HONORING FRANCIS JOSEPH.

Fifteen emperors and kings gathered at Vienna May 7th to do honor to the venerable Francis Joseph, on the occasion of the sixtieth anniversary of his accession to the throne. There has been no such assemblage of monarchs since the congress at Vienna nearly a hundred years ago when the map of Europe was rearranged AFTER NAPOLEON HAD TANGLED ITS BOUNDARIES.

The city was magnificently decorated. Flags and bunting stretched across the streets and public buildings, private houses and office structures had their fronts emblazoned in a mass of color. Thousands of visitors poured into the capital, many coming from the extreme districts of the empire. The streets were almost impassable because of the throngs of sight-seers.

The German rulers, with the exception of the Emperor William, all arrived during the course of the night. During the evening dozens of court carriages, drawn by pairs of the emperor's famous breed of greys, dashed to and from all the railway stations of the metropolis conveying the royal guests and their brilliant suites to the hofburg, the imperial residence, in the center of Vienna.

THE GERMAN WERE MET AT THE STATIONS BY AUSTRIAN ARCHDUKES, of whom nine, including the heir apparent were told off by the emperor for this duty. The chief guests, the Emperor William, with the empress and daughter, arrived this morning direct from Corfu and their appearance produced a scene almost as brilliant as the latter's state reception by Franz Josef at the Schonbrun.

The day being fine, Franz Josef himself, welcomed his brother emperor at the Penzing railway station. He was accompanied by all the archdukes and archduchesses in Vienna.

All the German visitors also assembled at the station and while waiting for the royal train the Austrian emperor held an informal court, greeting his royal guests and presenting to them the high military and civil officers of Vienna.

The monarch drove off along the route lined BY THOUSANDS OF SOLDIERS to Schonbrunn. After a short interval for repose, the ceremony of congratulating the aged ruler of the Hapsburg monarchy took place. Before the actual ceremony Franz Josef received privately the German empress, THE ONLY LADY AMONG THE VISITORS, SO THAT SHE MIGHT BE THE FIRST TO CONGRATULATE HIM.

At midday Franz Josef took up his position in the great hall of mirrors, supported by a score of archdukes and archduchesses.

The German emperor then entered the hall at the head of his vassal rulers and addressed his Austrian brother in an eloquent speech. He recalled the glorious history of the Hapsburg dynasty, WHICH HAD GIVEN SO MANY EMPERORS TO GERMANY and he spoke of the long years of close alliance between Franz Josef and the German empire which had caused the peace of Europe to be maintained unbroken. He congratulated the emperor on

the sixty years of his reign and PRAYED THAT HE MIGHT BE SPARED FOR MANY YEARS.

The prince regent of Bavaria offered his congratulations next. He took precedence over the kings of Wurtemberg and Saxony, owing to his age, he being 87 years old. NINE YEARS THE SENIOR OF AUSTRIA'S EMPEROR. The other kings and princes, also the burgo-master of Hamburg were among the last to offer congratulations.

The scene during the ceremony was extraordinarily brilliant and impressive. The assembled rulers and the archdukes all wore the uniforms of their respective countries, chiefly those of field marshals or generals and their breasts were covered with dazzling rows of jeweled orders to which the flashing gems of the archduchesses formed a counterpart. The ceremony lasted about half an hour and was followed by luncheon in the Maria Theresa hall at Schonbrun, at which the German empress sat at the Austrian emperor's right hand. The world will add its congratulations in honor of the most loved of all European monarchs.

To Improve a Portion of State Street.

Notice is hereby given that at the meeting of the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, held May 4, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve State street in said City with full intersections; between the east line of Commercial street and the west line of Church street in the following manner:

By taking up the south railway connection connecting the street railway track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company with the street railway track of the Oregon Electric Railway company at the intersection of High and State streets in said city, and by paving the roadway of said street with Warren's Bitulithic waterproof pavement and by moving out and establishing the curb lines on said street and for the doing of all other things required by and set forth in the plans and specifications now on file in the office of the city recorder of said city for the pavement of said portion of said State street with Warren's Bitulithic waterproof pavement, which plans and specifications will govern the making of said improvement in every respect. The cost of said improvement to be assessed on abutting and adjacent property, as provided in the charter of said city. By order common council. W. A. MOORES, Recorder.

Notice to Improve a Portion of Winter Street in City of Salem.

Notice is hereby given that at the meeting of the common council, held April 27, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve Winter street in the city of Salem, Oregon, including intersection, from the north side of North Mill Creek bridge to the Fair Ground road in said city, in the following manner:

First, by placing in tiling not less than 24 inches in circumference across said Winter street where said Winter street is intersected by the north line of North street; where it is intersected by both the north and south line of Market street, and where it is intersected by the south line of the Fair Ground road.

Second, by establishing the grade and by grading and filling the said Winter street between said points, to conform to said grade, except as mentioned in paragraph three hereof, with full intersections.

Third, by leaving or plowing out a strip 12 feet in width, full length of the proposed improvement along the center of said street to a depth of 10 inches below the established grade of said street and when so plowed rolled with a steam roller and then filling the same to a depth of 6 inches with creek gravel and then rolling the same and upon this spread a layer of 4 inches of crushed rock well filled with rock screening, so the surface of said improvement shall be level with the established grade of said street.

Fourth, by taking away the bridge over the ditch where said Winter street intersected the Fair Grounds road and laying tiling in said ditch, and covering said tiling with dirt in such a manner that said ditch will be filled full width of said Winter street on a level with the surface of said street, save and except a strip 12 feet in width in center of said Winter street, where said Winter street intersects said ditch at which point said ditch shall be filled with dirt to only within 10 inches of the surface of said street, upon which shall be placed six inches of creek gravel and upon said gravel shall be placed 4 inches of crushed rock to be rolled as above stated, and the north line of said ditch shall be the north line of said improvement.

Fifth, the cost of such improvement shall be assessed to the abutting and adjacent property owners as provided in the charter of said city.
