## CHANGE OF A LIFETIME TO VISIT SEATTLE

The battleship fleet of the United States which has just completed its memorable cruise around the Horn will be on Puget sound about May 21st to May 30th. In order to give the people of Oregon an opportunity to witness the maneuvers and inspect the fleet, the Southern Pacific will sell round trip tickets from Salem to Seattle for \$9.70; from Salem to Tacoma for \$8, under the following conditions:

Sale Dates—May 21st and 22nd to Seattle, and May 25th and 26th, 1908, to Tacoma.

Limits—Continuous passage in both directions with a final return limit of 14 days from date of sale.

## CITY NOT COMPANY MAY GRADE

There is a possibility that the grade on Broadway and High streets will be raised to the level of the new Oregon railroad company's track in spite of the city's original intention to compel the company to conform to the city's grade. Yesterday Mayor Rodgers and Engineer Galvani of the railroad company, together with most of the members of the city council went over the ground and looked carefully into the matter. Mayor Rodgers stated that if the grade was changed it would necessitate a very great expense. There is nothing in the law or the franchise that will compel the railroad company to bear any part of the expense, but it volunteered some time ago to pay part of the costs if the city would raise the grade on these two streets.

City Engineer Perrott has also investigated the matter, and is ready to make his report. Engineer Galvani will make his report to the council tomorrow evening.
