IN COUNTY COURT

ACCUSED WILL BE GIVEN NO PRELIMINARY HEARING—PRISONER'S FATHER SENDS ENCOURAGING MESSAGE.

Portland, Or., May 9.—District Attorney Manning has decided not to give Edward H. Martin, the accused slayer of Wolff, a preliminary hearing. Instead he will file an information against Martin today in the county court charging him with the murder. He will then be taken from the city prison and placed in a cell in the county jail.
Martin received his first direct message from his father late Friday night. The elder Martin is touring southern Europe and has been hard to locate. He advised his son to keep his courage and secure the best of legal advice. For the first time since he has been imprisoned four days

ROBBERS MURDER AGED MAN

IN LOS ANGELES CAL.

CAPTAIN BARD, 70 YEARS OLD, FOUND WITH THROAT CUT, HEAD BATTERED IN AND POCKETS RIFLED OF \$50.

Monterey, Cal., May 9.—With his throat hacked by a knife and the back of his head battered by a piece of gas pipe, the body of an old man known as Captain Bard, 70 years old, was found late Friday night lying near the Southern Pacific railroad road in this city.
Bard had evidently been murdered by holdup men, as his pockets were turned inside out and \$50, which he is known to have carried, was taken. The body was found by J. W. Whistler, driver for the Del Monte stables, while he was walking along the track between the Del Monte bath house and the railroad station.

MURDERESS BURNED A WOMAN

AS CLEVER RUSE

DOCTOR'S EXAMINATION SHOWS THAT MRS. BELLE GUNNESS BURNED HER CHILDREN WITH ANOTHER WOMAN.

La Porte, Ind., May 9.—Convincing evidence that the body of the woman found in the ruins of the Guinness farm house is not that of Mrs. Belle Guinness was produced today by Dr. Harry H. Long of La Porte, who made a scientific examination of the charred body.
After completing the examination Dr. Long declared positively that the remains are not those of Mrs. Guinness. He said that he knew the woman well and is convinced beyond a doubt that she is still alive. He avers that his examination proves this.
Detectives searching for the alleged murderer have redoubled their effort. It has been their theory for the last two days that the body of a woman was placed in the ruins by some one, presumably by Mrs. Guinness herself, to throw off suspicion, thereby leading those who found the corpses to the belief that they were those of Mrs. Guinness and her three children. As the result of Dr. Long's discovery the police authorities may send throughout the country circulars bearing a picture of Mrs. Guinness and her description.
Evidence discovered today indicates that Mrs. Guinness was in league with someone in Aberdeen, S. D., for the purpose of misleading the relatives of her alleged victims as to their whereabouts.
One instance is cited in the case of Bert Chase, of Mishawaka, Ind., near La Porte, who disappeared sometime ago.
Bert told his brother that he was going to visit a "wealthy widow" owning a fine farm in Indiana. That was the last seen of him by his friends or relatives. Later the brother received a telegram from Aberdeen, S. D., announcing that Bert Chase had been killed in a railroad accident. The brother immediately went to Aberdeen, where he discovered that the name signed to the message was fictitious. As the Helga line, whose brother's body was found in a sack in the "murder grave yard," today received from Aberdeen additional letters that passed between the man now dead and Mrs. Guinness. One of the letters shows that Andrew Helga line began corresponding with the woman in August, 1906. She described farm life and hoped that she and Andrew would become fast friends and have many "secrets."

RUSSIANS MURDER BAPTISTS

TRAPPED IN CHURCH

ENTICED IN A HOUSE OF WORSHIP BY PRIEST, UNFORTUNATELY ARE ATTACKED BY ARMED MOB.

St. Petersburg, May 9.—Led into a trap set by a priest of the Orthodox church, two women members of the Baptist church were killed today and 50 men and women were seriously injured.
The bodies of the two women were nearly hacked to pieces by axes, scythes and knives with which the members of the Orthodox church armed themselves. The Baptists had been invited to attend a conference by a priest of the Orthodox church. The purpose of the meeting, the priest told them, was to discuss doctrinal differences. Waiting for the Baptists were the followers of the priest. After the Baptists had taken their seats the attack began. The axes, knives and scythes were wielded unmercifully. The Baptists fled in panic.

KILL AND DISMEMBER SOLDIER

Port Townsend, Wash., May 9.—As brutal and violent a murder as was ever disclosed in the criminal history of Washington, was perpetrated in the soldiers' barracks at Fort Worden last night.

