Brunton ranch at day break this morning and hunted both sides of the stream for several hours.

In a particularly lonesome spot near the site of an old and abandoned sawmill the boys stumbled over the body lying in a hole at the foot of an uprooted tree. The body was half covered with roots and dead leaves.

Leaving Roff to guard the body Brunton rode swiftly to Dixie and called up Sheriff Haviland.

There a wild talk of lynching but the officers do not believe any attempt will be made. The Barnes boys are heavily guarded at the county jail and soldiers from Fort Walla Walla will be held ready to quell any lynching party that might show up. Sheriff Haviland, accompanied by Coroner MacMartin, left Walla Walla in an automobile at 8:30. Until they view the body, it will not be moved.

## SALEM PREMISES TO BE CLEANED

Arrangements have been about perfected for the Salem's grand clean-up day tomorrow. When this city wakes up Saturday morning the question is will she know herself.

The plan for the housecleaning of this city involves the public schools which in the morning, will have exercises and instructions as to civic cleanliness and what their duties will be in the afternoon. The pupils will first be put to work to clean up the school premises immediately after the noon hour. When that work is completed to the satisfaction of the principals and teachers, the children will be enjoined to go to their homes and assist their parents in cleaning the houses, front and back yards and alleys and sweeping the rubbish into the streets.

When the sweepings have been brushed into the streets and into piles, the cleaners will go to the telephone, call up the mayor's office notify him the location of the workers and a wagon will immediately be sent to carry off the rubbish.

A great many business men of this city, have decided to close their stores tomorrow afternoon to give their employes an opportunity to partake of the commendable work.

A big interest is being taken by the women's clubs and it is expected they will take a practical hand in tomorrow's work.

Those who have teams at liberty tomorrow afternoon are expected to turn them over to the city's use. Already a large number have been donated, but more are still needed to carry of the loads of expeditiously.