Some time during the night, Henry L. Johnson, first clarinetist of the Sixth artillery band, was murdered and his body dismembered and thrust in the heating furnace in the basement of the soldiers' barracks. Fire was then started, in the hope of burning the body and hiding the ghastly crime.

This morning the charred body was dragged from the furnace by the firemen when they went to fire up for the day. The remains were burned past recognition, but were identified as those of Johnson from fragments of his band uniform which adhered.

Notwithstanding the limbs were severed and the skull battered in, no indications of the dead or blood traces can be found about the barracks. Johnson was known to have considerable money and loaned small sums on interest to enlisted men. James Holt, second cook of the band, and Private Knight, both of whom were in Johnson's debt, quarreled with the murdered man last night and then disappeared from the fort. Both were caught hiding under the wharf this morning and were arrested.

Indications point to robbery or revenge as the motive. Johnson, besides being a skillful clarinetist, conducted a cobbler shop at the fort, and being sober and industrious saved his money and made loans to his comrades at a very high rate of interest.

Yesterday was pay day at the post and Johnson expected to have been paid a large amount of money.

OUTPUT OF TEXTILE MILLS

Washington, D. C., May 9.—One billion two hundred million dollars is the government's valuation of the output of the textile mills of the United States—cotton, wool, silk and other fibre goods including the product of finishing and dyeing mills. Linen does not figure at all in this total. That fabric appears only in the list of imports; at a valuation of about \$22,000,000.

It is a striking fact that the value of the annual output of the American textile mills amounts to very nearly as much as the total capital invested in this industry, which is estimated at \$1,343,324,695. The value of the textile output of the United States is exceeded only by the value of food products and iron and steel manufactures.

The annual dividends of textile mills exceed \$89,000,000 a year, of \$7,000,000 a month, not a dollar of which has been until now earned from the manufacture of linen from American flax. The next figures for textile production, however, will include the output of the Oxford linen mills just established in Massachusetts. These are the pioneer mills in the United States employing a new process of American invention which overcomes the obstacles heretofore presented to the making of linen in competition with the cheaper labor of Russia, Belgium, Ireland and other foreign countries.

In addition to fibre and fabrics, the Oxford mills make a linen machinery "waste" and "Oxolint" for surgical purposes. The latter product is one for which the medical profession has long been looking as a substitute for surgical cottons now in general use. Linen is preferred for the reason that it is more highly absorbent and non-irritating.

First Home Berries—
Geo. Weeks brought in the first home grown crate of strawberries today—the Gold Dollar. They were beauties. This is an Oregon berry propagated by Zim Mills at Spring Brook.

UNEMPLOYED ENGAGE IN A BIG ROW

New York, May 9.—Rioting, police interference, anarchistic demonstration, Socialistic and single tax oratory and charges of ballot box stuffing, jumbled into a disorderly two hours, marked Friday night's session of James Eads Hows personally conducted national convention for the unemployed.

Alex Bergman, an anarchist, who was dragged out of the hall for calling the police vile names, Harry Kelley, who said he was a printer, and "Gas House" Kelley of Buffalo, and the Bowery, were the disturbing elements.

After the police had thrown them out, the rest of the disturbers were quiet and the last hour of the meeting was peaceful.

"Gas House" Kelley introduced the first element of discord. At Wednesday night's meeting a committee had been elected to go to Washington and lay the troubles of the unemployed before congress, and incidentally as that \$150,000,000 be appropriated for public work.

TREASURY GETS \$20,000,000 GOLD
Washington, May 9.—Secretary of the Treasury Cortelyou, it is understood has received all of the \$20,000,000 from the national banks which was called for on or about today. An additional sum of \$25,000,000 is due May 23.

Police in Error.
Syracuse, N. Y., N. Y., May 9.—After questioning the woman arrested early this morning on a New York Central train on suspicion that she was Mrs. Beulah Guinness, who is said to have converted the ground near the back door of her farm house near La Porte Ind., into a grave yard, Chief of Police Condin announced today that he thinks she is Mrs. F. B. Herron of Chicago as she says. This is the name she gave the detectives when she was arrested.

Further proof that she is not Mrs. Guinness came from Franklin, Pa., in a telegram announcing that the woman in custody is undoubtedly Mrs. Herron, whose mother lives eight miles from there and where she makes her home when she is not visiting in Chicago. Chief Condin says he will release her.

Up to noon today no more bodies
